## Denial of Injunction Is Issued by Judge

A denial to the action for a temporary restraining writ of injunction of a group of Alanreed citizens vs. the State Highway Department was turned in Monday morning by Judge Lewis Goodrich in district court in Pampa.

The denial followed the hearing which was held Friday.

The Alanreed group sought the restraining action against the proposed new route of U. S. Highway 66, which would by-pass Alanreed.

May 10 has been set as the date for the jury hearing for the Alanreed group, when the plaintiff will seek a permanent writ of injunction.

Alleging that the highway department had used an "abuse of discretion" in setting up the proposed route of 66 so that Alanreed would be by-passed, the group of citizens also alleged that additional hazards, more intersections and crossings would be created.

Engineers, however, stated that safety was a primary consideration in setting up the new route, and that they were considering the new route from the viewpoint of the greater safety of the public at large. They said the primary reason for the change of the route was a six-degree curve now approaching Alanreed, which created a hazard.

Following this testimony, the plaintiff counsel produced a letter from DeWitt Greer, state highway engineer, which stated the primary reason for the change of route was the fact that 200 feet of right-of-way could not be obtained through Alanreed.

The counsel then alleged that the route of the highway had been brought through Shamrock and McLean without 200 feet of right-of-way, charging that if Alanreed was by-passed for this reason it would be discrimination against the citizens of Alanreed.

Among witnesses for the plaintiff to state they believe there is no adequate reason for the change of route were L. L. Palmer, W. J. Ball, and A. H. Moreman. G. K. Reading, resident highway engineer of Pampa, said traffic would be able to move with greater ease and safety on the proposed route, and that highways must be built with an eye to the future.

Attorneys in the case said that no precedent case could be found

in legal records. Other similar cases mostly involve property rights, not a primary point of contention in this case.

At one point the plaintiff counsel said, "If the arbitrary power of 'boards' in this country keeps increasing, the people will have no rights left—we might as well do away with the courts. It has already been established that the people have no property rights, and now we want to know if they have any right of protection."

## Via Announces Candidacy for Gray Attorney

B. S. Via, long-time attorney of Pampa, has authorized The News to announce his candidacy for the office of County Attorney, subject to action of the Democratic primaries this summer.

Via, who announced his candidacy in Pampa several weeks ago, was in McLean Saturday in the interest of his campaign.

He has lived in Pampa for the past 21 years, and has been practicing law during that time. The office he seeks is now held by Bruce L. Parker, who already has announced his candidacy for the office of county judge.

In making his announcement, Via stated that he would try to see each voter before election time, but that he wanted to take this means of soliciting the support and influence of everyone.

## Application for Radio Station For Area Filed

An application for a standard radio broadcasting station in Shamrock to serve the neighboring towns of McLean, Wheeler, Erick, and Wellington, has been filed with the Federal Communications Commission in Washington by a group of East Pampa newspaper men.

Announcement of the application for a 250-watt daytime station to operate on a frequency of 1570 kilocycles, was made by the FCC in Washington Monday.

The broadcasting company is a partnership comprised of Albert Cooper and Arval Montgomery of Shamrock, Lester Campbell of McLean, and J. C. Howell of Wheeler. The four men own and operate The Shamrock Texan, The McLean News, and The Wheeler Times, and ownership of the proposed station will be equally shared by the three newspapers. An expenditure of \$35,000 is contemplated.

A 450-foot-square tract of land on U. S. Highway 83, one-half mile north of the intersection with U. S. Highway 66, is the proposed site. The acreage is located across the highway west of the Shamrock Livestock Auction barn. In the southeast corner of a large tract owned by Rev. Ed R. Wallace, from whom an option on the radio site was secured.

The studio and transmitter will be in the same building, near a 200-foot steel tower which will be in the center of the plot.

Application for permit to construct the station to serve McLean and other towns is the culmination of more than a year's study by the four newspaper men. The owners of the proposed station visited a score of cities in Texas and Oklahoma in mapping their plans for the project and it is believed the proposed broadcasting station can be of unlimited public service to their area.

It is their plan to utilize the station's facilities to the fullest extent in publicizing churches, schools, clubs, and organizations of the five towns and many rural communities. Religion, education, agriculture, news, public forum, (Continued on back page)

## Election for Recreation Program Is Called After Petition Received

### Annual Red Cross Fund Drive Begins Tuesday of Next Week

The annual fund drive of the McLean chapter of the American Red Cross will begin Tuesday of next week, Maurice Mullanax, roll call chairman, announced this week.

The downtown portion has been divided into four sections, Mullanax said, with the following workers assigned: D. A. Davis, northeast section; Bob Shedrick, Clifford Allison, and Emory Crockett, northwest section; Earl Graham and Bill Howard, southwest section; and C. W. Bogan, southeast section.

Workers for the residential part of town will be named before the end of the week, Mullanax said.

Quota for the McLean area has been set at \$800, Mullanax said. National quota is \$75,000,000.

In McLean this week was the Red Cross field representative, Miss Kathryn OHL. Miss Gill appeared before members of the Lions Club at their regular meet-

ing Tuesday and spoke on the Red Cross and its work.

In a review of the activities of the Red Cross in Texas during the past year, it was pointed out that in this state alone the organization expended more than \$1,361,000 in aiding in disasters.

Fires were the most frequent disasters in Texas in 1947, with people being aided in Galveston County, Montgomery County, Lexington, San Antonio, Bexar County, and Aransas County.

In this immediate area, aid was given to tornado-stricken people in Lipscomb and Hemphill Counties when the twister hit that area last April.

Aid extended to the victims of all these tragedies, excluding that of Texas City, has amounted, to date, to over \$250,000. In accordance with Red Cross policy this aid was given, not loaned, on the basis of need, not loss, to those without adequate resources of their own.

## Local Boxers To Meet Indians Friday Night

McLean's newest team of sportsmen, the Tiger boxers, will meet the Quannah Indians in the grade school gym here Friday night for the second evening of home bouts this season. The fights are scheduled to start at 7 o'clock.

This is the third attempt of the Quannah boxers to engage the local boys. Two other scheduled fights were called off due to inclement weather, when the Indians were unable to reach McLean.

The first home fights were held last Friday night, when the powerful Rocket boxers of Wellington paid a visit. Wellington copped all bouts except two. Two bouts were won by Jack Brooks, who scored a quick knockout against his opponent in the first round, and Johnny Vineyard, who outpointed his opponent in the three rounds.

Boxing has not been a regular part of the Tiger athletic program for several years, and for this reason, all members of the team are inexperienced. All contestants showed up extremely well last Friday, however, against the experienced Rockets. Wellington has had a boxing team for the past several years, and had already engaged in four or five matches this season.

Admission to the fights will be 75 cents for adults, 50 cents for high school students, and 25 cents for grade school students, want to ask.

## Elk City Doctor Meets With Hospital Board

Dr. Fred Shadid, chief of staff of the Elk City, Okla., community hospital, was in McLean Wednesday to inspect the building for the proposed McLean community hospital, and to aid members of the board of directors in preliminary work.

Dr. Shadid first met with the board, and then went through the building, pointing out changes in the interior which might be necessary.

The directors have called a meeting of all members and any others who are interested, to be held Tuesday night, March 16.

At that time, Dr. Shadid will be present to answer questions, and to furnish an estimate of the cost in equipping the hospital. In the meantime, the directors will furnish the Elk City doctor with a floor plan of the building here, and with estimates of the cost of remodeling the building so that it will be suitable for use as the hospital.

When Dr. Shadid returns to McLean March 16 to the open meeting, he will have his estimates of the equipment cost ready. He will also advise the board of means of buying equipment at lower costs, and will be prepared to answer any questions concerning the hospital which members or others may want to ask.

## Calls for Levy Of Not More Than 3 Mills

Following the receipt of a petition signed by the necessary number of qualified voters of the city, members of the City Council, in a special meeting Wednesday morning, called an election, to be held at the regular city election April 6, seeking approval of a city-financed recreation program in McLean.

The election order calls for a vote to determine "whether or not a recreation program shall be established and maintained" by the city, and the levying of a tax not to exceed three mills of each one dollar of taxable value of the property in the city.

The petition was circulated following an editorial which appeared in The News several weeks ago. The editorial pointed out the need of some type of summer recreation in McLean, and suggested that a program be started this year. Later a reader of the paper suggested that the program be financed through the city by means of a small tax levy.

The petition, in asking that such an election be called, stated that the program should be run by a recreation board of not more than five members, the board to be appointed by the City Council.

Sponsors of the petition turned it in to the council as soon as possible, in order that the election could be held at the same time as the regular city election, thereby saving the expense of a special election.

In addition to voting on the question of the recreation program, voters will also ballot on choices for three aldermen. The terms of O. G. Stokely, Ed Lander, and John Cooper expire this year.

## Eleven Soil Plans Okayed

Eleven soil and moisture conservation plans were approved when the Gray County soil conservation supervisors held their regular monthly meeting at Pampa last Friday afternoon.

Farmers whose plans were approved included Arlie Carpenter, Charlie Carpenter, Boyd Meador, Leroy Williams, Perry Everett, Foreman Stubbs, H. M. Roth, H. H. Keahy, Clyde Carruth, Ernest Godfrey, and Bruce Bull. A total of 7,484 acres are included in farms owned by these men.

The plans were developed with assistance from the Gray County work unit of the Soil Conservation Service, which is cooperating in carrying out work in the district. Five applications for assistance were also approved by the supervisors.

There was considerable discussion of various matters which are involved in getting the work under way in the district. One of the most urgent of these is the securing of a special drill for planting pasture grasses, and it is hoped that such a drill can be secured for use this spring.

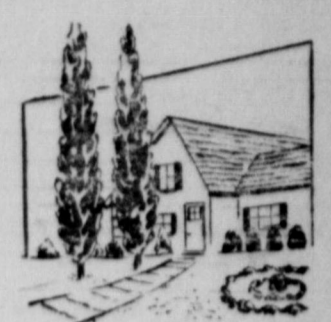

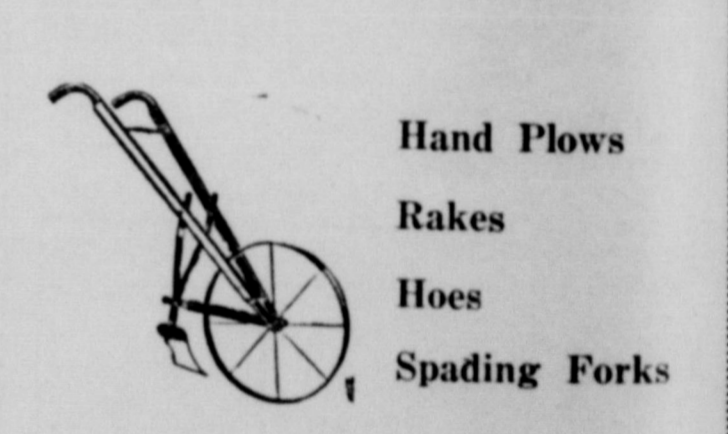
