





figures show why the present commissioners were able to lower the tax rate from \$1.10 to 95c. These figures also show why Gray county was able to sell the bonds necessary to build the entire McLean-Pampa road. Bond buyers, both local and outside, are not now afraid to invest their money in a county showing such a healthy financial statement, and managed with such good judgment. The court has also gotten State and Federal approval on a loan of \$120,000 from the P. W. A., \$36,000 of which is a grant and \$84,000 a loan secured by Gray county bonds. This loan will top the entire road.

The foregoing explains why our commissioners can build the McLean-Pampa road, giving employment to the people, and business to the merchant, and not raise the tax rate over 5c, and probably not at all. 
