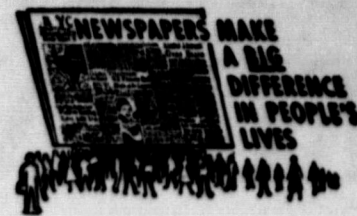

COTTON PROGRAM EXPLAINED BY UNDER SECY. SCHNITTKER

A team of experts from the U.S. Department of Agriculture headed by Under Secretary John Schnittker will be in Dallas Dec. 11 to explain to the cotton industry the complexities of the new government cotton program.

Burriss C. Jackson, Hillsboro, chairman of the American Cotton Congress, said the all day meeting was arranged at the mutual request of USDA officials and leaders of various segments of the cotton industry. The meeting will begin at 9:30 a.m. in the Stadler-Hill Hotel.

Schnittker will be joined by Joseph Moss, director of the USDA's cotton policy staff, also of Washington, D. C., and officials of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, which administers government farm programs through county offices.

Jackson said the clarification of regulations of the recently enacted Food and Agriculture Act of 1965 comes at a time when producers, ginners, oil mill crushers, merchants and spinning mills must make plans for the 1966 season. "Some cotton will be planted in less than three months in the lower Rio Grande Valley," Jackson said. Arrangements must be made now for the next crop even though some five million bales remain to be harvested in the current season.

Several provisions in the law are new concepts in government programs for cotton, including the transfer of allotments by lease or sale; direct subsidy payments to producers; and changes in the skip-row planting patterns and the release and reappointment regulations governing allotments.

Farmers have various choices under cropland adjustment and acreage diversion features of the law to plant, not to plant or plant only

a portion of their cotton allotments. In general, the options for subsidy payments and retirement program make the farmer's decision a separate consideration for each individual farm.

Jackson said leaders of cotton interest groups from every state in the Cotton Belt had been invited.

DO YOUR CHRISTMAS MAILING NOW

With the nation's economy booming at an unprecedented pace, Acting Postmaster Frank Simpson is predicting a dramatic rise in mail volume over last year's Christmas "rush."

"Literally billions of pieces of mail will be delivered between now and Christmas. If everyone were to wait until the last week to mail their gifts and greetings, there is a possibility that the postal system would be literally swamped in a sea of mail. More important, special messages of good will would not be delivered on time. Public cooperation is the key to fast and on-time mail delivery at this time of the year," he said.

Farmers Approve Cotton Transfers

Evelyn Mason, office manager, Gray County ASCS, reports the following results of the recent cotton referendum in Gray County: Cotton marketing quotas, yes 52, no 5; transfer of cotton allotments outside county, yes 27, no 30.

This means that cotton allotments on Gray County farms can be transferred by sale or lease to another farm in Gray County, but cannot be transferred out of the county.

The final date to report transfer of cotton allotments to another farm is Dec. 31. Producers may go ahead and lease more cotton or lease their cotton to someone else in the county—and be sure to report the transfer to the ASCS office by Dec. 31.

If a cotton allotment is leased or bought, it may be planted acre for acre if the yield on the transferring and receiving farms does not vary more than 10 percent. If the receiving farm has a higher yield by more than 10 per cent the leased acreage will be reduced accordingly.

Two registers will be placed on the county office counter. Producers who wish to sell or lease their allotment may sign one register if they wish. Those wishing to lease or buy allotments may sign the other register. These registers will be left on the counter for review by the public.

Information on yields and diversion and price support payments on cotton will be sent to cotton producers very soon. The sign-up period will be held next spring on the diverted acres part of the program.

ACP PROGRAM

Some ACP funds are available in the county to be used during the 1965 year for approved practices. This will be for practices to be completed by the end of the year. Miss Mason urged those interested in this to please come by and sign up before starting the practice.

If you have approval for some practice, remember to be sure to report the performance of the practice prior to the expiration date on the approval.

1966 PROGRAMS

"We expect to have more information very soon on the 1966 program on wheat and feed grain. These programs are expected to be similar to the 1965 programs. Information on the new cropland adjustment program will be issued as soon as it is available," Miss Mason said.

SCIENCE FAIR PLANNED FOR WAYLAND COL.

Scientifically minded young people in area elementary and secondary schools should begin work on entries for the 1966 High Plains Science Fair, March 18, 19, at Wayland Baptist College, Plainview.

Highlight of this annual event will be the Saturday Awards Luncheon, March 19. Following the luncheon, fair exhibits in the Home Life Building are to open for public viewing.

New projects are encouraged this year for all divisions, biology, mathematics and physical science, according to Prof. Dorothy McCoy of Wayland, who is science fair director. Last year's project may be entered if further research has been done on it and improvements have been made, she continues.

More information outlining rules, schedule of events and entrance requirements are being sent to schools at a later date.

An additional requirement for entering a project this year is the inclusion of a one-page abstract on the exhibit. This paper should briefly explain how the exhibit was organized, where materials were obtained, and tell sources or references used in learning about the subject of the project.

Prizes will be awarded winners in the mathematics test division for junior and senior high school students. Applicants for this test are required to present a mathematics exhibit in the form of either a poster or a three-dimensional exhibit on a horizontal base. The latter is preferred. An abstract must also be written about this project.

County Agricultural Agent Texas A & M. College Extension Service

By FOSTER WHALEY COTTON GINNING

Two hundred sixty-one bales of cotton had gone across the scales at the local gin by last Wednesday.

No doubt the number will be over 300 by the time you read this. Dewey Pennington was complaining that it took 2500 pounds to make a bale of cotton. This is about the poorest turnout I've heard of for any year.

We heard a lot of nice compliments on the new gin that is doing such a fine job. Also Henry Lowrance, the gin manager. They have only one crew, but have been working until midnight to try and stay up with the rush that is now getting underway. All cotton is being harvested mechanically.

CATTLE PRICE OUTLOOK

Just about everyone you run into feels very optimistic about the outlook for cattle prices for 1966 and years ahead. There are more plus factors in the market than I've seen for some time. Cattle numbers are expected to be down by 1.5 million head on Jan. 1, 1967. While cattle numbers are down, human population is increasing at a record rate. Beef consumption per person has gone up sharply within the last 10 years. In 1955 the average per capita consumption of beef was 82 pounds. In 1965 this figure is expected to be slightly more than 100 pounds. In 1964 it was also slightly over 100 pounds. Beef is the luxury item in our diets. In times when the economy is booming, people tend to eat a greater percentage of beef.

Another plus factor in the market is the big shortage of hogs. Prices are soaring. People turn to less expensive meats when one gets out of line.

Watch out for 28-30 cent calves this fall. Don't do any early contracting. Some experts are predicting a shortage of beef to set in by 1967. Last week the futures market for the month of June shot up to the maximum limit one day. It has been going up steadily the past two weeks.

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NEWS OF CONSERVATION

By LYNN McDANIEL

Grass seeding is one of the most significant conservation practices needed in Gray County. Old fields that are not economical to farm as cropland or old fields that have been infested by poor quality grasses have been successfully reseeded to high quality grasses such as Indian grass, bluestem mixtures, switchgrass and sideoats grama.

The main advantage of reseeding old fields is that a large quantity of high quality forage can be produced in a period of several years whereas it might take 30 to 40 years or longer for mother nature to do the same job. Native grasses such as Indian grass and bluestem mixtures produce more pounds of forage per acre and are higher in digestible nutrients than most of the grasses that frequently invade old fields. Grasses such as sand drowsed, silver bluestem, grassbur and gummy lovegrass are low in production and palatability.

While these poorer grasses may give satisfactory results for a short period of the year, they do not produce satisfactorily over an entire grazing season. The better native grasses have proved to be more drought resistant and consistent producers in all seasons regardless of the rainfall.

The Great Plains Conservation Program is available to producers who want to reseed grasses or many others of the conservation practices.

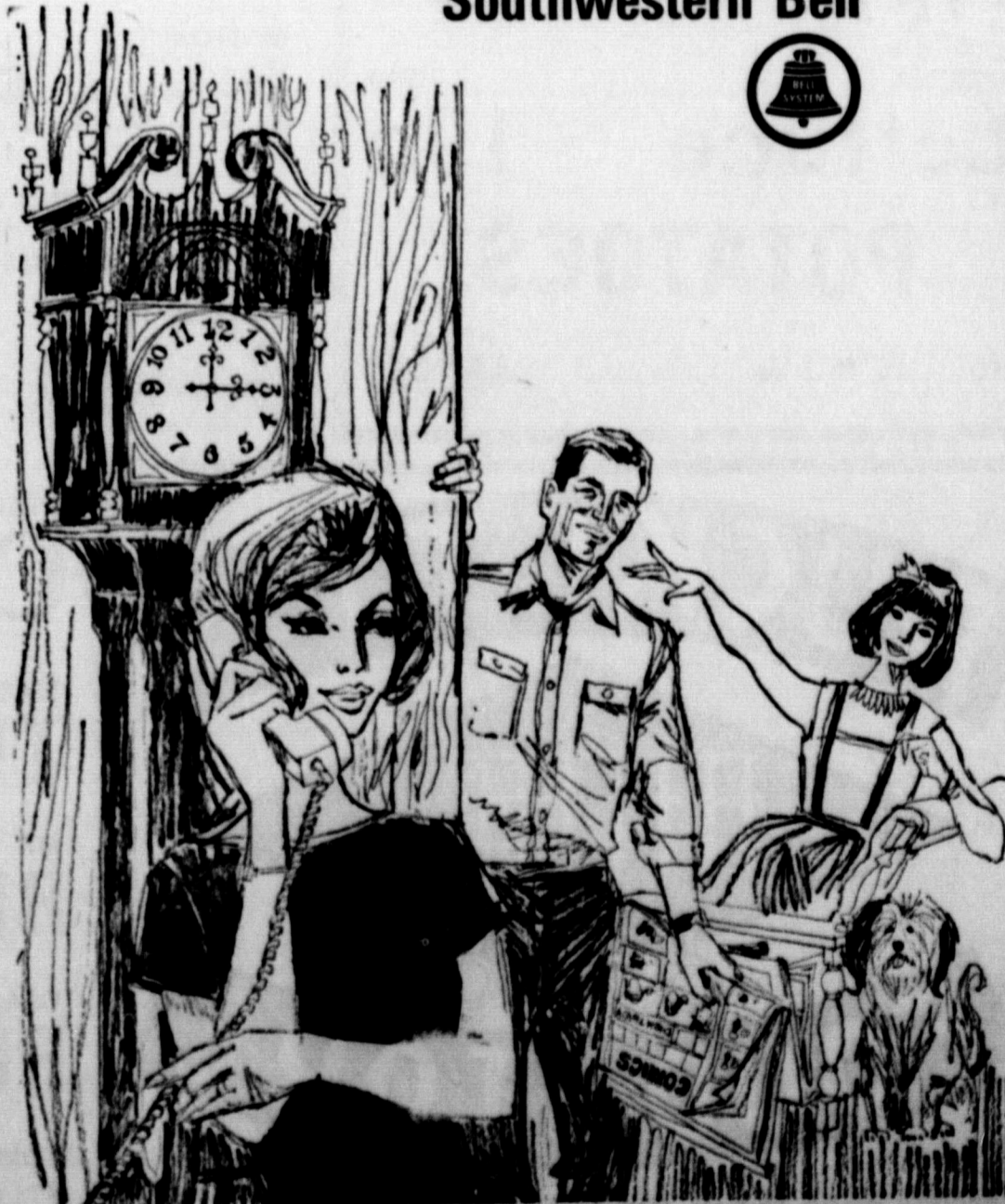

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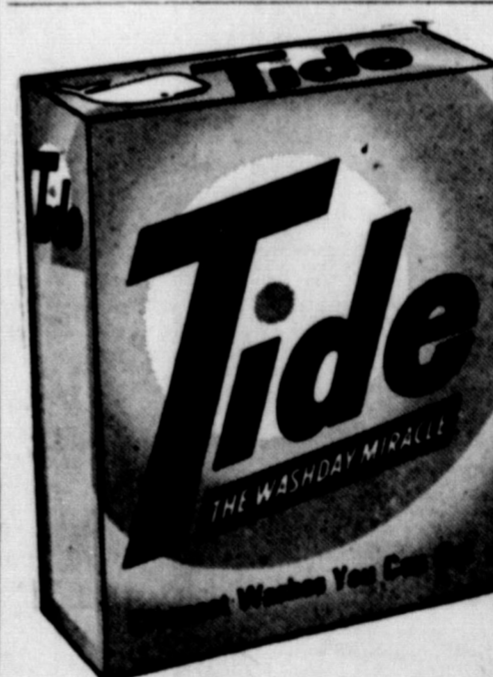

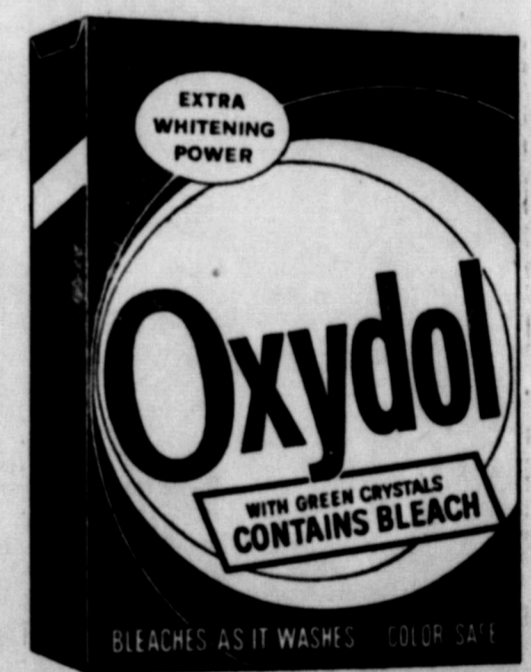
