From the four, Watson dried right end for the marker. His kick was no good and the score was 6-0. In the second period, McLean got on downs on the McLean 34. Watson tried right end again, going to the 47. Vineyard passed to Bailey to the Canadian 77. Bruner plunged thru the middle to the 34. From there, Watson went around right end 34 yards to the second down. His kick was blocked,

and the score stood at 12-0. There was no scoring in the third quarter, although the Wildcats started from their own 29 and worked down to the McLean 20 before losing the ball on downs. Early in the final period, McLean got down to the Canadian 31, losing the ball on downs. Hernandez tried one pass, and then Farnsworth went to the 33. In the next play, Hernandez' pass was intercepted by Cooper on the Canadian 42, and he returned to the 28. Bruner picked up two

yards, and then Watson went around the right end again, cutting back through tackle to make it to the five. A 5-yard penalty set the Tigers back to the ten, from where Watson went around the right end again for the third touchdown. A bad pass from center made it impossible to try the kick, and the score was 18-0. The Wildcats made a desperate comeback. Starting from their own 36, they worked the ball in eight plays to the McLean 11. The Tiger line held, however, and McLean took the ball on downs. The game ended a few plays later.

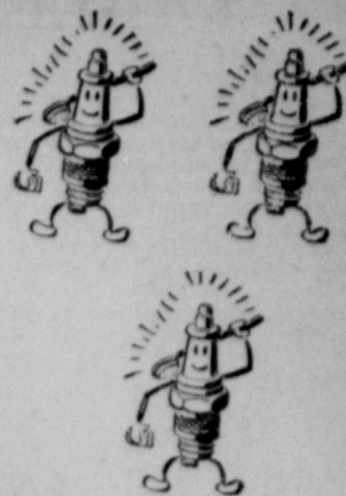

## TABLETS of the TIMES

This week and next a vast young army of 32 million boys and girls will start trooping into classrooms where they will be confronted by 1,200,000 teachers in about 90,000 independent school districts. It will be the greatest legion of young people ever enrolled in elementary and high schools. Nearly every youngster will have in his possession the familiar school tablet and is likely to use between three and 15 of them by the end

of the term next spring. This worthy American invention supplanted the slate with its soapstone and grimy erasing rag about 80 years ago, thus revolutionizing the teaching techniques in education. The tablet provides constant edification for students. And sometimes, as illustrated tablet tops here show, it makes a fine historical comment on contemporary affairs.



Topsy was the name of a little girl in fiction who was well-known throughout much of the world nearly a century ago. So famous was she, in fact, that John C. Blair put Topsy's picture on the cover of the first tablet, which he invented at Huntingdon, Pa., in 1873.



This tablet top, in use 1885-1911, did not sell well at first, as merchants thought slates could not be replaced.



1892—This one was considered "very daring" for small children.

### COVERS ARE COLLECTORS' ITEMS

Tablet covers shown here were collected from old established companies still in business, among them the firm founded by the inventor in Pennsylvania. Today, these school necessities are sold in the multiple millions all through the year and are as widely used in the nation's remaining 75,000 one-room schools as they are in the modern consolidated districts. Only a few slates are still in use. Today's tablet tops reflect current interests. They are likely to picture movie stars, the latest airplanes, often conservation or educational messages.

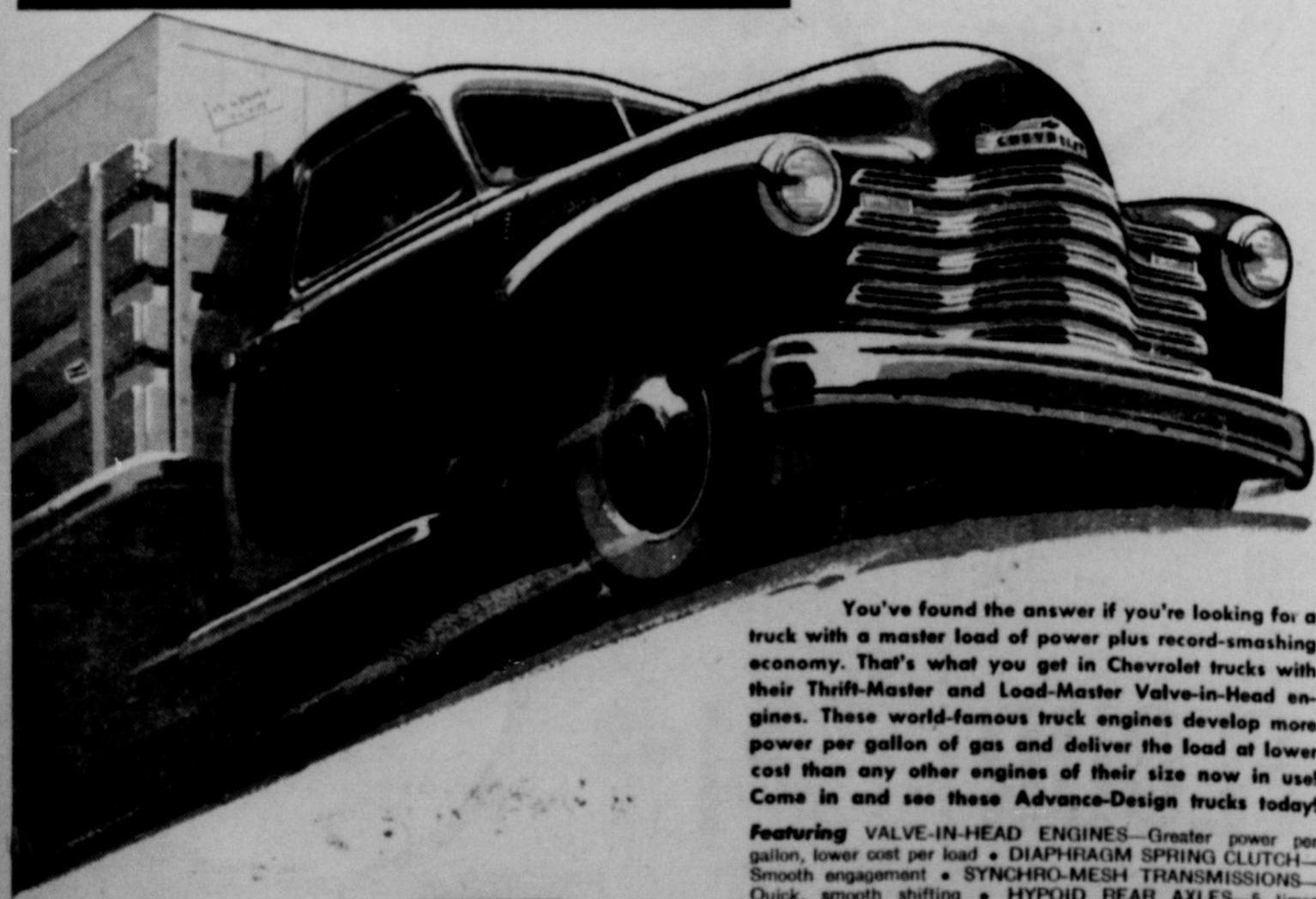

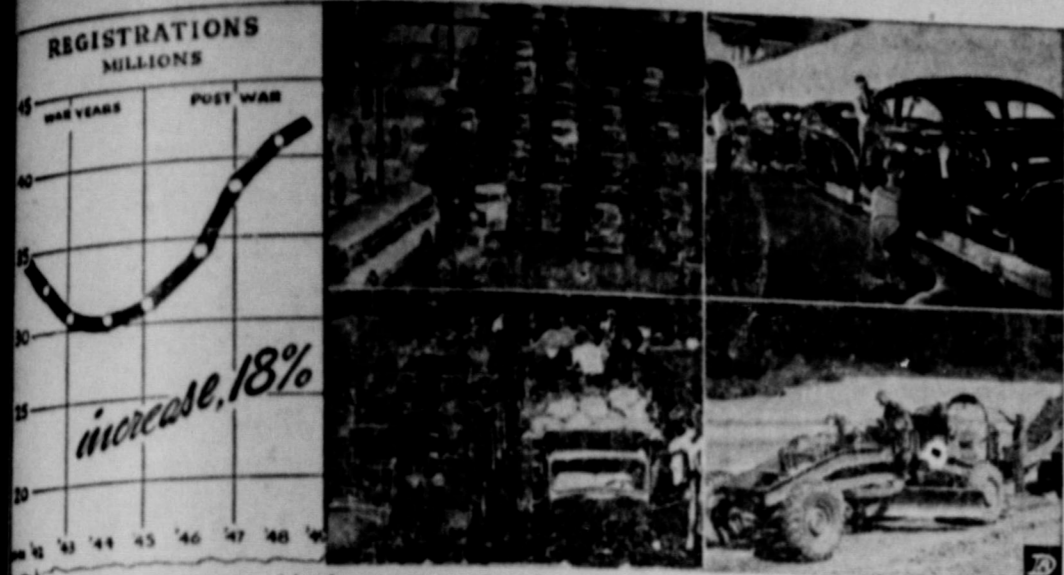

**Automotive Industry Moves Ahead**



Automotive production at record levels, more automotive jobs than ever before, motor vehicle travel sets new record! This is the story of progress just revealed in the automotive industry by the Automobile Manufacturers Association.

**DETROIT**—In the first six months of 1949, the automotive industry produced nearly 3,000,000 new cars, trucks and buses—almost as many units as were turned out in the full year of 1948. A steady increase has been registered since the industry surmounted its war reconversion problems. A 55% gain in production was made in 1947 over 1946, and a 10% gain was registered in 1948 over the preceding year. The half year of 1949 is up 20% from the first six months of 1948.

Industry jobs jumped from 6,780,000 in 1941 to 9,070,000 in 1948. This means one out of every seven job holders in the nation earns his wages in the highway transportation industry. These jobs cover manufacturing, building, sales and service, trucking and miscellaneous work.

Main street is dotted with more businesses keyed to highway transportation, and over 90% of them are small concerns, employing less than 20 employees each. Business accounts for 56% of all car trips, social and recreational driving a 16% of the total, shopping 12% and other purposes 16%. Rural travel climbed from 169 billion miles in 1941 to 197 billion in 1948. Urban travel increased from 163 billion miles in 1941 to 203 billion in 1948.

Governmental agencies are collecting an all-time high in automotive dollars. Special taxes alone now exceed \$1 billion annually, with motor trucks accounting for more than a third of the total. One of the largest tax items is the federal excise levy on new motor vehicles. First invoked as a "temporary emergency measure" in 1932, it has been increased twice since, instead of being repealed.

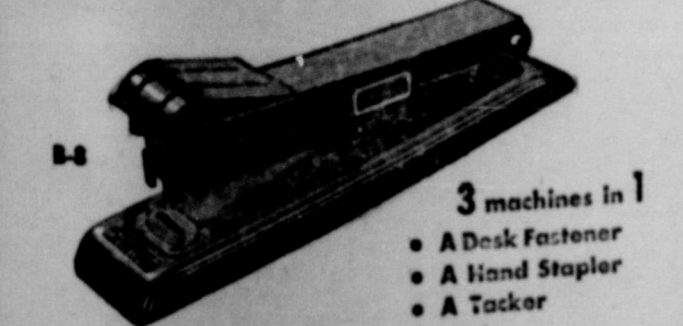

and the third day out Franklin became sick with malaria. His fever rose to 105 degrees, and we were afraid to try to carry him back the 180 miles to Nairobi. One of the white guides suggested we take him to a native village about 24 miles away, where there was one of the native witch doctors, but we decided to wait 30 more minutes. We soaked his feet in hot water, gave him aspirin, and his fever dropped one degree in the 30-minute period. The second day after that he was feeling well enough to return to Nairobi.

We got our elephants, one each for Bert and me, on the 7th and 8th days out. The permit to hunt elephants cost us \$50, and we sold the tusks for \$432. A nice little profit there. The tusks we had were only average in size.

We returned to Nairobi, and Franklin again joined us on the south hunt. There we saw every kind of animals—almost. Among those we killed were buffalo, rhino, zebra, eland, garanuk, hunters antelope, apolla, thompson gazelle, roan antelope, wildebeast, hard-beast, tofey, waterbuck, buck buck, wild hog, baboon, dick dick antelope, ores, and two snakes, the deadly black mamba and the typhoon.

Our stay in Nairobi—including the two hunting trips—lasted 39 days. The animals were very thick. We didn't have the heart to kill a monkey or a giraffe—they both looked so pitiful. I didn't even shoot a lion. As we drove along in the trucks, the lions were alongside the road under bushes, etc., and hardly lifted their heads. It wouldn't have been any more sport to shoot one of them than to shoot a collie dog.

We had a chance to cut our route short somewhat, and could get plane reservations as far as Calcutta. So we took the chance of getting on from there and started home earlier than we had expected.

We stopped in Arabia, and had to spend the night there, since their planes do not travel at night. We got rooms at the airport hotel, and were told we would not be allowed to go into town. However, we slipped around and got a taxi, and drove around into town. Although picture-taking is not allowed there, I still managed to take over 300 feet of film.

Our next stop was in India, after flying over miles and miles of nothing but desert land. The city we stopped at is now the center of a new independent country, and it was very interesting.

The next day we flew on to Calcutta. That is the dirtiest, filthiest, nastiest place I could ever imagine. Again we found people using the sidewalks and streets for rest rooms. The stores were all filthy. I just couldn't believe—until I saw it—that there is such filth anywhere.

The finer sections of town—where people with money live—are better, but even they are not clean. Hong Kong was our next stop, and it is a clean place. The people are clean, too. The city is

SOCIAL SECURITY**

Q. Does an employer need a social security number?  
A. Yes. Actually, it is termed "identification number" rather than "social security number."  
Q. Does an employer report his own earnings along with the wages of his employees?  
A. Only if his business is incorporated.  
Q. Would the partners in a business report their drawings or earnings?  
A. No. They are considered self-employed, the same as an individual owner.  
Q. Why does an employer in an incorporated business report his salary, while partners or individuals do not?  
A. In the eyes of the law, everyone, including salaried officers of a corporation are considered to be working for the corporation rather than being self-employed.  
Q. Then why does an employer need an "identification number"?  
A. Since many businesses have the same trade name, this number is used to identify their quarterly tax returns to the collector of internal revenue.

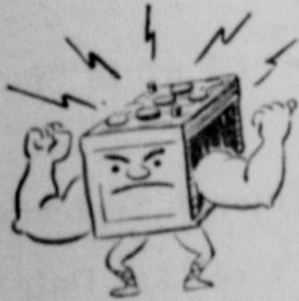
