City Council Revokes Two Election Orders

Both city elections which were held last week—the one for the bond issue to move the gymnasium from Pampa and set up here, and the one to repeal the recreation program tax—were revoked at a called meeting of the council Tuesday afternoon. Mayor Boyd Meador announced following the meeting.

The action was taken after investigation, with the city attorney and a representative of the bonding company, regarding the present outstanding bonds of the city compared to the valuation and rate. The outstanding bond issues are at a maximum.

The recall of the recreation tax was also revoked, since the idea for it was to have more money available to pay off the bond issue, if that issue had passed.

The motion to call off the bond issue was made by Guy Hibler, seconded by Roger Powers, with the effect that "action taken by the council August 11 in ordering an election to be called for the purpose of voting a bond issue of not to exceed \$40,000 for the purpose of erecting a municipal building be revoked and the order for that election be cancelled. This action taken after investigation, with the city attorney and representative of the bonding company, regarding our present outstanding bonds as compared to our valuation and rate, our outstanding bond issues now being at a maximum."

The motion to cancel the election to recall the recreation program tax of three mills was made by O. G. Stokely and seconded by E. J. Lander. Both motions carried unanimously.

Both elections were called last Wednesday following receipt of a petition from taxpayers of the city requesting the bond issue. City officials then conferred with Arthur M. Teed of Pampa, who is the city's attorney, and he in turn contacted C. M. Smith, a representative of the Central Investment company, a bonding company.

Only 10 Names Listed on Gray County Ballot

The ballot for the second Democratic primary, to be held on Saturday, August 28, will have only ten names for the voters to read, and in this part of Gray County, voters will have to read only four of those ten names.

Local voters, and those of the immediate surrounding area, will have only to choose their candidate for U. S. senator and for county judge. Precinct 1 voters must also elect a commissioner, and Precinct 2 voters must choose a commissioner and a constable.

Lone survivors of a resounding battle for the office of senator in the first primary are Coke R. Stevenson, who led the ticket in the elimination contest, and Lyndon Johnson, second high in that race for the office which 11 men originally sought. This race is still holding interest, and supporters of each of the two candidates are working more and more as the election date nears.

In the contest for county judge, County Attorney Bruce L. Parker is seeking to defeat John O. Pitts, Pampa business man. Parker led the first primary, and B. E. Ferrell and Henry L. Jordan were eliminated from the running.

In Precinct 1, Joe K. Clarke is seeking re-election, and his opponent is Alva G. King. King led with a few votes in the first primary. Precinct 1 includes Lefors and the surrounding area.

In Precinct 2, which has as its main voting strength the population of Pampa, Irvin Cole and J. W. "Bill" Graham are in the run-off for the office which Wade Thomason now holds. Thomason did not seek re-election. Also in that precinct, a run-off will be held for the constable's office between Earl Lewis and Bill Langley.

Workers Finish Marking Street Names on Curbs

Marking of the street curbs in McLean with the names of the streets was completed this week.

The work was started Monday of last week when an orange background was painted on each corner. Names and numbers of the streets were then stenciled in black over the orange background.

All work was done by city employees, and the cost to mark the curbs was very low.

City officials are urging that each home owner, or renter, now number their homes properly. The correct house number, Mayor Boyd Meador, or from a map of the city at the City Hall.

Pampa's Ninth Case of Polio Is Announced

Pampa ninth case of polio, the dreaded disease which has already claimed two lives in this city, has been sent to the Plainview clinic for treatment.

The latest victim is Nancy Sharp, 8-year-old daughter of Mrs. Nellye Sharp, 810 E. Browning.

Two other cases of polio from Mobeetie have been reported, since the death of a Mobeetie girl last week from the disease. The two new cases are David Seitz, 4-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Monroe Seitz, and Laura Lancaster, 7-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Curtis Lancaster. Both have been taken to the Plainview clinic. Laura Lancaster is the sister of Betty Jean Lancaster, Pampa's fourth case, who has resided at the R. E. Zell residence in Pampa for the past two months.

State health officials have announced that Texas had its worst polio week of the year last week, with 90 new cases reported in 33 counties.

Small Building in City Park Burns

Fire of an undetermined origin destroyed the small building recently moved to the City Park Saturday morning at about 2:30 o'clock.

The building was to have been remodeled and used as a concessions stand, although no work had been done on it to date.

Registration Dates Named For Draftees

A proclamation naming 17 days on which Texans 18 to 25 years of age will register for the selective service was issued last week by Governor Beauford Jester.

The days are as follows:
1. Persons born in 1922 after August 30, 1922, will register on Monday, August 30.
2. Persons born in 1923 will register on Tuesday, August 31, or Wednesday, September 1.
3. Persons born in 1924 will register on Thursday, September 2, or Friday, September 3.
4. Persons born in 1925 will register on Saturday, September 4, or Tuesday, September 7.
5. Persons born in 1926 will register on Wednesday, September 8, or on Thursday, September 9.
6. Persons born in 1927 will register on Friday, September 10, or Saturday, September 11.
7. Persons born in 1928 will register on Monday, September 13, or Tuesday, September 14.
8. Persons born in 1929 will register on Wednesday, September 15, or Thursday, September 16.
9. Persons born in 1930 will register on Friday, September 17, or Saturday, September 18.
10. Persons born on or after September 19, 1930, will register on the day they are 18 years of age, or five days after.

Groups exempted from registration are as follows:
1. Members of the armed forces on active duty, including members of the coast and geodetic survey and the public health service.
2. Cadets of the U. S. Military Academy and Coast Guard Academy.
3. Midshipmen of the U. S. Naval Academy.
4. Foreign diplomatic and consular representatives and members of their families who are not citizens of the U. S.
5. Other persons in the U. S. to be specified by the President who have not declared their intention to become U. S. citizens.

According to the proclamation, men may register late only when prevented by circumstances beyond their control. Men of registration age in foreign countries must present themselves for registration within five days after returning to the U. S. or its possessions.

Dr. Kritzler On Clinic Staff

Dr. James H. Kritzler was a member of the examining board of doctors for the Amarillo Osteopathic Hospital Staff Auxiliary's child health clinic held on Friday and Saturday at the Herring Hotel in Amarillo.

Dr. Mary E. Golden, professor emerita of Des Moines Still College of Osteopathy and Surgery, was coordinator for the clinic. Nearly 150 children were examined, and 90 per cent were declared to be in splendid physical condition.

Dr. Kritzler was also in Amarillo Sunday to attend a luncheon-meeting of District 1, Texas Association of Osteopathic Physicians and Surgeons. Dr. H. G. Grainger of Tyler, president of the state association, and Dr. Golden were principal speakers.

Tax Rate Cut Two Cents by Commissioners

The overall ad valorem tax for Gray County was lowered last week from 93 to 91 cents per hundred dollar valuation at a meeting of the County Commissioners Court.

The 91 cents rate, allowing a two cent tax drop, was divided by the court into five funds, with the following allocations to each: general fund, 26 cents; road and bridge, 21 cents; court house, jail and interest and sinking, 11 cents; hospital interest and sinking, 10 cents; permanent improvements, 8 cents. No levy was made for the jury fund this year, because funds now on hand are sufficient to care for the ensuing year, Judge Sherman White said.

The court house is almost paid for now, and will be paid out in the next three years, it has been announced.

Showing of Oil Results in Test North of McLean

A showing of oil has resulted in a test well now going down on the Thomas estate about four miles north and west of McLean, it has been learned here.

The well is now down to approximately 2,600 feet, although no details of the drilling were learned by The News this week.

The test is about four miles north of McLean, and a short distance west of the McLean-Lefors highway. Gas pressure Sunday blew some oil out of the well, it was reported, but no definite announcement of the size of the well has been made.

Citizens of McLean and the surrounding area—which includes parts of Gray, Wheeler, Collingsworth and Donley counties—will have the opportunity to receive a free chest X-ray next Tuesday.

Members of the McLean Lions Club were treated to a pictorial trip to Alaska at their regular meeting Tuesday, when C. E. (Chuck) Cooke, who recently returned from a trip to that territory, showed motion pictures taken during the trip. The films were shown at the Avalon Theatre.

Mr. and Mrs. Cooke and Mr. and Mrs. E. L. Sitter returned July 28 after being gone for 30 days on their vacation.

Cooke first showed pictures taken by the group when they left Yukon territory and entered Alaskan territory. He also has some films which were taken during their motoring of the Alcan highway, but did not show them due to the short time available Tuesday.

Many of the pictures showed native Eskimos. One reel of film which he did not take but bought in Alaska, depicted some of the native life. Cooke explained that he did not have time to make the trip to the territory which was shown in that film. Among the more interesting parts of the reel were pictures of bears feeding on fish which they catch in the small falls.

Another reel shown was taken during a 15-hour airplane trip which Cooke made to the Bering Straits. Mrs. Cooke and Mr. and Mrs. Sitter were also present.

100 THINGS

THIS WEEK more questions and answers from the booklet, "100 Things You Should Know About Communism in the U. S. A.," are published in The News. The booklet was prepared by the Committee on Un-American Activities of the U. S. House of Representatives. Here are more of the questions and answers:

26. But don't the Communists promise an end to racial and religious intolerance?
Yes, but in practice they have murdered millions for being religious and for belonging to a particular class. Your race would be no help to you under Communism. Your beliefs could get you killed.

27. Why shouldn't I turn Communist?
You know what the United States is like today. If you want it exactly the opposite, you should turn Communist. But before you do, remember you will lose your independence, your property, your freedom of mind. You will gain only a risky membership in a conspiracy which is ruthless, godless, and crushing upon all except a very few at the top.

28. How many Communists are there in the world?
There are 20,000,000 Communists, more or less, in a world of 2,295,125,000 people. In other words, about one person in 115 is a Communist, on a world basis.

29. How many people are now ruled by Communists?
About 200,000,000 directly; 200,000,000 indirectly, and an additional 250,000,000 are under daily Communist pressure to surrender.

30. Which countries are Communist controlled or governed?
Albania, Bulgaria, Czechoslovakia, Estonia, Finland,

Hungary, Latvia, Lithuania, Poland, Romania, Russia, Yugoslavia, important regions of Austria, Germany, Korea, Mongolia, and Manchuria. Communism is concentrating now on immediate capture of Afghanistan, China, France, Greece, Latin America, Iran, and Palestine. It has plans to seize every other country including the United States.

Having never before had a very good place to keep tools, garden and lawn equipment, etc., I have never accumulated much of that type of stuff. In moving to our new house, I found that I was sadly lacking in the necessary stuff to do a lot of little things that had to be done.

But Lester Dysart came to the rescue with his equipment, and I have been borrowing one or more things from him almost every day. He and Kathleen were both gone a few days when we were in the process of moving, and we ate his tomatoes from his small patch in his back yard. So you see in addition to loaning us stuff, the Dysarts have come in for their share of the grub. Neighbors like that are hard to find, but our new neighborhood seems to be full of them.

The portable X-ray unit of the State Department of Health will be in McLean one day, Tuesday, next week. The service is a mass affair, and all people over 15 years of age who live in the area are urged to get the X-ray picture made of their chests.

There is no cost to the individual. It is not free, not charity, but is paid for by state taxes which have already been collected.

The unit will be located next Tuesday at the Dysart Motor company building from 8 o'clock in the morning until 5 o'clock in the afternoon.

It will take you only two minutes to get the picture made. That's two minutes from the time you walk in the door, until you are free to walk out.

You do not have to undress. The X-rays are made while you are clothed. The only thing is that you must not have metal buttons on the upper part of your clothing, or they will show up on the X-ray.

I have heard some people say they do not want to know it if they have tuberculosis. That is a hard statement to make. Not only would these people be endangering their own lives, but the lives of their relatives and friends besides. In a way, you could class such people as willful murderers.

It has been found that only through X-rays can it be determined definitely whether T. B. is present. Some people spend a great deal of money annually just to be sure that they are free from T. B. Next Tuesday you can have the opportunity to find out about yourself free of charge.

If your X-ray shows that you have the dreaded disease, in any form, then the State Department of Health will notify you by mail. In addition, the county health officer will be notified. Your name will not be publicly broadcast as a bearer of T. B. It will be largely up to you to do something about it. T. B. can be cured, you know, if the person with the disease starts trying to get it cured soon enough.

Don't forget the time and place. It's next Tuesday, any time from 8 in the morning until 5 in the afternoon, at the Dysart Motor company.

The visit of the unit is being sponsored by the county medical and tuberculosis associations. If it proves successful, it will be made an annual affair. It's a worthy thing. Let's make it successful.

... Proposed Constitutional Amendments ...

S. J. R. No. 2
JOINT RESOLUTION
proposing an amendment to Section 1 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, to provide for a Board for apportioning the state into senatorial districts and representative districts in the event the Legislature fails to make such apportionment; providing for the issuance of the necessary proclamation by the Governor; and making appropriation.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 23 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to hereafter read as follows:

Section 23. The Legislature at its first regular session of each decennial census, shall make such apportionment, and shall be composed of five members, as follows: The Speaker of the House of Representatives, the Attorney General, the Comptroller of Public Accounts and the Auditor of the General Land Office, a majority of whom shall constitute a quorum. Said Board shall assemble in the City of Austin within ninety (90) days after the final adjournment of the regular session. The Board shall within sixty (60) days after assembling, apportion the state into senatorial or representative districts, or into senatorial or representative districts, as the case may be. Such apportionment shall be in writing and signed by three (3) or more members of the Board duly provided as the act and effect of law. Such apportionment shall become effective at the next succeeding general election. The Board shall have jurisdiction to compel such members to perform its duties in accordance with the provisions of this section by writ of mandamus or other extra-ordinary process conformable to the usages and customs of the law. The Legislature shall provide the necessary funds for clerical and technical aid and for expenses incidental to the duties of the Board, and the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall be entitled to receive per diem and travel expense during the Board's session in the same amount and manner as they receive while attending a regular session of the Legislature. This amendment shall become effective January 1, 1951."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1948, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the amendment to Section 23, Article III of the Constitution of Texas providing for a Board for apportionment of the state into senatorial districts and representative districts in the event the Legislature fails to make such apportionment."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury of this state not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

H. J. R. No. 7
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION
proposing an amendment to Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding a new Section to be known as Section 3a, so as to provide for succession to the office of Governor in the event the Governor-elect dies, or becomes disabled, or fails to qualify, before taking his oath of office as Governor; and providing for the issuance of the necessary proclamation and publication by the Governor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be and the same is hereby amended, by adding another Section to follow Section 3, and be designated Section 3a, to read as follows:

Section 3a. If, at the time the Legislature shall canvass the election returns for the offices of Governor and Lieutenant Governor, the person receiving the highest number of votes for the office of Governor, as declared by the Speaker, has died, then the person having the highest number of votes for the office of Lieutenant Governor shall act as Governor until after the next general election. It is further provided that in the event the person with the highest number of votes for the office of Governor, as declared by the Speaker, shall become disabled, or fail to qualify, then the Lieutenant Governor shall act as Governor until a person has qualified for the office of Governor, or until after the next general election. Any succession to the Governor shall not otherwise provided for in this Constitution may be provided for by law; provided, however, that any person succeeding to the office of Governor shall be qualified as otherwise provided in this Constitution, and shall, during the entire term to which he may succeed, be under all the restrictions and prohibitions imposed in this Constitution on the Governor."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at a General Election to be held throughout this State on the date provided by law in the month of November, A. D. 1948, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for gubernatorial succession in the event the Governor-elect dies, or becomes disabled, before qualifying and for such succession in other contingencies."

Section 3. Each voter at such election shall mark out one of such clauses on the ballot, leaving the clause expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Section 4. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 15 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

Section 15. All property, both real and personal, of the wife owned or claimed by her before marriage, and that acquired afterward by gift, devise or descent, shall be the separate property of the wife; and laws shall be passed more clearly defining the rights of the wife, in relation as well to her separate property as that held in common with her husband; provided that husband and wife, without prejudice to pre-existing creditors, may from time to time by written instrument if the wife were a feme sol partition between themselves in severalty or into equal undivided interests all or any part of their existing community property, or exchange between themselves the community interest of one spouse in any property for the community interest of the other spouse in other community property, whereupon the portion or interest set aside to each spouse shall be and constitute a part of the separate property of such spouse.

"This Amendment is self-operative, but laws may be passed prescribing requirements as to the form and manner of execution of such instruments, and providing for their recordation, and for such other reasonable requirements not inconsistent herewith as the Legislature may from time to time consider proper with relation to the subject of this Amendment. Should the Legislature pass an Act dealing with the subject of this Amendment and prescribing requirements as to the form and manner of the execution of such instruments and providing for their recordation and other reasonable requirements not inconsistent herewith and anticipatory hereto, such Act shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character and shall take effect just as though this Constitutional Amendment was in effect when the Act was passed."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State of Texas at an election to be held throughout the State on the second day of November, 1948, at which election all voters favoring said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that husband and wife from time to time may in writing partition between themselves in severalty or into undivided interests community property existing at the time of partition so as to convert same into separate property of the respective spouses without prejudice to the rights of pre-existing creditors."

Those opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that husband and wife from time to time may in writing partition between themselves in severalty or into undivided interests community property existing at the time of partition so as to convert same into separate property of the respective spouses without prejudice to the rights of pre-existing creditors."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

H. J. R. No. 13
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION
amending Section 15 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto a provision that the husband and wife from time to time may in writing partition between themselves in severalty or into undivided interests all or any part divided interests all or any part of their community property, whereupon without prejudice to the right of existing creditors the portion or interest set aside to each spouse shall be and constitute a part of the separate property of such spouse; further providing that such Constitutional Amendment if adopted shall be self-operative and self-executing, providing for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof.

Article VIII of the Constitution be amended so as to be and read as follows:

Section 1-a. From and after January 1, 1951, no State ad valorem tax shall be levied upon any property within this State for general revenue purposes. From and after January 1, 1951, the several counties of the State are authorized to levy ad valorem taxes upon all property within their respective boundaries for county purposes, except the first Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) value of residential homesteads, not to exceed thirty cents (30c) on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation, in addition to all other ad valorem taxes authorized by the Constitution of this State, provided the revenue derived therefrom shall be used for construction and maintenance of Farm to Market Roads or for Flood Control, except as herein otherwise provided.

"Provided that in those counties or political subdivisions or areas of the State from which tax donations have heretofore been granted, the State Automatic Tax Board shall continue to levy the full amount of the State ad valorem tax for the duration of such donation, or until all obligations heretofore authorized by the law granting such donation or donations shall have been fully discharged, whichever shall first occur; provided that if such donation to any such county or political subdivision is for less than the full amount of State ad valorem taxes so levied, the portion of such taxes remaining over and above such donation shall be retained by said county or subdivision."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the date fixed by law for the General Election in November, A. D. 1948, at which time all ballots shall have printed thereon "FOR the Constitutional Amendment of Section 1-a of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that no ad valorem tax shall be levied for State general revenue purposes after January 1, 1951, and authorizing the several counties to levy additional ad valorem taxes, providing for a Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) residential homestead exemption, and providing for tax levies in counties having tax donations, and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment of Section 1-a of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that husband and wife from time to time may in writing partition between themselves in severalty or into undivided interests community property existing at the time of partition so as to convert same into separate property of the respective spouses without prejudice to the rights of pre-existing creditors."

Those opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that husband and wife from time to time may in writing partition between themselves in severalty or into undivided interests community property existing at the time of partition so as to convert same into separate property of the respective spouses without prejudice to the rights of pre-existing creditors."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

H. J. R. No. 30
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION
proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto another Section to be designated as "Section 90" to authorize counties of this State to provide insurance for county employees; providing for the Governor's proclamation, and submission to the electorate.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article III of the State Constitution be and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto another Section following Section 59, to be designated "Section 90" to read as follows:

"Section 90. The Legislature shall have the power to pass such laws as may be necessary to provide Workman's Compensation Insurance, including the right to provide its own insurance risk, for all county employees as in its judgment is necessary or required; and the Legislature shall provide suitable laws for the administration of such insurance in the counties of this State and for the payment of the costs, charges and premiums on such policies of insurance and the benefits to be paid thereunder."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the date fixed by law for the General Election in November, A. D. 1948, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon "FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing Workman's Compensation Insurance for county employees." Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter may vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

H. J. R. No. 35
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION
proposing an amendment to Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the assessed taxable value of all residence homesteads as now defined by law shall be exempt from all taxation for all State purposes; providing for the effective date; providing for the submission of said amendment to a vote of the qualified voters at an election and providing for necessary proclamation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Sections 1-b and 1-c be added to Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas to read as follows:

Section 1-b. Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the assessed taxable value of all residence homesteads as now defined by law shall be exempt from all taxation for all State purposes.

Section 1-c. Provided, however, the terms of this Resolution shall not be effective unless House Joint Resolution No. 24 is adopted by the people and in no event shall this Resolution go into effect until January 1, 1951."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the date fixed by law for the General Election in November, A. D. 1948, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon the following words:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment exempting Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the assessed taxable value of all residence homesteads from all State taxes."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment. 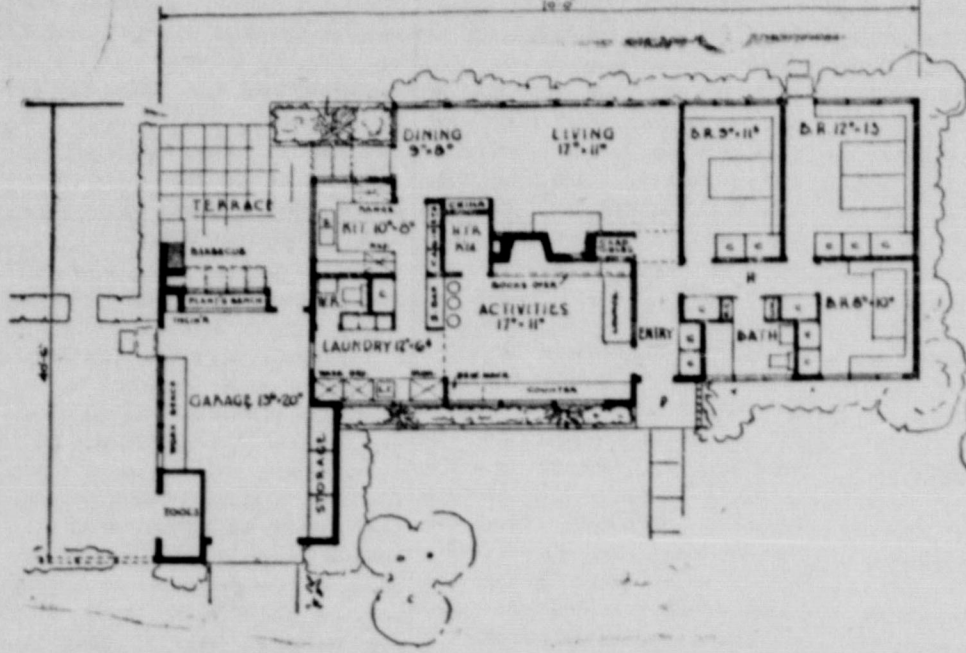
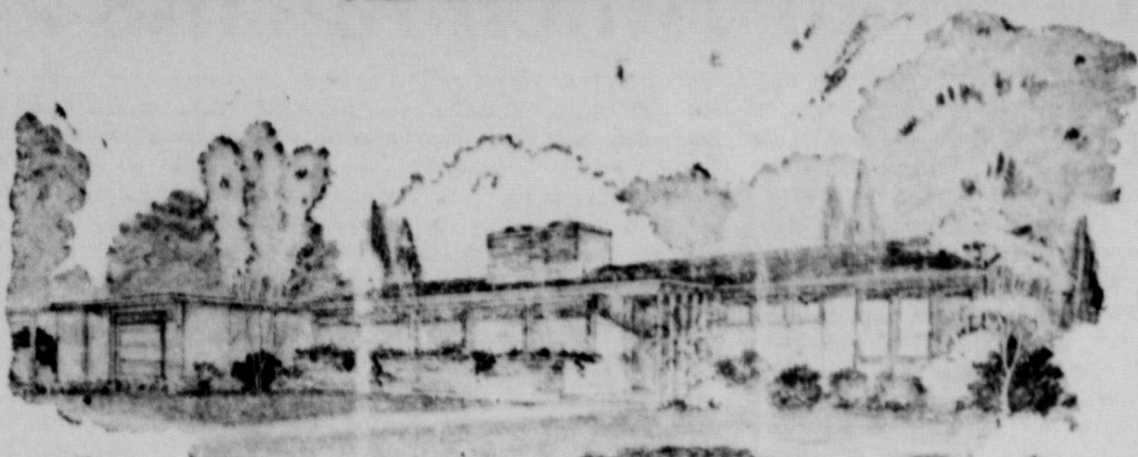

Appendicitis Kills 60 Texans In Five Months

Sixty Texans died as the result of appendicitis during the first five months of 1948, according to figures released by the Texas State Department of Health.

"This figure does not appear large when compared to the deaths from cancer, tuberculosis, and heart disease," Dr. George W. Cox, state health officer, said, "but with the knowledge that these 60 Texans died needlessly, the figure is tragically high."

More than anything else, Dr. Cox said he would attribute fatality in appendicitis to the complacent attitude of the people concerning the disease. It is not put in its "proper perspective." Too often, the health officer said, people have the vain hope that the prolonged pain in their stomach will "wear off." He cautioned that the stomach ache which lasts more than three or four hours should be considered a serious matter.

Appendicitis killed 60,000 people in the United States and Canada last year, Dr. Cox said. He warned that young adults are especially susceptible to attacks, and that appendicitis is a leading cause of death among children and adolescents.

"Operative techniques have been improved to the extent that an unruptured appendix can be removed with great safety," Dr. Cox said. "It is therefore apparent that the negligence in appendicitis rests with the patient who fails to seek prompt medical attention."

He said it was imperative that the patient lie quiet until the doctor comes, as moving about disturbs the inflamed parts. He strongly urged against taking laxatives in cases of suspected appendicitis.

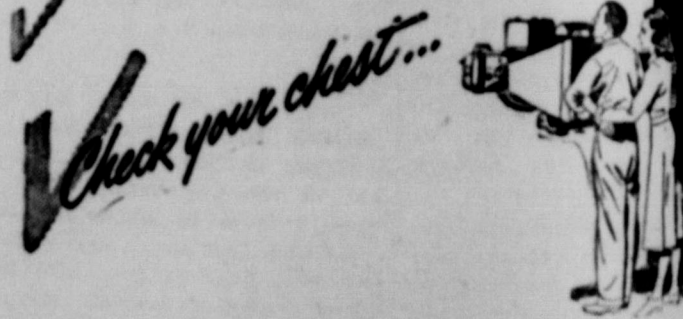

added to the principal, gives an average annual interest and principal requirement of \$9,320. The assessed valuation of the city is something like \$750,000, and \$1.25 tax—the maximum the attorney general and market attorneys will approve for debt service—will raise, at 100 per cent collections, \$9,375, or at 90 per cent collections—the maximum the attorneys will approve—\$8,437.50. Even if the city could issue \$40,000—3 1/2 per cent bonds, maturing serially over 20 years—the average annual requirement on these bonds would be \$2,920, which, added to the \$9,320, would make \$12,200 approximate principal and interest requirements.

"You can readily see that the bonds could not be approved. Even with \$1.50, the maximum tax rate, on \$750,000 assessed valuation, the city could raise only \$11,250.

"As you know, the city is in fine shape, due to its fine revenue received from the waterworks, gas and sewer systems. I note that the net revenue, after operation, of those three systems will run some \$27,000 per year, which no doubt will operate the city; yet, the attorney general, I am sure, just would not approve any additional bonds on the city for tax purposes, with the present outstanding debt as short as it is."

Infant Mortality Rate Is Lowest In State History

Infant mortality rates in Texas are at their lowest in the history of the state, according to figures released by the Bureau of Vital Statistics of the State Health Department. Infant mortality has reached a low of 41.2 deaths for every 1000 live births.

Compared to the figures for 1940, this represents a reduction of more than 39 per cent. In

that year, there were 197,023 live births and 8,685 deaths. But despite these gains, Texas still has the sixth highest infant mortality rate in the United States, with 42 states reporting lower rates.

Dr. George W. Cox, state health officer, attributes the reduction to the increase in public response to the educational efforts of the Texas State Department of Health.

"We have reason for pride in our reduced infant and maternal mortality when it is realized that the reduction means in excess of

5,000 babies are being saved annually which would have otherwise died," Dr. Cox said. "In addition, the birth rate is higher than the 1940 figure by more than 7 1/2 per cent."
