

Trachoma is less prevalent an Indians of Arizona and New Mexthan it has been. A survey made 1912 was repeated in 1928. In the tribes under observation there was reduction of about 64 per cent in the cidence of trachoma, About 4,700 Indians were examined in 1912, and one-fourth of them had traoma. In 1928, after supervision and atment in the interval, 6,700 Indiwere examined, and less than 9 cent were found to be so affected.




