THE PRICE OF HASTE

"Haste," according to the Travelers Insurance Co., "causes nine out of ten automobile accident deaths."

There are various forms of hasty driving—all of them reprehensible, all generally unnecessary. Exceeding the speed limit is the most common form—and is the most important single cause of fatal accidents. Reckless driving—such as cutting in and out of traffic, passing on hills and curves etc.—is another form. So is driving on the wrong side of the road. So is, especially prolific source of accidents, serious and minor, in towns and cities.

Last year haste in its many forms was the direct cause of about 30,000 deaths, to say nothing of hundreds of thousands of injuries, and property damage running into the millions. At best, those hasty drivers might have saved a few seconds or a few minutes by being reckless—they might have reached some distant objective half an hour sooner than if they had driven carefully. What a price they and their innocent victims paid for that potential saving in time.

For every driver who is hasty because of a genuine need to get somewhere in a hurry, a hundred drivers are hasty for no sound reason at all—because they are congenitally careless, irresponsible, or incompetent. How long are we going to permit these drivers to sacrifice thousands of lives a year on the altar of recklessness?

S. J. R. No. 24

A JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing to amend Sections 3 and 4 of Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to permit the furnishing of State official text books free to every child of scholastic age attending any school within the State.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 3 of Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so that hereafter it shall read as follows: Section 3. One-fourth of the revenue derived from the State occupation taxes and poll tax of One Hundred Dollars on every inhabitant of the State, between the ages of twenty and sixty years, shall be set aside annually for the benefit of the State free schools; and in addition thereto, there shall be levied and collected an annual ad valorem State tax of such an amount not to exceed five cents on the One Hundred Dollars valuation, as with the available school fund arising from other sources will be sufficient to maintain and support the public schools of the State for a period of not less than six months in each year, and it shall be the duty of the Board of Education to set aside under such regulations and in such manner as may be provided by law a sufficient amount out of the tax to provide free text books for the use of children within the State; provided, however, that the limit of taxation herein provided shall not be sufficient to meet the deficit may be appropriated from the State Funds of the State and the Board of Education may also provide for the purchase of school districts by General Law; and all such school districts may embrace parts of two or more counties, and the Legislature shall be authorized to pass laws for the assessment and collection of taxes on said districts and for the management and control of the public schools or schools of such districts, whether such districts are composed of territory wholly within a county or in parts of two or more counties.

The Legislature may authorize an additional ad valorem tax to be levied and collected within all school districts heretofore formed or hereafter formed, for the further maintenance of public free schools, and for the erection and equipment of school buildings thereon; provided that a majority of the qualified property paying voters of the district voting in an election to be held for that purpose, shall vote such tax not to exceed in any one year One (\$1.00) per cent on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation of the property subject to taxation in such district, but with limitation upon the amount of school district tax herein authorized not to apply to incorporated cities and towns constituting separate and independent school districts, nor to independent or common school districts created by General or Special Law.

Section 2. That Section 5, Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so that hereafter it shall read as follows: Section 5. The principal of all lands and other funds, and the principal arising from the sale of lands hereinbefore set apart to the school fund, shall be the permanent school fund, and all the interest derivable therefrom and the proceeds herein authorized and levied shall be the available school fund which the Legislature may add, not exceeding one per cent annually, to the total value of the permanent school fund, such value to be ascertained by the Board of Education or otherwise provided by law, and the available school fund shall be distributed annually to the support of public free schools. And no law shall ever be enacted appropriating any part of the permanent or available school fund to any other purpose whatever; nor shall the same, or any part thereof ever be appropriated to or used for the support of sectarian schools, provided that the State Board of Education may furnish State Adopted text books free to every child of scholastic age attending any school within the State; and the available school fund herein provided shall be distributed to the several counties as may be provided by law and applied in such manner as may be provided by law.

Section 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the electors of this State qualified to vote on Constitutional Amendments at the election to be held on the Fourth Saturday in August, 1935, at which election there shall be printed on each ballot the following:

FOR THE AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS PERMITTING THE FURNISHING OF FREE TEXT BOOKS TO EVERY CHILD OF SCHOLASTIC AGE ATTENDING ANY SCHOOL WITHIN THE STATE

and

"AGAINST THE AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS PERMITTING THE FURNISHING OF FREE TEXT BOOKS TO EVERY CHILD OF SCHOLASTIC AGE ATTENDING ANY SCHOOL WITHIN THE STATE" and every voter shall mark out with pen or pencil the clause which he desires to vote against, or the word "FOR" or the word "AGAINST," at the beginning of each clause, so as to indicate his vote for or against each of said proposed amendments.

Section 4. The Governor is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State, and said election shall be held under the Constitution and laws of this State.

Section 5. The sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars, or so much hereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury to pay the expenses of the publications and elections provided for in this Resolution.

A JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas amending Article 15 by adding another section to be known as "Section 11," providing for the abolishing of the fee method of compensating all precinct officers of this State and county officers in counties of this State having a population of 20,000 or more and providing that all such precinct and county officers be paid on a salary basis; and providing that the Legislature shall enact law purporting this amendment into effect; providing for the submission of this amendment to the voters of this State; and providing that all precinct officers in all counties and county officers in counties under 20,000 population may be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis and authorizing the Commissioners' Court to determine whether certain county and precinct officers shall be paid on a fee basis or a salary basis; and providing for the necessary appropriation to defray necessary expenses for the submission of this Amendment.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas, Article 15, be amended by adding thereto another section to be known as "Section 11," which shall read as follows: "Section 11. All district officers in the State of Texas and all county officers in counties having a population of 20,000 or more, according to the then last preceding Federal Census, shall from the first day of January and thereafter, and subsequent to the first Regular or Special Session of the Legislature after the adoption of this Resolution, be compensated on a salary basis. In all counties in this State, the Commissioners' Court shall be authorized to determine whether precinct officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis; and in counties having a population of less than 20,000, according to the then last preceding Federal Census, the Commissioners' Court shall also have the authority to determine whether county officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis. "All fees earned by district, county and precinct officers shall be paid into the county treasury where earned for the account of the proper fund, provided that fees incurred by the State, county and any municipality, or in case where a pauper's oath is filed, shall be paid into the county treasury when collected and provided that where any officer is compensated wholly on a fee basis such fees may be retained by such officer or paid into the treasury of the county as the Commissioners' Court may direct. All Notaries Public, county surveyors and public weighers shall continue to be compensated on a fee basis." Section 2. The Legislature of the State of Texas is hereby directed, at the first Regular or Special Session after the adoption of this Resolution, to enact such legislation as will be necessary to adequately compensate, on a salary basis, the officers herein referred to in all counties having a population of 20,000 or more according to the then last preceding Federal Census.

Section 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the electors of this State qualified to vote on Constitutional Amendments at the election to be held on the Fourth Saturday in August, 1935, at which election there shall be printed on each ballot the following:

FOR THE AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS PERMITTING THE FURNISHING OF FREE TEXT BOOKS TO EVERY CHILD OF SCHOLASTIC AGE ATTENDING ANY SCHOOL WITHIN THE STATE

Section 4. The Governor is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State, and said election shall be held under the Constitution and laws of this State.

Section 5. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) or as much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay expenses of said publication and election.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing an Amendment to Section 15 of Article 1, of the Constitution of Texas, and providing that the Legislature may authorize the temporary commitment of mentally ill persons, not charged with a criminal offense, for treatment and/or observation without the necessity of a jury trial.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 15, of Article 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to hereafter read as follows: "Section 15. The right of trial by jury shall remain inviolate. The Legislature shall pass such laws as may be needed to regulate the same, and to maintain its purity and efficiency. Provided, that the Legislature may provide for the temporary commitment, for observation and/or treatment, of mentally ill persons not charged with a criminal offense, for a period of time not to exceed ninety (90) days, by order of the County Court without the necessity of a trial by jury."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State, qualified to vote on the Constitutional Amendments, at an election to be held throughout the State on the 4th Saturday of August, A. D. 1935, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the words:

FOR THE AMENDMENT OF ARTICLE 1, SECTION 15, OF THE CONSTITUTION BY ADDING TO SAID SECTION A PROVISION TO THE EFFECT THAT THE LEGISLATURE MAY PROVIDE FOR THE TEMPORARY COMMITMENT OF MENTALLY ILL PERSONS NOT CHARGED WITH A CRIMINAL OFFENSE BY THE COUNTY COURT WITHOUT THE NECESSITY OF A JURY TRIAL.

Section 3. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and have the same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.

The Road to Better Health

CEREBRAL HEMORRHAGE

Albeit the word apoplexy means a spontaneous hemorrhage in any part of the body, its use has come to be restricted to a hemorrhage in the cerebrum (brain). The suddenness of the hemorrhage and its devastating effects are responsible for the designation "stroke." The immediate result of such a hemorrhage is pressure of the clotted blood on the motor area of the brain, leading to paralysis of the parts supplied by the nerve cells in this area. Hence, the term "paralytic stroke."

There are a number of reasons for the occurrence of a cerebral hemorrhage. The immediate cause, of course, is the cracking of one of the arteries of the brain. Summed up, the factors leading to such an accident all do one thing—produce a hardening of the walls of the arteries with an increase of the pressure of the blood within them. The leading underlying factors are excesses of any kind—

over-eating, over-work, and so on. The direct cause in the presence of an existing high pressure is anything that causes a sudden raise in this pressure to the breaking point.

Under normal conditions various factors cause an elevation of the blood pressure, 40 to 50 points. For example, after a heavy meal, following violent exercise, during mental stress, and so on, the pressure is raised considerably. But if the basic pressure is not above normal, and the arterial walls are sufficiently elastic to allow of ready expansion of the artery, nothing will happen. If, however, an individual already has a pressure of, let us say, 190, his arteries are hard and unyielding, and the tension is suddenly raised 50 points, something must break.

When a cerebral hemorrhage takes place the blood pours from the vessel and clots, bringing pressure on the nerve centers. If the resultant clot is small its paralyzing effects will be less widespread than if it is larger. Thus there may be paralysis of only the right arm and leg. And as the clot is absorbed, with removal of the pressure the nerve centers gradually resume their function, depending upon the degree of damage done. Inasmuch as the centers for the arm

are situated in the lower part of the motor area, this part of the clot is absorbed last. Hence there will be greater damage here with less complete recovery of the use of the arm than the leg. If the hemorrhage is so extensive that the blood finds its way into the lower portions of the brain where the heart and respiratory centers are located, death from suspension of these vital processes will be the immediate result.

Beginning with the last reading, we understand that the cheap summer rate for water is on, the first 6,000 gallons costing \$1.50, and 10c per 1,000 for each additional thousand gallons used. Pour the water to your trees and lawns. It will not cost much more than the minimum in winter, and you add to the beauty of the city. What is more cooling to a place than a lot of large shade trees? They cut the hot sun from the premises, and have a very cooling effect.—Terry County Herald.

THE TENDERFOOT TEST

The last three articles regarding the flag of the United States was a summary of requirement No. 2 of the tenderfoot test. There are three of these requirements which must be met before any boy can become a member of the Boy Scouts of America.

Requirement No. 3 is "Tie the square knot and any eight of the following knots: (Since there is no need to give the list of knots, and it is sufficient for our purpose to say that all of the knots are common knots which can be and in many instances are used every day, we will not list them).

Requirement No. 1 is as follows: Know the Scout oath and law, motto, sign, salute, and significance of the badge and uniform.

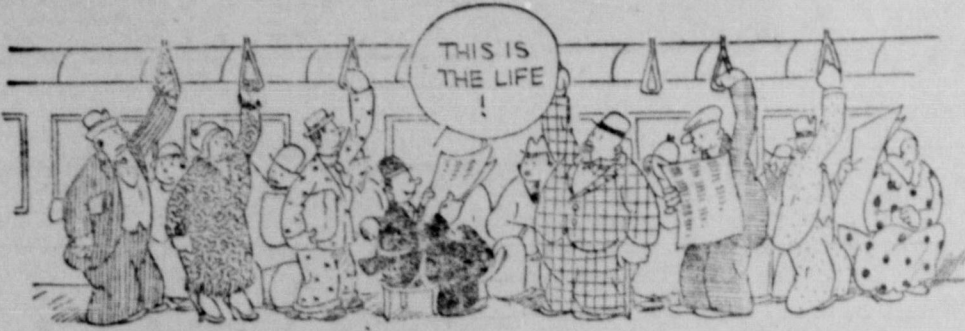

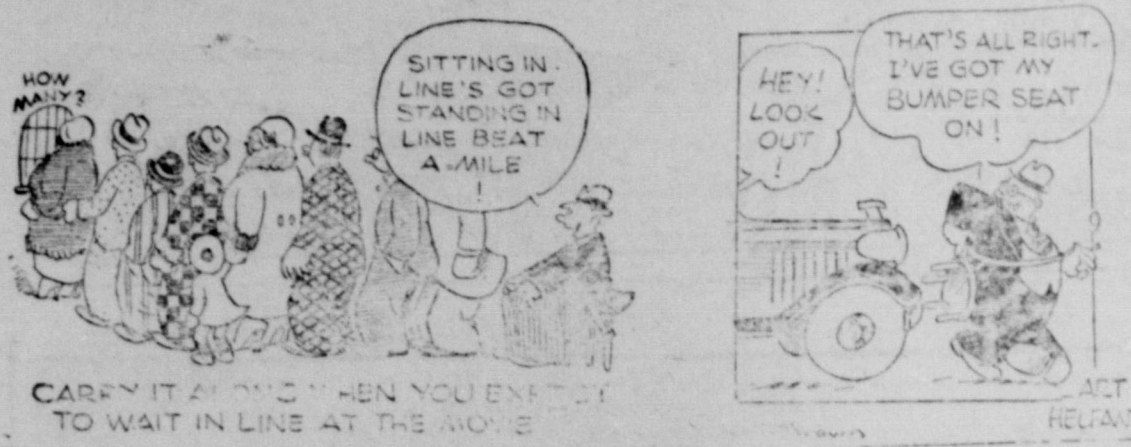
