IN THE SERVICE

DWIGHT AWARDED DFC

15th AAF in Italy—Hanging from the catwalk of a B-17's bomb bay, four miles above the earth, T. Sgt. Clyde Dwight, Jr., of McLean, over Prague, Czechoslovakia, on March 25, released three bombs which had hung up in the rack, menacing his ship with destruction, in an action which has brought him the Distinguished Flying Cross for "extraordinary achievement in aerial flight."

The bomb load that day, destined for enemy installations in Prague, consisted of fragmentation bombs in clusters of six. As the bombs were released over the target, some of the clusters broke apart, leaving three bombs still in the bay, entangled in arming wire.

Hanging from the lower part of the outer rack, they were subjected to the high winds rushing in through the open bomb bay doors. The nose and tail vanes of the bombs began to turn. The wind was performing the arming process which leads to explosion. The bombs were being swung against the sides of the bomb bay. Once armed, they were certain to explode.

At this point, Sgt. Dwight ran to the bomb bay from his engineer's position in the top turret, and working as swiftly as possible, secured himself below the catwalk. Wearing no parachute, he risked death if he missed a foothold. He was forced to work without his heated gloves, exposing himself to the arctic temperature of high altitudes and thus to the frostbite which can make necessary the amputation of an entire limb.

"What I was most scared about," Sgt. Dwight recalled afterward, "was that a bomb might explode while I was working there. I would have been blown to bits even if the rest of the crew had escaped by some lucky chance."

With his fingers so numb that there was almost no feeling left, he succeeded at last in cutting the arming wire which had tangled up the bombs.

According to his citation: "By his courageous action at great risk of life, and beyond the line of duty, Sgt. Dwight has reflected great credit upon himself and the Armed Forces of the United States of America."

Sgt. Dwight has flown 27 combat missions. He has been serving in Italy for eight months. In addition to the DFC, Sgt. Dwight has been awarded the Air Medal with two Oak Leaf Clusters.

His parents and his wife, Mrs. Louise Dwight, live in McLean.

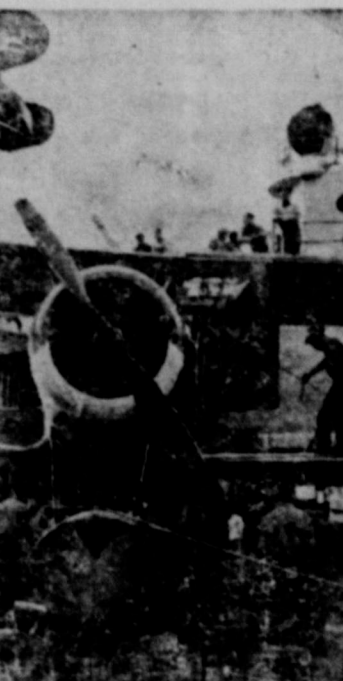
