



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

ANNUAL LEGISLATIVE SESSIONS?


ONE OF THE MOST controversial of the ten proposed constitutional amendments, on which voters will ballot November 8, is that which proposes annual legislative sessions and annual salaries for the Texas legislators.

There are arguments both for and against the proposed amendment, and here are some of the arguments:

Those who are FOR the amendment say that-

Only .0002 of each \$1 expended for state government goes for legislative expense; adoption of this amendment would not increase that amount too much in proportion to the service rendered by the legislature. Higher pay will attract candidates of higher caliber. The Council of don 0; score, Canyon 19, Clar-State Government believes salaries should be adjusted to economic changes as they occur. It recommends that all legislators be paid an annual salary in keeping with their responsibilites. This would enable them to spend tme on state problems the year round, rather than only while the legislature is in session.
