FIRST BAPTIST REVIVAL TO BEGIN MAY 4

The First Baptist Church will participate in the Crusade of the Americas, and the date for the local revival is May 4-11, starting Sunday morning.

Screwworm Cases Few

Texas had only eight cases of screwworms confirmed in March, which—with the nine cases found in February—marks the end of the serious screwworm outbreaks last summer and fall.

Spring is about here, however, and the Texas Animal Health Commission foresees "more problems." Rain and warm weather hurt the control program.

A joint report of the Commission of the US Department of Agriculture says that 200,272,000 sterile flies were dropped in Texas during March to fight the expected increase.

Report also shows that 184 Texas counties now are modified certified brucellosis counties, 30 other counties are being tested and 32 others are under modified certified testing.

Teacher Shortage Grants

US Office of Education has awarded the Texas Education Agency six grants totalling more than \$600,000 to attract and qualify teacher shortage.

A TEA spokesman said the projects represent a cooperative effort among six regional education service centers—at Amarillo, Austin, Corpus Christi, El Paso, Houston and Richardson—with local education agencies and colleges and universities.

Short Snorts

State Welfare Commissioner Burton G. Hackney said that the plight of Texas' dependent children will worsen steadily unless a Constitutional amendment on welfare programs is approved in a special election August 5.

U. S. Supreme Court knocked out state residency requirements for welfare assistance, but decision will not have "tremendous effect" on Texas finances, welfare authorities report.

Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler banned mini-skirts and long sideburns for General Land Office employees.

Approval by Rep. Bill Healy of Paducah would allow students who graduate from an accredited Texas law school and have already gained a bachelors degree to not have to take the bar exam before practicing. Bill is in a subcommittee of the House State Affairs Committee.

Bill by Rep. Grant Jones of Abilene was given a favorable report by the House Judiciary Committee. It would keep any facts of settlement or evidence in lawsuits involving personal injury damages arising from the same occurrence.

Senate has knocked a farm workers' exemption out of the \$1.25 minimum wage bill by Sens. Joe Bernal and Jim Yates. An amendment by Jack Hightower would have exempted all farm workers except those that do piece work. Bill went to the House.

Oil Allowable Soars
Texas Railroad Commission issued its May oil production report, with the market demand production factor at 53.8 percent, designed to provide allowables of 3,746,706 barrels a day and estimated actual production of 3,150,722 barrels a day, the highest in a year.

This would be an increase over the April order of 126,612 barrels in allowables and 119,123 barrels of actual production.

Placements in the feedlot during the January-March period was down a constructive 21 percent in Iowa and nine in Nebraska. All 32 cattle feeding states was down one percent on placements for this period.

If all Americans continue to eat the same amount of beef as they ate in 1968 it would require an additional five percent more finished cattle. Per capita consumption has made a steady rise over the past several years. Last year 109 pounds per person was consumed.

Since Iowa and Nebraska are two of the main cattle feeding states the future market will be affected more by the low placements in Iowa and Nebraska than any other two states. This will work to the disadvantage of people hedging cattle because the market in the Chicago-Omaha market will be much higher in relation to the local market.

OFFICIAL MEMORANDUM By PRESTON SMITH Governor of Texas

AUSTIN, TEXAS

GREETINGS:
May 1 of each year has been set aside for reaffirmation of loyalty to the United States of America for special public recognition of our heritage of American freedoms. The day has been designated National Loyalty Day.

In these times of mounting crisis and growing tensions, our fundamental freedoms and national unity are a source of strength for all Americans.

Threats to the security of our nation throughout the world must be met with determination by all citizens to preserve the principles for which many thousands of courageous Americans have died in battle.

THEREFORE, I, as Governor of Texas, do hereby designate May 1, 1969, as

LOYALTY DAY

in Texas, and urge all citizens, organizations and institutions to affirm their support of our country, and encourage the display of the United States flag and active participation in ceremonies sponsored by the Veterans of Foreign Wars.

In official recognition whereof, I hereby affix my signature this 21st day of March, 1969.

JIMMIE LOU WAINSCOTT

Crooked sales pitches via the telephone are on the rise. They trap people into buying things they don't need or into seeing salesmen they don't want to see. Tricks include free gifts, phoney surveys and get-rich quick schemes.

Miss Jimmie Lou Waincott, Gray County home demonstration agent gives these tips which may warn you of phonies.

—The caller gives no identification.

—He says he is making a survey and requests a personal interview.

—He assures you he is not selling anything—just wants to interview you as part of an advertising campaign.

—He describes a "special offer" that your common sense tells you is too good to be true.

—He reels off prices, costs, offers and questions so fast that you cannot follow what he is telling you.

What should you do? Miss Waincott says the Better Business Bureau suggests replying: "Please send me a letter about the matter. I'll consider your offer after I've had a chance to investigate. Thank you for calling. Good-bye."

This way you discourage a gyp artist while not cutting yourself off from someone whose business is perfectly legitimate.

Legitimate callers also can be a nuisance, if they call at an inconvenient time or they refuse to take no for an answer. Miss Waincott says, if you aren't interested—just say good-bye and hang up.

Where has all the sugar gone? Sugar for home use has decreased from about 60 percent of all sugar deliveries to 27 percent in the past thirty years, reports Jimmie Lou Waincott, County home demonstration agent.

The sugar has gone to Institutional and industrial use. This shift from home use is caused by homemakers buying more convenience foods.

Pre-sugared items and "ready to eat" products lower the needs of sugar in the home. Liquid sugar users by quantities show that over 50 percent of all liquid

Time For Taxpayers To Wake Up

Employed Americans will work two and a half hours every day in 1969 (a total of 650 hours) to pay their federal, state and local tax bills. The 10 percent surtax last year accounted for a big jump in federal taxes. Of course, state and local taxes are climbing, too. Federal corporate and individual income tax receipts are expected to reach \$122 billion in the twelve months beginning July 10.

Social Security News

Many children of retired, disabled, and deceased workers are now able to stay in school because of social security taxes paid by their parents, according to Travis C. Briggs, Amarillo social security district manager.

Student benefits, a relatively new addition to the social security program, are paid to full-time students in accredited schools as long as the students are unmarried and age 18 to 22. Full-time attendance at a high school, college, business, or vocational school can qualify them for benefits.

"Of course these benefits are based on work covered by social security by a student's parents who died or is entitled to social security retirement or disability benefits," Mr. Briggs explained.

Benefits are paid 12 months a year including vacations between semesters) to students whose yearly earnings are \$1680 or less.

Additional information and assistance in applying for benefits are available at the social security office, located at 1006 South Adams in Amarillo. The office is open Monday through Friday from 8:15 am to 4:30 pm and remains open until 6:30 pm on Thursdays.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (HJR1)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sections 42, 46, and 48 of Article III, Sections 3a and 7 of Article VII, Section 12 of Article VIII, Section 3 of Article IX, Sections 1, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, and 9 of Article X, Section 10 of Article XI, Sections 3, 4, 5, and 7 of Article XII, Sections 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7 of Article XIII, Sections 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, and 8 of Article XIV, Sections 3, 4, 7, 10, 29, 32, 34, 35, 36, 38, 42, 45, 46, 54, 55, 57, 58, and 60 of Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be repealed, it being specifically

understood that the repeal of these sections shall not in any way make any substantive change in our present constitution.

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to repeal the obsolete, superfluous and unnecessary sections of the Constitution."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR3)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 24, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 24. The Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall each receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed one-half the annual salary of the Governor. Each other member of the Legislature shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary to be fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed the annual salary paid to a district judge from state funds. Members of the Legislature shall also receive a per diem of not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day during each Regular and Special Session of the Legis-

lature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days.

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on August 5, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing that the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall receive a salary fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed one-half the salary of the Governor; providing that the Legislature shall fix the salary of the other members, not to exceed that received by a district judge from state funds; and removing the 120-day limitation on per diem for regular sessions."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR7)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51-d, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 51-d. The Legislature shall have the power, by general law, to provide for the payment of assistance by the State of Texas to the surviving spouse and minor children of officers, employees, and agents including members of organized volunteer fire departments and members of organized police reserve or auxiliary units with authority to make an arrest, of the state or of any city, county, district, or other political subdivision who, because of the hazardous nature of their duties, suffer death in the course of the performance of those official duties. Should the Legislature

enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for payment of assistance to surviving spouses and minor children of governmental officers, employees, and agents, including members of organized volunteer fire departments and certain organized police reserve units, who have hazardous duties and are killed in the performance of those duties."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (SJR4)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 2, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 2. All occupation taxes shall be equal and uniform upon the same class of subjects within the limits of the authority levying the tax; but the legislature may, by general laws, exempt from taxation public property used for public purposes; all real and personal property owned by a nonprofit water supply corporation which is reasonably necessary for, and is used in, operation of the corporation in the acquisition, storage, transportation and sale of water as authorized as its sole legal purpose; actual places of (off) religious worship, also any property owned by a church or by a strictly religious society for the exclusive use as a dwelling place for the ministry of such church or religious society, and which yields no revenue whatever to

such church or religious society; provided that such exemption shall not extend to more property than is reasonably necessary for a dwelling place and in no event more than one acre of land; places of burial not held for private or corporate profit; all buildings used exclusively and owned by persons or associations of persons for school purposes and the necessary furniture of all schools and property used exclusively and reasonably necessary in conducting any association engaged in promoting the religious, educational and physical development of boys, girls, young men or young women operating under a state or national organization of like character; also the endowment funds of such institutions of learning and religion not used with a view to profit; and when the same are invested in bonds or mortgages, or in land or other property which has been and shall hereafter be bought in by such institutions under foreclosure sales made to satisfy or protect such

bonds or mortgages, that such exemption of such land and property shall continue only for two years after the purchase of the same at such sale by such institutions and no longer, and institutions of purely public charity; and all laws exempting property from taxation other than the property above mentioned shall be null and void."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional amendment to exempt nonprofit water supply corporations from taxation."

"AGAINST the Constitutional amendment to exempt nonprofit water supply corporations from taxation."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election, and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this state.
