Lesson text, 2 Chronicles 15:1-12. Golden text. Hebrews 13:6.

Last Sunday we studied something concerning the division of the kingdom of the Hebrews itno Israel and Judah, along with the foolish atitude of the king of Israel, Jeroboam. This week we turn to the southern who followed his father Solomon to Him. the Judean throne. He was injudicious and wicked. He began his reign with three years of obedience to God and prosperity. During that time he began a system of fortifications which were valuable. But he and his kingdom soon lasped into wickedness and idolatry. He reigned for seventeen years.

Rehoboam was followed by his son Abijah, who reigned three years. He was wicked, but nevertheless was victorious over his fellow ruler of the northern kingdom, Jeroboam,

Asa was the third ruler of the southern kingdom as such. He reign ed for forty-one years. He was a good and God-fearing king for the most part. His father had left for him an idolatrous and disobedient And one of the most serious influences against any good intentions Asa may have had was his mother, the "queen mother," who was a very devout idol worshiper, and who had established a foreign idol at the heart of the court life. This was the atmosphere into which Asa went as the new king.

Early in the reign of the new king God sent His prophet Azariah to Asa with a very vital message. God and the power of His presence if he would do away with the idols of the land and call the people back to the true worship of God. The king not only heard but acted He believed God and began his work of reform. The first thing was to establish the worship ceremonies of lected. Asa gave them a new and vital return. He then took away and destroyed most all of the places of idol worship through the land and also destroyed the idols. Poor farming is the most expensive method. Drouth is the most cruel method.






