Bernard McClellan hasn't been too much of a believer in age-old cures that one might say border on superstition.

But now? Well, he and his wife, Zelda, find it hard to say what they do and don't believe about of these cures.

A few months back, Bernard found himself in quite a costly situation one that the best heads in veterinary medicine still have been to figure out.

The farmer, who lives south of town on the Hedley Road, derives much of his income from raising egistered show pigs.

When his sows started farrowing, some strange disease began to take its toll among the baby pigs. Usually no more than two

but none of the miracle drugs he administered to the sick animals did any good. They continued to

The veterinarian performed an autopsy on one, and found that its stomach was empty, indicating the pig. unable to eat, had starved

The same results were noted when another of the animals was shipped to Texas A and M University for closer analysis.

It was decided to send still another carcass to the University of Wisconsin for an autopsy. There a pathologist discovered an unexplainable mucus around the pig's stomach and intestines.

Still, no one was able to learn the cause of death. The disease was one the veterinarians and pathologists had never before come

Ninety-five pigs had died and two more were sick when Bernard's mother, Mrs. Sam McClellan, remembered she had heard many years ago that goats will absorb

There is a continued interest in cattle feeding in this area. Most of the cattle feeding (over 80 per cent) in Texas is done in large commercial-type feed lots. I believe there is a place for

100 to 500-head feed lots. I see no reason why a feeder in this economic size can't compete real well with the commercials.

adaptable to most feeding set-ups around a farm or ranch.

Much of the facilities such as barns, windbreaks, water wells, etc., are already present. Yardage fees in most commercial feed seven cents per animal per day. feed lot to \$10 to \$15 per day for 200 head of cattle in a pen 200 feet by 400 feet.

This is considering a reasonable custom feed lot charge. A rancher utilizing his own labor should be able to hold feed lot cost below that of the commercial feed lot operator.

The \$15 a day savings on feed lot facilities would be a nice profit in itself.

With the new tractor-operated portable grinder mixers a rancher can spend two hours each week and take care of the feed needs of 100 head of cattle if he goes the self-feeder route.

I'm sure there would be some other labor involved. Most of this could be done with cheap electrical

Concepts in methods of feeding beef cattle have changed drastically within the last 15 years. A few years ago most feeders were of the opinion you had to have onethird of a ration made up of roughage.

At the Spur Experiment Station last March I saw a group of steers that had been fed 120 days on an all-concentrate ration (90 per cent milo and 10 per cent cotton seed meal with feed additives). These cattle gained as well as

cattle getting roughage. The cost of gain was a little over \$12 per
