The Maude Lewis and Emmet A. Powell Unit No. 1 drilling a. 4320 feet, had a bare showing of oil Granite was struck at 2310 seet, according to the drilling company, C. and H. Drilling Co., and the oil showing was very light. The test is being made by the Warren Oil Corporation and is located 10% miles southeast of McLean in Collingswirth County. The Lewis-Powell test is in a vicinity where there are no oil

wells, although there are a number of gas wells. It is about two miles south and slightly east of the Longan No. 1 on the Hugh Baptist Hour Grogan place, which was plugged several weeks ago.
