Sunshine has a definite energizing effect on the blood. It makes it possible for the body cells to properly ntilize lime and phosphorous. Direct sunlight cures rickets and is one of the valuable aids in curing many discases.

We must have fresh air if we would build good red blood corpuscles. Have fresh air where you work, where you est, where you sleep. Breathe deeply -use all of your lungs.

Keep the eliminating organs of your body working so that poisons do not pile up in the blood stream. Free yourself from constipation; drink mough water to keep the kidneys working freely; keep the pores of the skin open. Don't burden the blood stream with the poisons of alcohol. nicotine, coffee, or dope of various sorts. Don't harbor a decayed tooth or some other source of infection which throws poisons into the blood stream

Get enough sleep and rest to throw off the poisons of fatigue.
