OPEN HOUSE AT HOSPITAL FEB. 21

FIRST PATIENT COULD ENTER THE NEXT DAY

The new 23-bed McLean Hospital will be open for public inspection on Sunday, Feb. 21, Bill Robertson, administrator, announced Wednesday afternoon.

Robertson said open house is planned from 2 to 5 p.m., and everyone in McLean and throughout this area is invited to attend.

A definite date for receiving the first patients has not been set, but Robertson said he hopes arrangements can be completed for the official opening on Monday, Feb. 22.

All is in readiness for the opening, except for the cookstove, the administrator reported. The stove ordered for the hospital kitchen was found to be too large when delivered, and it had to be sent back.

17 Beds About Ready

Seventeen hospital beds are either already set up or soon will be, along with other furnishings for the rooms.

This is the number of patient rooms which local individual residents, churches and organizations have agreed to furnish.

Plaques for the patient room doors, bearing the names of the donors, will not be delivered in time for the open house, Robertson said. But these will be installed as soon as they arrive.

To date, 14 employees for the hospital have been hired. Others will be employed as needed.

Carter Technicians

A native of McLean will return home to serve as laboratory and X-ray technician at the new hospital, Robertson announced.

James (Butch) Carter, now receiving technical training in Houston, is expected to finish the school there in time to assume his duties in McLean on April 1.

His wife, Marcia, will return here at the same time to become one of the registered nurses employed by the hospital.

Carter is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Wheeler Carter of McLean, and is a graduate of McLean High School. He entered the Commonwealth College of Science in Houston in November, 1963.

Mayor Won't Ask New Term City Commission Election April 6

City voters will choose a new mayor and two aldermen in the annual election on Tuesday, April 6.

Date for the election was set by the city commission in its monthly meeting Tuesday night.

The filing period was also declared open, with the deadline set for 5 p.m. March 6. Voting on April 6 will be from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Aldermen whose terms expire are Jewel Meacham and Boyd Meador.

Mayor John C. Haynes announced at the meeting that he would not be a candidate for re-election.

Three Terms Enough

"My decision has been reached," the mayor said, "after some soul-searching since many of the programs which I had hoped the city would start and complete have not been accomplished. But I think three terms in office is long enough for any man.

"I want to express my deepest thanks to the members of the city commission, now serving and with whom I have served in the past, for their wonderful cooperation and their desire to do always what is best for our wonderful city. And I have enjoyed the wonderful support of the residents of McLean who continually strive for a better community.

"I feel that during these past six years we have been able to accomplish a lot for the City of McLean. Although I shall no longer be holding an official position with the city, you can rest assured that my energies will always be directed toward helping our community grow and to become a more prosperous and better place in which to live."

The commission re-appointed two members of the city library board to new terms. They are Mrs. Jim Back and Mrs. Creed Lamb.

LUMBER YARD IS ROBBED BY LONE BANDIT

A lone bandit who robbed the Cicero Smith Lumber Co. in McLean Tuesday afternoon apparently has eluded officers and remains at large today.

The young bandit, with a single blow to the back of the neck, knocked Mrs. Chester Bohlar unconscious about 2:30 p.m. Tuesday and made off with some \$22 in cash and a hunting knife.

Mrs. Bohlar, wife of the lumber company manager, was alone in the building at the time. When she regained consciousness, estimated at five to 10 minutes after the attack, she quickly telephoned for help.

No Trace Found

But no trace of the robber could be found outside the building.

Constable J. D. Fish said Wednesday morning he radioed an alert to other officers in the area. Several suspects were stopped Tuesday afternoon, but none fit the description given by Mrs. Bohlar.

The robber jerked the company cash register from the counter and scooped up the money. Coins dropped along the way clearly showed his path through the back of the building.

The hunting knife, a Christmas gift of Bohlar's, was on the desk in Bohlar's office. It lay on a box of old coins which was over-

Just Between Us

You better had enjoyed it while it lasted, for McLean's first gasoline price war in memory is at an end.

Service stations began boosting prices back up toward the usual levels Monday, stopping the week-long battle that saw the cost of regular gasoline at the major stations hold at 21.9 cents per gallon for most of the period.

Wednesday afternoon, the posted price at all stations checked was 29.

We're sure the station operators themselves are happy to see the increase, for no business can continue to lose money very long without having to close its doors.

Price wars are really a nasty business, because no one actually profits by them. Sure, we were able to operate our buggies a little cheaper the past few weeks.

But all of us realize some income, either directly or indirectly, from the service stations.

And when the operators' incomes drop, there's no way of keeping us from declining too.

We doubt that you'll find a single station which showed an increase in gasoline sales volume while the price war was being waged. Instead, average daily sales at some probably went down.

When the tourist sees indications of a price war in a town, he often stops traveling in hopes of finding a station with gasoline just a little cheaper.

Now those among us who in the past often listened longingly to tales about gasoline price wars in other towns have one of our ears to talk about.

And we can't make the off-fer.

The appointments are for opening in the 1965-66 school year.

BUSHLAND FIELD DAY

The program will start at the experiment station at 10 a.m. and will end at 3 p.m.

It will take about 1 1/2 hours to drive from either McLean or Pampa to the experiment station.

Here are a few items to be discussed:

Pre-emergence sprays on cotton and grain sorghum; grain sorghum production, dryland and irrigated; fertilizers, trace elements; wheat products on dryland and irrigated; cultural methods; effects of grazing; fertilizers; methods of irrigation, timing of irrigation and bench leveling.

Let's have a good turnout from McLean.

PROPOSED LEGISLATION

Here are some bills that have been introduced at the current session of the Legislature that I bet you have an interest in:

Senate Bill No. 2. This bill requires compulsory pooling of mineral interest, etc.

Senate Bill No. 42. This bill makes parents legally liable for damages to property done by their minor children.

House Bill No. 11. This bill raises the gross weight of farm trailers used to transport cotton from 10,000 pounds to 15,000 pounds.

House Bill No. 60, by Grainger McIlhenny. A bill providing for the eradication of hog cholera.

House Bill No. 271. This bill provides a supplemental appropriation of \$250,000 for the support of the screwworm program.

Mrs. A. L. Hopkins installed a well and water storage facility on her ranch south of Bowers City. Wells and ponds are necessary for satisfactory grazing distribution in large pastures.

WIND EROSION is one of the largest conservation problems that we have in the Panhandle area of Texas. Land should have a growing crop or crop residue cover during critical wind erosion periods—usually fall and spring.

If the cover is not adequate for soil protection, surface roughening tillage such as chiseling or listing should be done.

Crop rotations consisting of high residue producing crops such as small grain and sorghum in conjunction with stubble-mulch farming are sound conservation practices needed to prevent wind erosion.

RANGE SEEDING—C. H. McCutley, John Haynes, Tony Smitherman, Harris King and Truitt Johnson are some of the farmers and ranchers that plan to do range seeding in Gray County this year. The moisture is better this year than it has been for the past two years.

Grass seedlings should be protected from grazing during the first growing season for establishment. Competitive weeds should be sprayed or mowed so the new grass seedlings will get moisture and sunlight for adequate growth.

Deferment and weed control are two practices that are overlooked sometimes when grass is being established. It has been proven every year that these two practices are necessary for satisfactory establishment of native grass.

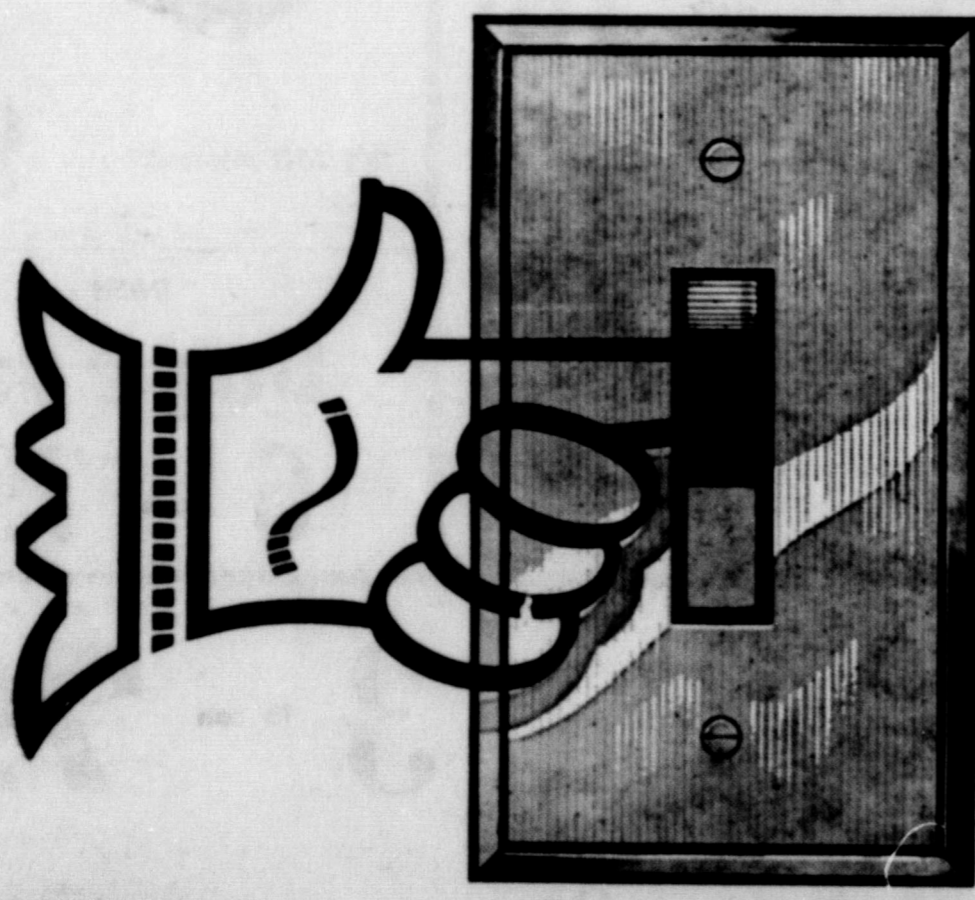
