Ancient Method Used in Moving Tabernacle

A primitive, and altogether novel, way of moving things was resorted to on Monday, when about a hundred men assembled and moved the town's 40 by 60 foot tabernacle a distance of about 50 feet, using no contrivance more modern than a lever, and lifting the structure bodily and "hossin' 'er over" a foot at a time.

The former location of the tabernacle in the middle of Main street had been a source of vexation to people living in the north part of town for years, and after some agitation on the part of those interested, permission to move the same was granted by the city council, and volunteers were secured for the job.

Owing to its peculiar construction, the usual method of placing rollers under it was thought to be impracticable, and extravagant use of man power had to be made. The actual moving required about two hours' time, and resulted in little damage to the structure.

Official Count Shows Road Bonds Defeated

The county road bond issue of \$50,000 failed to carry in the election of April 17th, by four votes, according to County Clerk W. R. Patterson. The official count was made by the commissioner's court, which met in regular session Monday. The bonds were reported to have carried by a good majority just after the election, but one precinct, which polled a heavy vote against the issue, had not been heard from.

Home Demonstration Notes

Interest in home demonstration work is growing rapidly in Gray county.

The county agent, Mrs. Neely, is giving a series of chart talks on poultry, using a chart furnished by the poultry division of the W. T. S. N. C. at Canyon. She has the use of this chart for only two weeks, and is making an effort to reach as many communities as possible during that time. Those who have attended these lectures say they have been benefited.

Mrs. Neely reports excellent meetings with the clubs at Lefors, Eldridge, Back, and McLean.

The next points on the program are Alanreed, Laketown, Hopkins, Praytor, Erick and Bell schools, and Pampa.

Everyone in the respective communities who is at all interested in poultry raising should hear at least one of these lectures. Those who hear them become more interested in the work, for they see wherein it may be made more profitable.

We don't pezactly know whether any such mistake was made Tuesday afternoon, but it is a cinch somebody's foot was on the gas a mite too long before the Dort car Bon Turner, Erwin Rice, Walter McAdams and Pat Malcomb were riding in hit a slippery place three miles this side of Shamrock at about seven o'clock. The car skidded into the ditch, catapulting Rice and Turner through and over a wire fence, painfully scratching Rice and smashing a front wheel.

McAdams and Malcomb were in the front seat and did not get much of a jolt. The sudden stop threw Rice through the fence and he sustained two deep cuts on the left hand and numerous scratches on the south side of both legs, ranging from the knees upward. He says, however, that he is still able to seat himself. Turner, who was on the opposite side from the ditch, had farther to go and probably more force behind him, and without any effort on his part cleared the fence, landing on top of Rice, who beat him to a soft spot by a very brief interval.

There was another car just behind them, which picked up the party and carried them to Shamrock, where first aid was administered to the injured.

A spare wheel was taken out Wednesday morning and the damaged car brought back to town.

I will pay a twenty-five dollar reward for the arrest and conviction of any party guilty of tying down any telephone wire or in any other manner tampering with the lines. The state law on the subject is as follows:

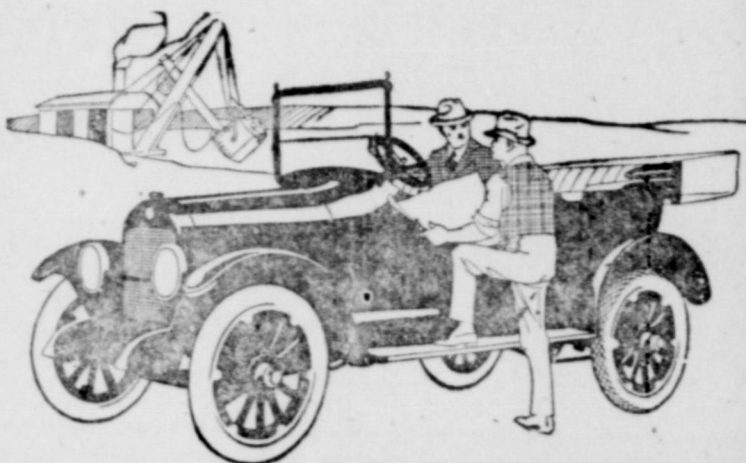
