**Nice Improvements**

With the spirit of improvement that seems to be in our little city, J. R. Hindman, proprietor of the Hindman Hotel, is making extensive improvements that are noteworthy.

Having first bought a modern motor engine, he has equipped the hotel with a tower and huge boiler that is about 40 feet high, which he will keep a large supply of water for use not only at the hotel but for protection in case of a fire. He has fitted up a modern laundry machine and will run the big wash-machine with the engine.

The back yard, and accessible from the street, he will build a bath house, equipped with the modern conveniences, including hot and cold water. The building will be for the use of the hotel, and the gentleman is arranging to have several hydrants on the floor in order to have water on hand in case a fire starts in that quarter.

It has long been a matter of comment that the rear portion of this popular eating house quite as pretty as any front in the city and the opinion of the public is well taken. The

lower part of the old windmill tower is covered with vines, as is also the tower from which the big dinner bell is suspended at the kitchen door. The entire back yard is set to grass and trees and is in perfect condition at all times. In fact, the Hotel Hindman is one of the most attractive places in this vicinity and it is the policy of the proprietor to keep adding to the improvements already begun.

**American Bank in New Home**

When all the fixtures are straightened out and in place this will be one of the most completely furnished banking rooms for its size in the state.

The fixtures, which were furnished by the Budd-Lindsay Manufacturing company of Jackson, Tenn., are of marble and mahogany, the main walls being of white Vermont marble and the borders, or baseboards, of Verde antique marble. **Rodeo Slated At Shamrock**

A rodeo, under the sponsorship of the Shamrock Lions Club, will be held in Shamrock during the State-Line Free Fair. Performances have been scheduled for 8 o'clock Thursday, Friday, and Saturday nights, and 2:30 o'clock Sunday, September 20, 21, 22, and 23.

The show, open to amateur cowhands only, will be staged at the new city park site, west of the Fort Worth and Denver railway underpass on Highway 66.

A \$1,200 purse is offered the winning contestants in seven events, saddle bronc riding, bareback bronc riding, calf roping, team tying, bulldogging, bull riding, and girls' sponsor contest.

(Editor's Note: This is another portion of an address made by C. W. Hudson of the Dallas Railway and Terminal company at the annual meeting of the Texas Press Association in Dallas in June. Readers are invited to clip each week's portion of the article—too lengthy to publish in one issue, and read them all at one time when the address is completed.)

WHILE STANDING at the crossroads and reading, "what it says under the picture," let the crowd know about this diabolical plot to destroy our American way of life.

GROWING PAINS In Gray County

By FOSTER WHALEY
County Extension Agent

The Gray County Soil Conservation District received a 40,000 pound car of sodium chlorate for bindweed control and have distributed most of it among plain farmers. Occasionally I run into a patch of bindweed in the McLean area. It is a spreading vine-like weed that has arrow-shaped leaves. About the only sure way to kill it out is to use a soil sterilant like sodium chlorate.

Four chlorate spreaders are available to farmers in the county to apply this chemical. The S. C. D. sells this material at cost, which is \$11 per 100 pounds. P. M. A. will pay \$7.50 of this amount if applied for. The actual cost to the farmer is around \$25 per acre. Plots larger than one-half acre shouldn't be treated because of blow hazard.

Upon recommendation of Homer Abbott, district supervisor, the Gray County S. D. C. is buying a manure spreader to be used mainly in the McLean area. This should be a very worthwhile implement for the McLean farmers. A slight charge will be made to defray depreciation and repairs.

It will soon be time to treat your peach and other fruit trees for borers. The newest chemical for this purpose is ethylene dichloride.

Another item to start thinking about is treating your cattle for grubs. Thousands of dollars are lost in Texas yearly by the heavy infestation of this cattle pest. Treat with rotenone at 21-day intervals for three times, beginning when the first grub pierces the back of an animal.

From the labor reports I get weekly, Gray County farmers can't depend on imported labor to harvest their cotton. Migratory laborers are too much in demand at other points.

Many cotton farmers will harvest their cotton with mechanical cotton strippers for the first time. Most of the high plains farmers intend to use this method, together with local labor from Pampa.

Much of the high plains cotton looks like one-half bale per acre at present. I've been talking to these farmers, and a good number plan to gin at McLean.
