




Children and pets have long been on the "not wanted" list in rent houses, and now new restrictions aimed at persons over 65 years of age have been adopted by landlords in the east. Just as soon as a man becomes eligible for an old age pension, he is dumped into the street.

Some 165 teachers in 40 towns in the Panhandle have left their jobs since last September to take more attractive positions. 


