The Constitution now fixes the compensation of the Governor at an hnual salary of \$4,000 "and no more," and gives him the use of the executive mansion. The pending amendment would make the annual salary \$8,000.

The Constitution now limits the compensation of the Attorney General to an annual salary of \$2,000 and to fees of \$2,000 a year, if amount of fees has been earned by that official for Therefore, his total compensation is \$4,000. The proposed amendment authorizes the Legislature to fix his compensation at an annual salary not to exceed \$7,500 and no more.'

The Constitution now limits the ompensation of each, the Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treas-General Land Office, to an annual The proposed authorize the amendment would Legislature to fix the compensation of each of these officals at an annual salary not to exceed \$5,000 "and

Out of Date Salaries

The Legislature has submitted these proposals of the fact that the duties of the officers have greatly increased sing the salary limits were fixed,, as the cost of lving also greatly has increased. Further than this consideration of Justice the Legislature believes that the public service would be benefitted if these officers were nearly adequately compensated, as all other officers are ompensated.

If this amendment shall be adopted and the Legislature shall allow each of the officers the maximum salary permitted by the amendment, the cost of the State Government will be increased in the sum of \$18,000. To pay this sum an increase in the tax rate of one-twentieth of le on the \$100 would be required. A person paying taxes on \$10,000 worth of property would pay 5c a year more because of such increase.




