Membership Drive for 66 Group Begins

Work of the 1950 memberships for the Texas unit of the Highway 66 Association was begun this week, and the response thus far has been very good, John R. Broadhurst, McLean director, stated.

Broadhurst was named as the new director of the group in Amarillo last Thursday afternoon. John McCarty of Amarillo was elected president of the state group, and Boyd Meador of McLean was chosen as this state's representative on the board of directors.

Broadhurst and W. C. Meharg contacted merchants along Main Street this week for membership, and Sid Stewart and Jack Plummer worked the area from Main Street west on the highway. Yet to be contacted are those on the highway east of Main Street. Odell Mantooth and Joe B. Taylor have been named to work this area.

McLean's quota toward the state's assessment for the national organization is \$150. Broadhurst stated, and it is hoped that this amount can be turned in before any other cities raise their quota. The money is used in promoting travel on Highway 66, through the use of billboard, radio, and pamphlet advertising.

"We wish to thank each of those business men and other individuals who have contributed to the association by buying the memberships so far," Broadhurst said. "We believe the quota will be reached easily. Memberships are \$5 for businesses, and \$2.50 for individuals, and we believe this cost is small for the results which will be obtained. Other highway associations are working very hard to attract tourists to their roads, and it is up to the people along Highway 66 to keep the present tourist trade as well as attract additional traffic. Widening of the highway will help attract more traffic on our highway, but we must also work together to promote the traffic."

Applicants For Census Work To Be Interviewed on Tuesday

Walter S. Shaller, district census supervisor of Amarillo, will be in Pampa next Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock to interview prospective census workers.

Shaller is making a tour of various Fanninville towns this week and next week to interview prospective workers. This week he will be in Canadian, Perryton, Dalhart, Dumas, Memphis, Clarendon, Paducah, and Childress. Next week's itinerary includes Tulla, Dimmitt, Pampa, and Borger.

Applicants for crew leader and enumerator jobs will be inter-

viewed in the Texas Employment Commission in Pampa, of which L. P. Fort is manager.

Two crew members are to be employed in Pampa, it was explained. Crew leaders will draw \$11.92 per day. Enumerators will be paid on a piece-rate basis, and are expected to earn about \$8 per day. A total of 30 enumerators will be used in Gray County.

In Pampa, only those people who have not previously applied and taken their tests will be interviewed, unless the applicant is notified to appear, Shaller said.

Shamrock Cagers Win 2-A Title

The Shamrock Irish cagers won the District 2-A basketball crown without a loss in the two week-end tournament held at Shamrock February 10-11 and 17-18.

The Irish walloped the Lefors Pirates 57-18 in the final game for the green-clad lads Saturday night. The Shamrock boys had been favored throughout the meet, and were considered as a cinch to win following their 45-40 defeat of the strong Memphis team Friday night.

The Memphis Cyclone finished in second place, losing only the one game to Shamrock. The two teams will represent District 2-A in the regional meet. Last year, the situation was reversed with Memphis taking the district title and Shamrock taking second place. The Memphis boys went on to win the regional and state titles.

The McLean Tigers edged out Wellington by a single point in a game Friday night, but dropped their final tilt to the Clarendon Braves Saturday 43-37. In the entire tournament, the Tigers managed to defeat only Lefors and Wellington, losing to Shamrock, Memphis, and Clarendon. L. M. Watson of McLean was placed on the all-tournament team as the lone representative from this school. Others on the team

were Earl Tarbet of Shamrock, Scotty Grundy and Andy GARDEN.

District 2-A Meet Here Next Year

The new gym-auditorium is already becoming well-known, and so well-known that it will be the scene of the District 2-A basketball tournament to be held in February of next year—1951.

It's been a long time, if ever, since the tourney was held here, but the officials of District 2-A accepted Superintendent Loran Cummings' invitation to hold the meet here next year, at a session of the officials last Saturday night.

The tourney will be in the form of a double elimination affair, which means that every team must be beaten at least twice to be eliminated. This will afford more games than is usually played at the district affairs.

At the meeting last Saturday night, Cummings was re-elected chairman of the District 2-A basketball committee, and Coach Don Leach was re-elected as secretary. District 2-A is composed of McLean, Wellington, Lefors, Shamrock, Clarendon, and Memphis.

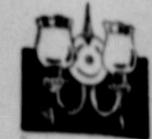

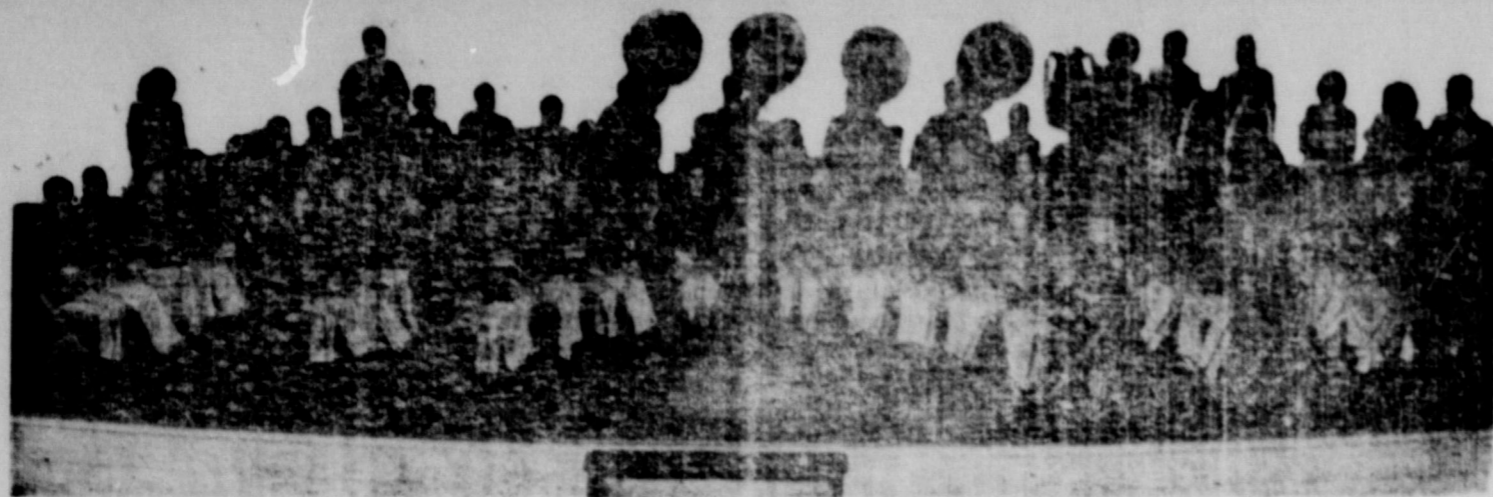

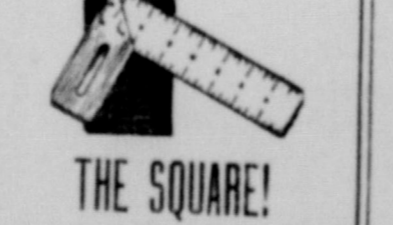

Editorial

THE POINT OF NO RETURN
LAST WEEK at the Panhandle hardware convention in Amarillo, a public relations man from Chicago explained to the hardware and implement men what is becoming commonly known as "the point of no return."
The phrase has been used for some time by aviators, and is now being used in various other ways—although the meaning remains the same.
When an aviator starts on a flight across a body of water, carrying a limited amount of fuel, somewhere during the flight he will reach a point where his fuel supply is only sufficient to carry him back to his starting place with no extra amount remaining. When this point is passed he must continue his over-water flight forward, otherwise, should he turn back after this point is passed, his fuel supply would not be large enough to get him safely back over the water, and he would naturally be forced to land at sea. Possible disaster would then face him. The point at which he no longer had sufficient fuel to get him back to his starting place is called "the point of no return."
The public relations man used this phrase to illustrate his talk on the socialistic trend of the national government. There is a "point of no return" on the trend, he explained.
According to the Chicagoan, taxes paid by citizens in the U. S. now amount to 26.6 per cent of the income of the citizens. The taxes are increasing annually, with each new so-called function of the government.
When the times comes that taxes take more than 50 per cent of the citizens' income, then the "point of no return" has been reached, he stated.
When the time comes that taxes take 70 per cent of the people's income, a complete dictatorship will exist. Under a dictatorship, freedom and liberty no longer exist.
With the present trend toward socialism and more and more government control continuing, only a matter of time remains until the U. S. will be a dictatorship. We agree with the public relations man from Chicago that the trend must be stopped—and stopped now.

New Fishing Laws Outlined

The executive secretary of the Texas Game, Fish and Oyster Commission suggests it is that time of the year again for Texans—when they check up on any new state laws. The statewide fish license law has been in effect since late last summer but it might stand a refresher by sportsmen.
Its primary purpose is to provide one master license for fishermen at a cost of \$1.65, thus doing away with the various special county licenses. One conspicuous provision is to permit Texans to fish free in their home counties, providing they do not use artificial bait, and to permit them to fish without license in counties adjacent to their own home counties, providing they do not use either artificial bait or live bait.

Game Storage

The executive secretary suggested that sportsmen check their food lockers containing game. He pointed out that the 90-day federal limit for storing migratory birds, as applied to mourning doves, expired February 12, but that the 90-day deadline for ducks and geese is not due until April 7. There is no state limit to storing deer, wild turkey or quail, but locker plants are required by law to keep a record of persons keeping game in storage.

Bass Fry Available

The chief aquatic biologist urges Texans interested in obtaining bass fry this spring to promptly write the commission. They will be sent cards for filling out as a basis for making their formal requests and for delivery of the fry. It is pointed out that the public waters of the state receive approximately 90 per cent of the fry and that the remaining 10 per cent is consigned to private lakes, streams and ponds so that fishing facilities are expanded to the maximum degree. The 10 per cent allotted to private waters is not intended for recently stocked places.

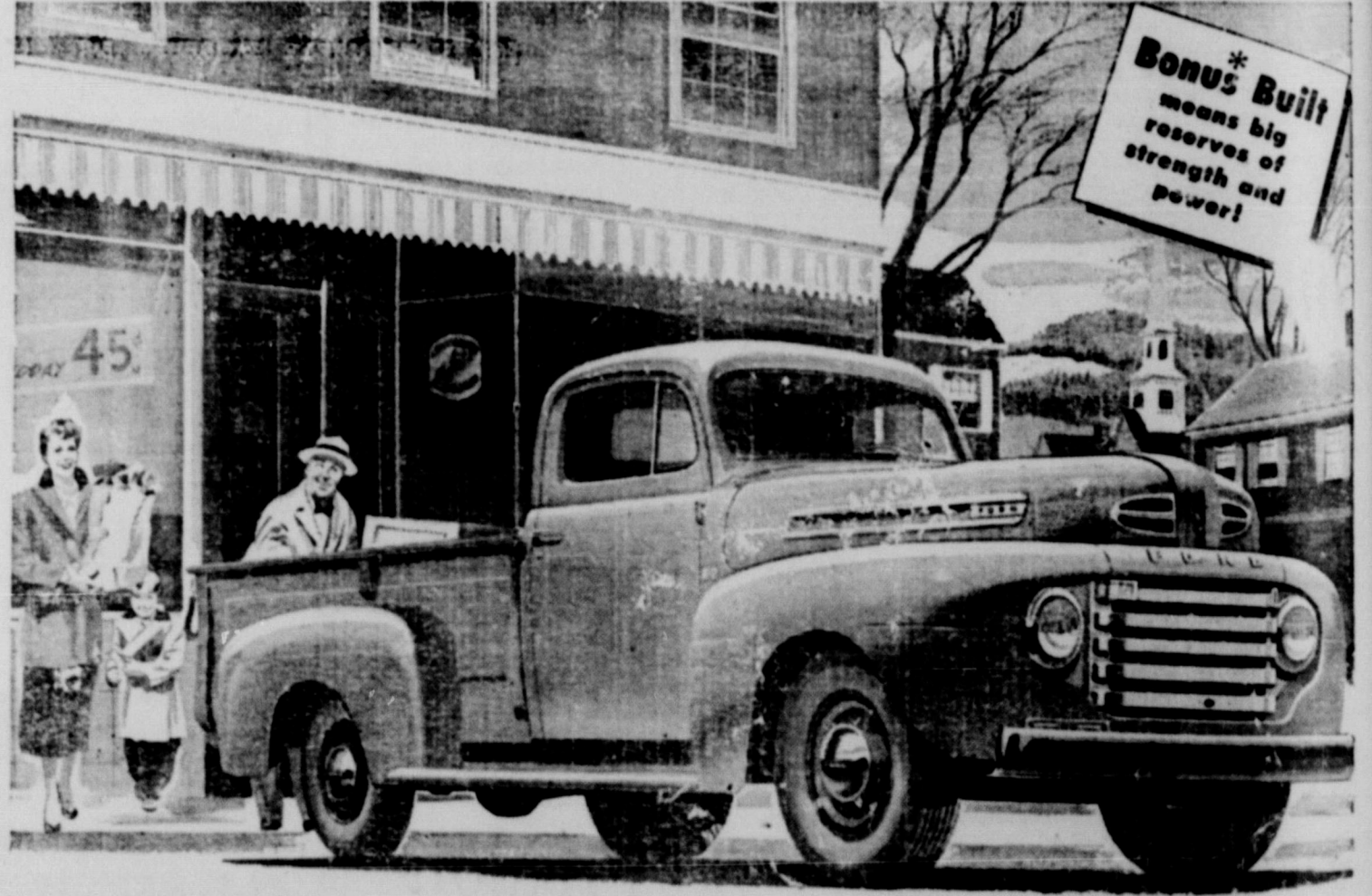
