WHO WILL FEEL THE BITE?

IF ALL PERSONAL incomes in excess of \$10,000 a year were confiscated by Uncle Sam, it would barely give him the additional money needed to wipe out the \$51/2 billion profits. It must prosper because deficit and finance the \$1 billion first year's cost of the new federal spending programs proposed in the 1951 budget.

On the other hand, 51 million taxpayers reporting incomes of less than \$5,000 in 1947 paid \$81/2 billion which is 48 per cent or almost half of the income taxes collected that year.



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

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

This advice was given workers by J. R. Sanderson, manager of the Amarillo office of the Social Security Administration. Sanderson pointed out that most employers conscientiously try to report each worker's social security number correctly, but it is only human to make mistakes occas-

"When a worker has Social Security taxes deducted from his pay he is paying premiums on an insurance policy. This insurance helps to provide financial security in the worker's old age after retirement. It also provides insurance payments to eligible survivors if a worker dies," Sanderson said.

"Eligibility for benefits hinges on the length of time a worker ered by Social Security. The amount of benefits payable depends on the total wages credited on his wage record for all wages If his wages are re ported under the wrong social security number," Sanderson concluded, "he may not be credited with those wages. Later on, he and his family may lose benefits which should be theirs."






