



#### That Branch College.

Yes, the people of the Southwestern, Middle Western and Northwestern portions of Texas are agitating the question of a branch of the great Agricultural and Mechanical Colrege of Texas, for some section west of the 100th meridian. Nor is this agitation without cause: First it is asserted that conditions prevalent at and near the Agricultrial and Mechanical College are entirely different to those obtaining to those sections west of the 100th meridian. Under this heading it is set up that much of the printed matter sent out by the college is los: to all this west section of the state, for the reason that it is not applicable here. As is well known to all who have given this matter thought, the Texas Agricultural and Mechanical College is located in a "humid" section of the country, while all of that terriory west of the 100th meridian s in a "dry" or "altitudious" section. The crops grown in he humid section are almost erirely different from those grown n the dry or + Ititudious section. This being true, it may readily be seen that if the information ssued from the college is adapted to the one section, it cannot y reason of the very contrasts xisting, be adaptable to the other. Cultural methods as well is varieties of crops, differ entirely. Under humid conditions. where the rainfall is great, there is a tendency to plant the seed bove the level of the surface. so that there may be drainage while under dry-farming condiions the tendency is just the ther way and seed are planted below the level of the surface so that the limited moisture may be made available to instead of being drained away from the eed or growing plants. Second it is urged that young men wish ing to avail themselves of the educational advantages offered them as citizens of Texas through the Agricurtural and Mechanical College, feet that it would imperil their health to eave the altitudes and go into the humid country in which the school is located. It is set forth in this condition that many famiies now in this altitudinous country are here upon the ad ice of the physicians, and that o return to the lower levels would mean in all probability ecurrence of the weaknesses a gainst which they came here to R. B. Bonner, aght, hence that they are doparred from the privileges to which they are entitled through the absence of a branch college.

These are some of the contentions upon which will be based the fight before the next session of the legislature for the establishment of a branch of the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas.
