## 5.56 of Inch Rain Falls Here

A slow-falling rain, as welcome to farmers, ranchers, and everyone in general as an insurance dividend check to a veteran, came to the Panhandle last week-end. The rainfall in McLean amounted to 5.56 of an inch, according to an official report from Pete Fairlight, local weather observer. This brought the year's total amount of moisture to 1.49 inches, in comparison to 6.97 inches in 1949 and 4.36 inches in 1948.

## Two Long Blasts On Siren Mean Storm Nearing

Nobody is inviting tornadoes, nor even the season when tornadoes usually come—but we thought you'd like to know the storm signal which is given in McLean when a tornado-possible cloud appears in the vicinity.

The siren signals used by the McLean Fire Department are as follows:  
Two long blasts—storm signal.  
Four long blasts—fire in residential section or out-of-city limits.  
Six long blasts—fire in business section.

Mayor Harris King stated that the storm signal is not given to frighten anyone, but to warn of the approach of a tornado or cyclone. Local officials, particularly at night, keep a close tab on the bad clouds, the mayor explained, and sound the signal to give warning. An attempt is made to sound the siren in plenty of time to put citizens on the alert.

**BEEF CASSEROLE**

One-dish meals are a joy to the homemaker. They save time and trouble in preparation and make dishwashing a light job. Here is a suggestion for a splendid meal-in-a-dish that contains a wealth of food values. Try

- Beef Casserole
- 5 strips of bacon or salt pork
- 3 cups (2 lbs.) beef cut in cubes
- salt, pepper, and flour
- 1/4 cup sliced onion
- 1 1/2 cups peas
- 1/2 teaspoon sugar
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- 1 1/4 cups tomato juice
- 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
- 4 carrots (about)
- mashed potatoes

Pan fry the bacon or salt pork. Season flour with salt and pepper. Dredge the cubed meat. Brown the meat on all sides in the pork or bacon fat. Add sliced onions, sugar, lemon juice, and Worcestershire sauce. Cook about five minutes. Add tomato juice. Cover and steam until almost tender. Add carrots and peas. Cook until meat and vegetables are tender. Place in casserole. Top stew with well seasoned mashed potatoes. Brown lightly in hot oven or under broiler unit. Serve hot. (Lamb or veal may be used in place of beef.)

Soil Conservation leaders from the Gray County Soil Conservation District have been invited to hear Governor Allan Shivers at a special conservation observance in Tulia, May 19.

These include W. A. Wagoner, Pampa; Homer L. Abbott, McLean; Arlie Carpenter, Lefors; W. B. Jackson, Pampa; and Jack Stephens, Groon.

The Texas governor will make his address during a dinner observing Soil Conservation Week. The dinner will begin at 8 o'clock in the new Tulia High School gymnasium. Women of the Swisher County Home Demonstration Council will serve. More than 500 guests are expected.

Fifty-one counties are represented in the observance. They are the counties which comprise Region 1 of the state soil conservation organization.

Tulia is also the site of the Region 1 awards program which will be held May 10. This is the program sponsored by the Fort Worth Press.

Governor Shivers is expected to fly into Amarillo the afternoon of May 19. He will be met there by a social reception committee from Tulia and an escort of Texas Highway patrolmen.

Fred Wemple, chairman of the Texas Highway Commission, from Midland, will introduce the governor.

Johnny Linn, known as Uncle Jay, will be master of ceremonies. Linn handles the early morning farm programs over Radio Station KGNC in Amarillo.

### BROWNIES

Nut-brown "brownies" with tall glasses of milk—what a treat for spring!



- 1/2 cup sifted flour
- 1/2 teaspoon double-acting baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup butter or other shortening
- 2 squares unsweetened chocolate
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 eggs, well beaten
- 1/2 cup broken walnut meats
- 1 teaspoon vanilla

Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder and salt, and sift again. Melt shortening and chocolate over boiling water. Add sugar gradually to eggs, beating thoroughly. Add chocolate mixture and blend. Add flour and mix well; then add nuts and vanilla. Bake in greased 8 x 8 x 2-inch pan in moderate oven (350° F.) 35 minutes. Cut in squares. Remove from pan and cool on cake rack. Makes about 2 dozen brownies.

### News About—SOCIAL SECURITY

Old-age and survivors insurance is a three-way partnership between the employer, his employees, and the federal government. "It is a joining of forces and resources in attacking the economic hazards of old-age and death," says John R. Sanderson, manager of the Amarillo Social Security office.

He points out that this three-way cooperation is often overlooked. He summed this up as follows:

- (a) The federal government issues social security numbers, maintains records of wages and pay benefits.
  - (b) The employer quarterly lists wages paid his employees, their social security account numbers and turns over the employee-employer contributions to the Bureau of Internal Revenue for transmission to the old-age and survivors insurance trust fund.
  - (c) The employee working on jobs covered by social security shares in the contributions and by advising the employer of his correct social security number insures proper wage credits.
- Correct information about benefits may be obtained from the Amarillo social security office located in Room 224 of the new Post Office building.

A "Y" will be at each end of town and in this "Y" exists the possibility of a wonderful and beautiful approach to our little town. It would pay off in the amount of added tourist business such an attractive approach would bring to the town.

Such a project actually needs the sponsorship of a women's organization. A few years ago an attempt was made to organize an active Garden Club, and it progressed well for a short time, but something happened and the club was disbanded. Perhaps the women of the town do not want a Garden Club, but why not name it something else and re-organize?

The need exists. Plenty of capable women live in McLean. Why, oh why, we ask, can't a women's civic club be formed? Don't tell us it can't be done—it most certainly can.

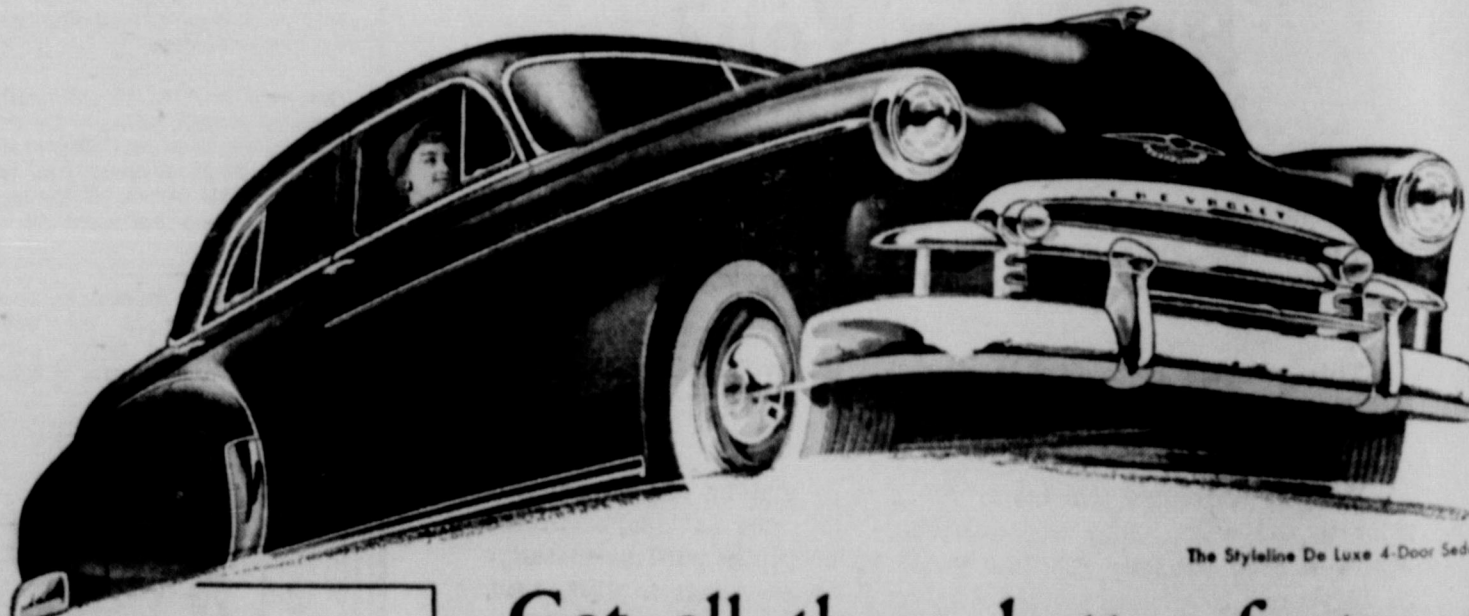

**BREAKFAST BREADS**

Hot sweet breads and coffee makes add variety and interest to breakfast, making it a meal that even the usual breakfast-skipper cannot resist. Here is a recipe for a basic dough which can be varied temporarily for different breads.

- 1 cup lukewarm water
- 1 cup milk
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 cups flour (about)
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 2 beaten eggs
- 1/2 cup melted margarine
- 1 teaspoon grated lemon or orange rind

Sift yeast in lukewarm water. Scald milk; add sugar and salt to the hot milk; cool to lukewarm. Add 2 cups flour. Mix well. Add softened yeast, eggs, and grated rind. Beat well. Add melted margarine. Mix well. Add enough flour to make a soft dough. Turn out on lightly floured board and knead until smooth. Place in margarine bowl. Cover and let rise until about doubled in bulk. Punch down. Shape tea rings, rolls, or coffee cakes. Let rise until doubled. Bake in a preheated moderate oven (325° to 375° F.) for 20 to 25 minutes, depending on the size. This will make two 12-inch tea rings, 2 1/2 dozen rolls, or 2 coffee cakes.

- 1 egg, well beaten
- 1 cup milk

Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder, sugar, and salt and sift again. Add corn meal and mix well. Combine egg and milk. Add to flour mixture. Add shortening, then mix only enough to dampen flour. Bake in greased muffin pans in hot oven (425° F.) 25 minutes, or until done. Makes 19 large muffins.

**E. E. Watkins Funeral Rites Held in Amarillo**

Funeral services for E. E. (Everett) Watkins, well-known rancher and former resident of McLean, were held last Thursday afternoon in Amarillo. Burial services were held at Hillcrest Cemetery in McLean.

Watkins, whose home was in Amarillo, died Monday night of last week near Springfield, Colo., when his car swerved from the highway, crashing over a rock culvert and into an arroyo. He was traveling alone, and was on a business trip to one of his two ranches near Los Animas, Colo.

The pioneer rancher and cattleman came with his parents to McLean at an early age. He was born June 25, 1887, at Grand Tower, Ill. He had been in the ranching business since 1913.

He had operated ranches in Hutchinson County, where he lived until 1950, and in Wheeler, Gray, Moore, and Deaf Smith counties.

In 1945, he sold his ranches in Texas, retaining oil interests in Hutchinson County, and bought the two places in southeastern Colorado. At the time of his death, he was developing a breed of the new "brangus" breed of beef cattle, a cross between the brahma and black angus stocks.

He was a member of the First Presbyterian Church in McLean, was a Range Rider, a member of the American Quarterhorse Association, and a member of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association.

**State Doctor Praises Press**

A highly placed state official has given Texas newspapers a pat on the back.

State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox, veteran of more than 13 years as head of the State Department of Health, called the Texas press a "more potent force in mass public education," and said his department invariably turns in that direction as the first means of reaching the people with information on health subjects.

"Texas newspaper editors and reporters have consistently shown an awareness of public health problems and have given unstintingly of much valuable space to stories relating to public health," Cox said.

"I can define public health in three words—mass public education," the health official said. "Without newspaper cooperation, such education is literally an unobtainable ideal."

Pointing out the custom of rural people to read their local weekly or semi-weekly thoroughly, Cox said he was especially happy that these papers use state and local health department releases.

"It's one of the most valuable services a paper can render its readership, but then maybe I'm a bit prejudiced," he observed.

Radio is an especially valuable outlet for information relating to venereal diseases, Cox indicated, because of the availability of professionally prepared recordings on the subject. More than 100 Texas stations have used the recordings during the past year.
