

Lefors Auto Crash Takes Two Lives

Monroe Caldwell of McLean, 28 years of age, died of injuries in a Pampa hospital a few hours after a two-car crash here early Sunday morning. The injured are Mrs. Lefors and Thelma Videlle Van Lefors, of near Lefors, who was killed in the same accident. She was 17 years of age.

Other persons were injured in the crash, which occurred about 1:45 o'clock Sunday morning. The injured are Mrs. Caldwell of McLean; William James O'Neal, 33, of 2305 First, Amarillo; Margaret Richards, 29, of 1900 East Amarillo; Kenneth Troy and Mrs. Gibson, and Mr. and Mrs. E. J. Windom.

John F. Studer Seeks County Attorney Office

The McLean News has been authorized to announce the candidacy of John F. Studer for County Attorney of Gray County, subject to the Democratic primary election.

Mr. Studer's statement follows: "I am a candidate for County Attorney of Gray County, Texas, and want your vote and influence. "I will, at all times, conduct the criminal matters coming within the jurisdiction of the office without prejudice or bias, and at all times I will vigorously prosecute those who willfully violate the penal laws of our state, though I will personally see that no impositions are worked upon the people of this county. "It will be my purpose to meet all of you personally, but if I should be so unfortunate as to miss some of you, I hope that you will still support my candidacy."

B. E. Ferrell of Pampa has authorized The McLean News to announce his candidacy for the office of County Judge of Gray County subject to the will of the people in the Democratic primary.

He states that he is not sponsored by any organization of any kind, but is making the race on his own merits and qualifications; that he has been a citizen of Gray County 12 years; prior to moving to Gray County he was a citizen of Carson County; that he has a wife and one granddaughter dependent on him for support; that he has had 25 years experience in the lumber and construction field.

"If elected my policy will be to cooperate with the commissioners court to the fullest of my ability, and with all the officers of Gray County to the end that Gray County may be a better place to live and rear a family; to promote anything that will benefit the entire county and at the same time keep ever in mind the welfare of the taxpayers; to cooperate with the juvenile officer to the end that there may not be a single Gray County youth sent to the reform school or any other penal institution; to go into office with only one obligation, that being to the entire people; to so handle the affairs of the office that each citizen of the county shall have just and fair returns for their tax money. And last but not least to devote my time to the affairs of the office," he stated.

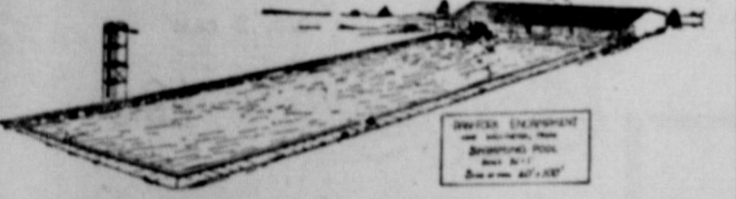
Sitter Is Named Finance Officer

Candle holders, fashioned from horseshoes and painted silver, held two candles at various intervals on the tables. Miniature cowboys were used as containers for peanuts. Favors for the men present were small scabbards with toy pistols. Favors for the women were miniature oil lamps. Place cards were attached to the favors.

And the napkins were genuine bandana handkerchiefs. The food consisted of Indian fire water (tomato juice), branded beef (barbecued beef), stuffed steers (stuffed potatoes), frijoles (red beans), red rocks of the mesa (beets), fool's gold (apricots), sourdough and saddle soap (rolls and butter), cactus salad

(lettuce and tomato salad), prickly pears (pickles), cup o' spurs (coffee), rangers' delight (sherbet), and desert chips (cake). The barbecued beef was prepared by June Woods of McLean and Dan Deen of Merkel. Deen, who recently moved from here to Merkel, made the trip back to prepare the beef.

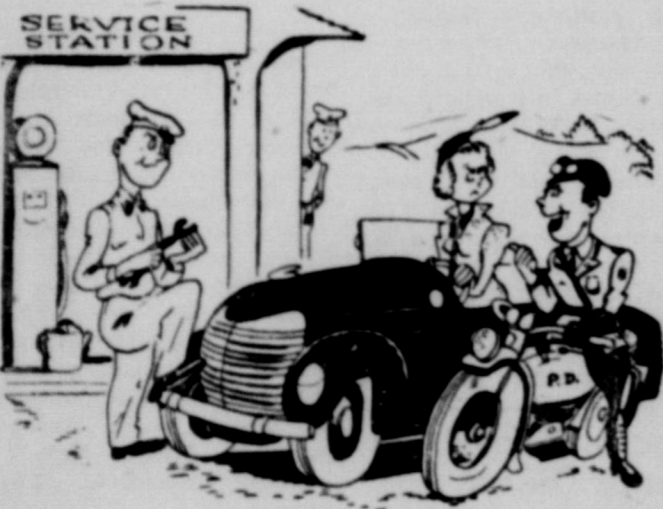

Vacationists Get Advice on Water Sports

Seasonal advice to vacationists concerning the proper precautions to be used in water sports was released this week from the State Health Department by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer.

Lakes and pools of unknown depth, and streams of unfamiliar currents are often the site of picnics and excursions, and the usual lifeguard supervision associated with bathing beaches and commercial swimming pools is, of course, not available in such places.

"Swimming and water sports are beneficial to good health, provided one's physical condition justifies this type of exercise," Dr. Cox asserted. "Nevertheless, they possess dangerous possibilities if the rules of safety are disregarded through carelessness or

thoughtlessness." The state health officer outlined the following simple rules for bathing and swimming safety: at least one hour should elapse after a meal before entering the water; upon the first indication of fatigue, come ashore, and don't re-enter the water; if chilled, leave the water immediately; do not enter the water when overheated; learn to float—this is important; never attempt to rock a boat in a spirit of fun; and never swim in water that may be polluted.

I am still wondering if we will ever get the streets marked. Mrs. J. A. Sparks told me recently she knows her street name and house number. Do you?

Like you, I am wondering when the recreation program will get underway. The program idea carried at the polls in the city election by a 3-to-1 majority, indicating that by far the larger number of people are in favor of such a program.

Schools will dismiss in another week or so, and the program should get underway immediately after that. But it can't and won't if there is none, and if no one is employed to take charge. Well . . .

M. D. Bentley has handed me some pertinent figures comparing the U. S. and Russia (a country which some people in our country seem to like fairly well). These figures were compiled by the Texas Association of Employers, San Antonio, from statistics furnished by the U. S. government. I assume they are correct figures, and, as a matter of fact, have no reason to doubt the veracity of them.

You can buy daily food for five people in the U. S. by working three hours, or by working nine hours in Russia.

To buy a pair of cotton stockings in the U. S. you have to work one hour, but it takes 24 hours in Russia.

A cotton shirt in the U. S. can be bought with the earnings of three hours labor, but in Russia you would have to work 320 hours to get enough to buy the same shirt.

Woolen gloves can be bought with earnings from two hours labor in the U. S., but only after 100 hours of work in Russia.

Here you can work four hours and earn enough to buy an alarm clock, but in Russia you would have to work 160 hours.

In 15 minutes you can make enough in the U. S. to buy a toothbrush, but it would take four hours to do that in Russia.

A ladies' coat can be bought here with earnings from 75 hours work, but the same coat in Russia would cost you 1000 hours of work.

For 30 hours work in the U. S. you can buy a wrist watch. But the same watch would require a total of 1600 hours of work in the Red country.

Three hours labor will bring you enough to buy a pair of galoshes here, but you would have to work 160 hours there.

And in ten minutes, you can earn enough to buy a bottle of beer. In Russia it would take you eight hours.

In the U. S., there is an auto-

mobile for every four persons, in Russia one for every 252; 46.2 per cent of the U. S. people have the advantages of electrical service, but only 5 per cent in Russia have it.

There are 1,749 daily papers in the U. S., all with freedom of the press, but in Russia there are only 28, none with freedom of the press.

U. S. people have one radio for every three persons; Russians have one for every 45 persons. There is one telephone for every five U. S. people, but only one for every 188 Russians.

At the bottom of the statistics provided me by Mr. Bentley is the following message, which I consider worth reprinting:

"No nation on earth, regardless of its form of government, ever gave to human beings so much liberty and material prosperity as our own constitutional form of freedom. We started out as 13 little states, ridden by poverty and threatened by savages. We were, however, blessed by God. We now represent the utmost in individual freedom and individual prosperity. Compare our United States with any other land on earth. The workingman here is a king compared to the workingman in any other country. Nearly all of us have modern homes—electric lights and power—gas cooking—telephones—automobiles—automatic refrigeration—electric washers and irons—radios—insurance policies. Most of us own bonds and have money in the bank, plus a thousand and one other conveniences and luxuries.

"Are we ready to exchange all this for the crazy promises of some foreign crackpot? Isn't it time for us to thank God for America and our many blessings? Isn't it about time that we wake up and do a real job of selling America as it is?"

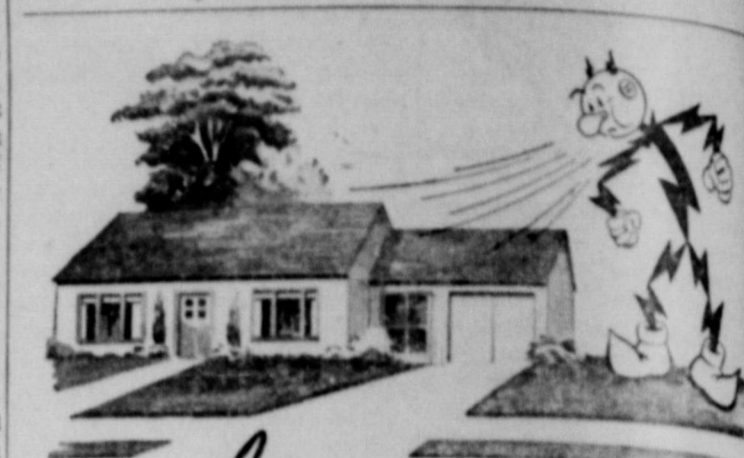

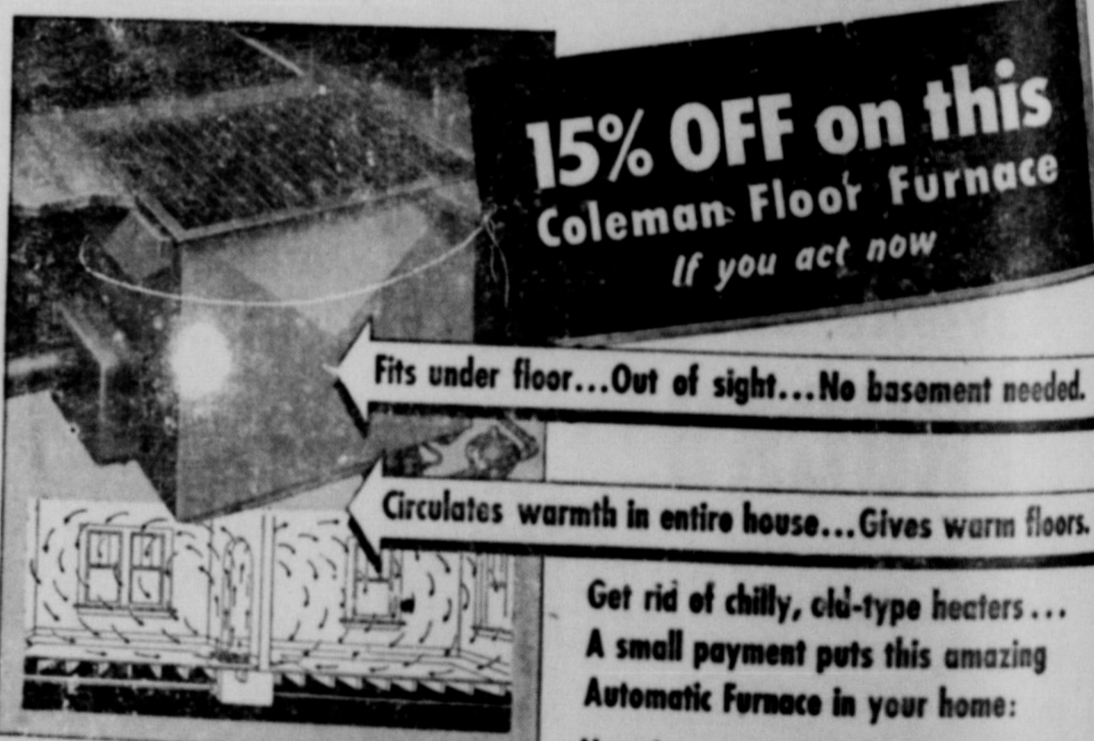

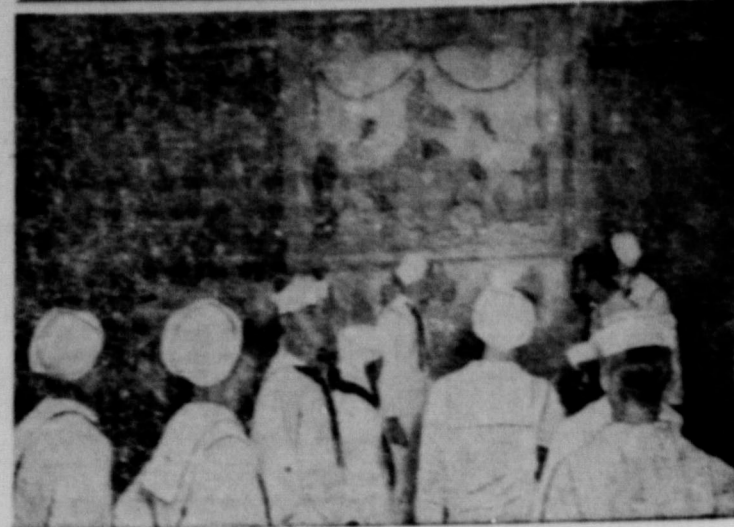

The new line to McLean will eventually serve residents in the Back community. Laterals to residences in that area are now being engineered, and will be installed as soon as possible, Meharg said.

The new district includes McLean, Pampa, Alanreed, Lefors, Wheeler, Miami, Mobeetie, and Skellytown, and several smaller communities and will be served out of Pampa. Formerly McLean was serviced out of Borger. The new district set-up was effective May 1, the local manager stated.

"Two new power plants will be placed in use during this month, and others are now in the process of being planned for future use. Use of electrical service is gradually growing through the years, and it is our purpose to stay ahead of the increase in use through the installation of new plants."
