Methodist Revival Begins August 23

Rev. H. A. Longino, pastor of the First Methodist Church, announces that his congregation will begin a revival meeting Friday evening, August 23, which will run through Sunday, September 1, with services each morning at 10:30 and evening at 8:00. He has secured the services of Dr. Frank L. Turner of Fort Worth, one of the general evangelists of the Methodist Church, who will bring the messages, lead the song service and direct the work of personal evangelism. He will also conduct a series of services for the young people.

Dr. Turner was for 15 years a pastor in the Central Texas Conference, holding pastorates at Hamilton, Cisco, Ballinger and Fort Worth. During this time he conducted a number of revivals throughout the conference with outstanding success. In 1936, he was elected president of McMurry College, senior Methodist institution at Abilene, which position he held for almost four years. During his presidency, the school was entirely freed from indebtedness, and more than \$50,000.00 worth of improvements made to plant and property. The school greatly prospered under his efficient leadership.

In September, 1942, Dr. Turner resigned his position at the college to enter the field of evangelism and was appointed a general evangelist at the next annual conference. Since entering this work, he has held 73 meetings in five states and nine annual conferences. These revivals, which have been conducted in both large and small churches have resulted in more than 1200 conversions and additions with hundreds consecrating their lives to Christ at the altar of the church. Everywhere he has labored, there has been a great spiritual uplift. He comes to McLean from Lamesa where he recently concluded a great meeting. The public is invited to attend any and all of these services.
