Mrs. O. K. Murphree Dies Sunday Morning

Mrs. Chloe S. Murphree, aged 59, wife of O. K. Murphree of this city, died Sunday morning at 7 o'clock, after having suffered for several years with cancer.

Nine months before her death Mrs. Murphree's condition became suddenly worse, and from that time until the end she could not be moved in bed without suffering agonies, and life was made bearable only by the constant use of opiates. She bore this suffering with a stoicism that was marvelous and a patience that was miraculous.

Rev. B. J. Osborn, pastor of the Methodist church, of which she was a consecrated member, says of Mrs. Murphree: "Every person who visited her during her sickness felt most keenly a pity for her, yet each was conscious in a peculiar way that the visit was a benediction to his own life. One's faith in God and confidence in the Christian religion was strengthened. The lingering sickness cost her much suffering, yet it has been one of the strongest sanctifying influences that ever came to McLean in exemplifying the reality and strength of Christianity."

The funeral service was held in the Methodist church, as she had requested, Sunday afternoon, and was conducted by the pastor, Rev. B. J. Osborn. Interment was made in Hillcrest Cemetery at 6 o'clock p. m.

Mrs. Murphree is survived by her husband, three sons, five daughters, and one brother, Rev. C. B. Ingram of Clarendon.

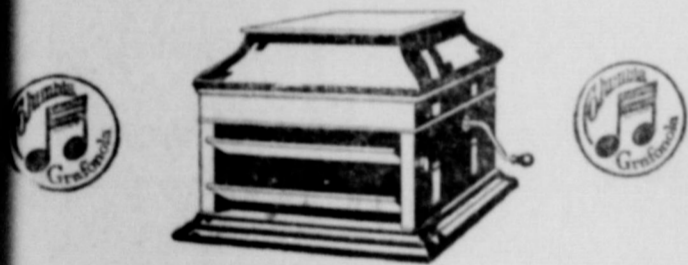

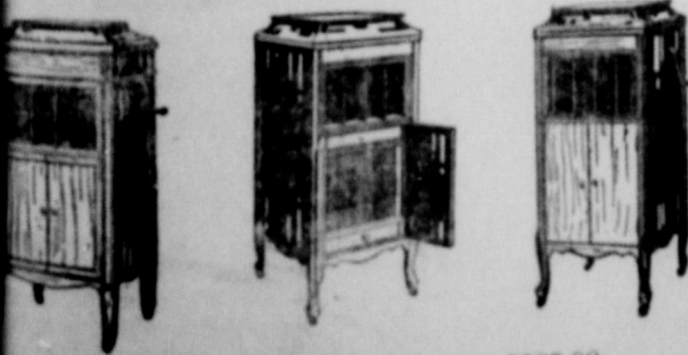

I will pay a twenty-five dollar reward for the arrest and conviction of any party guilty of tying down any telephone wire or in any other manner tampering with the lines. The state law on the subject is as follows:
Penal code, Art. 784: If any person shall intentionally break, cut, pull or tear down, misplace, or in any other manner injure any telegraph or telephone wire, post, machinery or other necessary appurtenance to any telegraph or telephone line, or in any way willfully obstruct or interfere with the transmission of any messages along such telegraph or telephone line, he shall be punished by confinement in the penitentiary not less than two nor more than five years, or by fine not less than one hundred nor more than two thousand dollars.

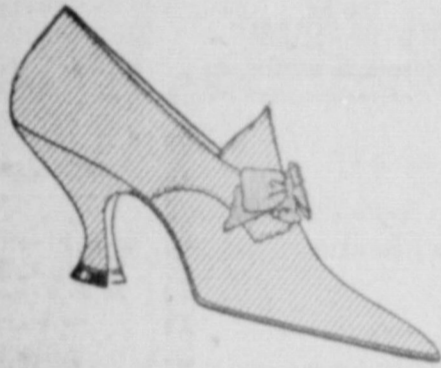

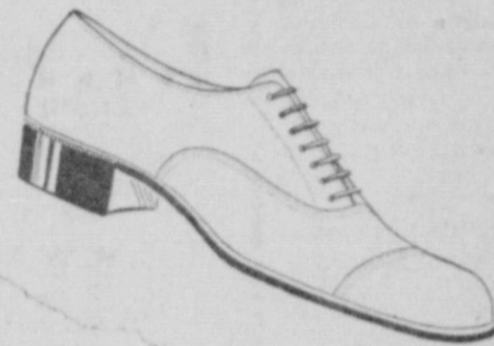

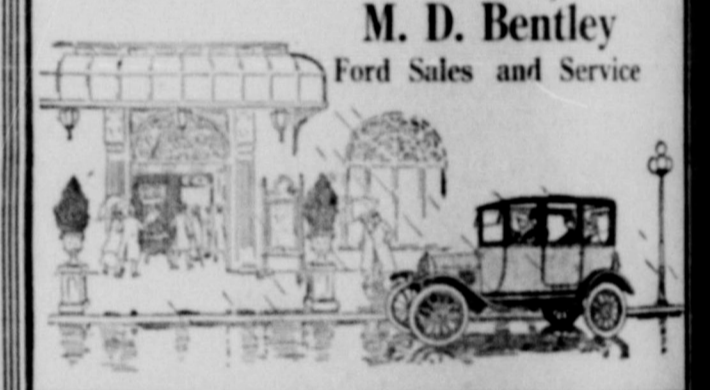
