RUSSIANS:

Deep Trouble

As the Nazi blitz moved into high gear on the central and south fronts of the great battle of the east front, the question began to be seriously asked whether Russia, like France, Greece and so many other nations, was going to be forced out of the war as a combatant, wilting before the heat and ferocity of the Nazi

Indeed, when the German spearheads had been announced 65 miles away from Moscow, the stories of peace and truce offers began to come over the cables, and one of them even declared that Stalin was considering an armistice.

Revelations

What many believed to be true, that Nazi agents in the United States were using the non-interventionists, the isolationists and other enemies of the President's foreign policy for their own ends was declared to be a fact by George Sylvester Viereck, author, poet and registered Nazi agent.

Viereck was being tried in Washington on charges that he had not told the state department the whole story about his activities.

It was perhaps a joke, but at all events a sensation when, at the outset of his trial, he was asked to "name his associates" and he listed two assistants of Secretary Hull, Joseph Davies, former ambassador to Russia, and William Phillips, now ambassador to Rome.

The nub of the case against Viereck was that he listed his activities only as an employee of the Ger-man library of information; as cor-respondent for a Munich newspaper. The library had been closed down by the government for alleged im-



Bulky, bull-necked, pompadoured and of a general leathery makeup, Mr. Warren liked to go fishing in old clothes at Hatteras or Kitty Hawk. He didn't want to be bothered with this comptroller general job, although it pays \$10,000 a year for 15 years. His predecessor, the penny-pinching John Raymond McCarl, who once nicked a pullman berth item on General Pershing's expense account, was known as "the watch dog of the treasury." Mr. Warren didn't want to be a watch dog, and after Mr. Mc-Carl quit, in 1936, President Roosevelt offered Mr. Warren the job three times before he

One of his three children, Lindsay Jr., aged 16, is ailing. The importance of getting the best medical care for the boy, and his desire for a permanent home is said to have induced him to accept. He had been one of the most popular men in congress, and watch dogs aren't altogether popular.

His post carries more power than almost any in the federal job portfolio, although no quiz entrant would be apt to list it. He passes on government appropriations, audits governmental accounts, settles claims and in numerous other ways polices hidden or furtive charges in federal expenditures. He had valuable training for this in his long experience as chairman of the house committee of accounts.

He is 51 years old, a native of Washington, N. C., up "through channels" in politics, as county attorney and state senator. He has been regarded as one of the ablest political strategists of the Democratic party. Furthermore, there is a legend that he once trimmed the resident handsomely in a weekend poker game. EGG SHORTAGE IS THREATENED

More Laying Hens Needed To Meet Demand.

By LESLIE M. BLACK (Extension Poultryman, New Jersey College of Agriculture, Rutgers University.)

Keep your pullets and turn them into laying hens instead of putting them on the market thereby providing more eggs for Uncle Sam's food-for-defense program and aiding your own income.

There's no definite egg shortage now but there may be in the future unless egg production is increased. People are eating more eggs at home, the army needs lots of eggs, and large quantities are scheduled for shipment overseas. The government recently asked poultry producers to increase egg production 10,000,000 cases during a 15-month period ending next summer; and they have responded, but later igures indicate the increase will fall hort of that figure.

We know that we can produce all the eggs needed in the food-for-defense program. It's just a matter of having plenty of laying hens and taking care of them properly.

Eggs are one of the best foods and no one should eliminate them from one's diet because of shortage. On the average, each person in the United States uses 26 dozen eggs a year. This average should be maintained along with supplies for the army and Britain.

A recent United States department of agriculture report shows that about 19 per cent more chicks have been hatched since January 1 than a year ago, but the increase in numbers of young chicks on forms on June 1 was disappointing. This would indicate that many pullets are being sold as meat along with cockerels for the broiler mar-

The egg-feed price ratio is at tractive to the poultry producer now, and the government has announced that a favorable ratio will be maintained. It looks like this was the year to fill all available poultry nouses with well-matured laying pul-

A special effort should be made to withhold all well-developed pullets from slaughter. The market for poultry meat can be fully supplied from the cockerels out of this year's hatch because prices will be better if the broiler market is not overloaded.

To Prevent Fuel Waste Adjust Cil Burner Now

Owners of household oil burners can avoid unnecessary expense and conserve fuel this winter by having burner flames properly adjusted with a flue gas analyzer.

With his flue gas analyzer, a service man can adjust a flame for the most efficient use of fuel. Homeowners, however, are warned against trying to adjust the flames of their oil burners themselves. Oil companies and furnace representatives can supply trained men for the job.

The majority of the country's 2,000,000 house-heating oil burners are east of the Alleghenies according to the U.S. department of agriculture. Use of a flue gas analyzer can help materially in conserving oil, which is particularly important in the region faced with a shortage.

Experiment in Use

Of Dried Vegetables BERKELEY. - Dried vegetables will soon be a part of every army cook's larder, if experiments carried out by the fruit products division of the University of California college of agriculture are any indication.

The division began investigating methods of dehydrating vegetables for army use more than a year age at the suggestion of the quartermas ter corps. Dr. W. V. Cruess, head of the division, reported today that the methods developed have been very successful in drying the vegotables and still retaining their color.

flavor, and cooking quality. The secret of success, said Dr. Cruess, was found to lie in thoroughy scalding the raw vegetables in steam to precook them and destroy enzymes responsible for undesirable changes in Javor, color, odor and texture. Very thorough drying was found to be essential to preparing vegetables that will keep well.

One of the big advantages of farmng hill land on the contour is the amount of water that is saved for soaking into the ground. During an eight-year period at a government soil erosion station in southwestern Iowa, an area listed on the contour ost only 2.7 inches of water a year, while a similar slope area farmed up and down hill lost 19 inches of rainfall. In a drouth year, especially, such differences are very signifi-





11:26-28; Isalah 28:1-6; Habakkuk 2:12. GOLDEN TEXT-Righteousness exalteth a nation: but sin is a reproach to any people .- Proverbs 14:34.

Legal approval of the sale of alcoholic beverages has largely taken the matter out of the hands of the home and the church and has made liquor a civic problem. That, of course, does not provide us with a convenient excuse for evading our personal responsibility, for the nation is made up of you and me, of your home and mine, of your church and mine. We must share the nation's responsibility gladly and actively if we are to be worthy of our citizenship. Especially is that true of the Christian, for he sees the spiritual and moral implications of the matter, and he also knows what to do about it.

I. "Righteousness Exalteth a Nation; but Sin Is a Reproach to Any People" (Deut. 5:32-33; 11:26-28).

That may sound a bit old-fashioned and it may appear that men have abrogated that principle, but if we wait a bit we shall see that it still
