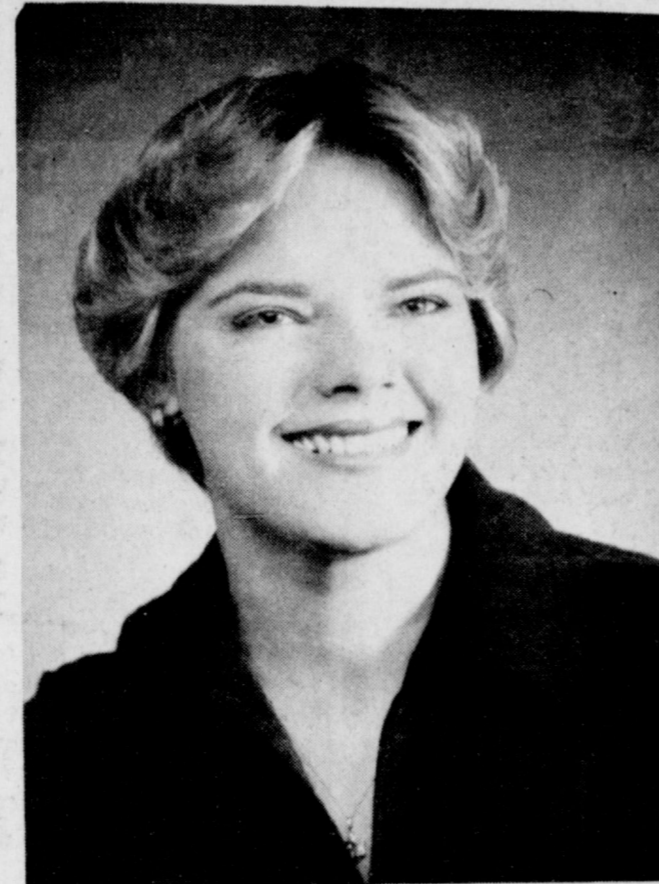
Mrs. Elsie Smith, newly elected District 14 President, from Lubbock, gave the program on leadership qualities

Accent On Health

Texas Department of Health
Fratris L. Duff, M.D., Commissioner

May is Hypertension Month, but in the Texas Department of Health every month is Hypertension Month.

Our hypertension program is one of the

newer and more rapidly growing programs in the Department, and it is being carried out throughout all regions and in many local health departments.

Hypertension—or high blood pressure—is present in about one out of every six Texans. Nationally, more than 60,000 Americans die annually from hypertension, which also contributes to the

more than one million fatal myocardial infarctions and cerebrovascular accidents.

There are several very effective drugs available for the treatment of persons with hypertension. But people can't be treated unless the disease is detected. Although it only takes a moment or two to take a blood pressure test, many persons fail to get this

done regularly and become victims of the disease or its complications.

We are talking about a public health program of great impact and a disease which can be simply evaluated, controlled in most patients and which can be accompanied by a drop in mortality, morbidity and health care costs.

The Texas Department of Health has placed great emphasis on hypertension screening in Texas and is working closely with the American Heart Association, Texas Affiliate.

There are probably about one and one-fourth million hypertension cases in Texas. Less than a third are estimated to be under adequate therapy.

Starting some two years ago, we began a health education approach to create an awareness within the adult population of the nature and consequences of hypertension and the necessity for an annual blood pressure check. Screening was begun in two pilot projects—in Public Health Region 7 in East Texas and in Laredo. Since then, with additional funding through a federal hypertension control effort, the Department has laid the foundation for a truly statewide program. All Regions are now involved in screening. Some 35 Local Health Departments are actively participating, and others have screening plans for the near future. Our goal is to have the program implemented in all Local Health Departments. Further, we have a cooperative effort with the Texas Affiliate of the American Heart Association to increase its on-going hypertension screening in Bexar, Dallas and Harris Counties.

Additionally, laboratory support is being provided by the Department. Blood

specimens may be collected and sent to our Austin Laboratory for analysis.

In keeping with emphasis on dietary management of hypertensives, a nutrition counseling component has been initiated whereby our public health nurses provide nutrition counseling and printed diet instructions upon request by the physician managing a patient.

All screening data is put on computer tapes which permit on-going program evaluation. This will allow us to focus screening efforts on selected target groups.

The number of screenings during the past fiscal year—345,658 is an indication of the extensive efforts being made in this program. The number is increasing, and better health will result through this public health program.

Nitrogen and your corn yields.

You can follow every good corn growing practice in the book—top yielding hybrids, herbicides, insecticides (even irrigation)—but without sufficient nitrogen you won't get optimum yields.

Corn uses nitrogen from early root growth until ears dent in late summer. The amount of nitrogen a good corn crop removes from the soil is sizable.

Nitrogen removed from soil by 150 bushel corn crop.
In Grain (150 Bu.)—135 lbs N
In Stover (4 1/2 Ton)—100 lbs N
Total—235 lbs N

Most soils have enough nitrogen to produce about 70 bushels per acre. For yields over 70 bushels, you must rely on nitrogen fertilizer. Here is a good rule of thumb regarding the amount of nitrogen to apply.

For Yield Goals—Figure on applying 2 1/2 lbs N for each bushel over 70 bu/A*
For Yield Goals 121 to 200 Bu/A—Figure on applying 3 lbs N for each bushel over 70 bu/A*

*Subtract from these totals any credits from "carry over" nitrogen, nitrogen in manure or nitrogen from legumes preceding the crop.

Nitrogen builds protein.
University tests show that nitrogen can increase protein content of the grain as well as yield.

For instance, increasing nitrogen rate from 50 lbs/A to 120 lbs/A increased protein from 6.9% to 8.7%, and protein pounds from 332/A to 594/A.

For growers who feed corn, nitrogen helps in two profitable ways: more corn and higher quality corn.

Fall application.
Fall application is especially important on corn following corn. Nitrogen applied at that time stimulates soil organisms that break down crop residues. And it permits you to get part of your fertilization job out of the way early.

In many areas, a split application—part of the nitrogen in the fall and part the following spring—is considered good practice.

Test corn soils now.
Don't shortchange your corn by applying too little nitrogen. Don't shortchange your pocketbook by applying too much.

Southwest Airline Marks Anniversary

When Southwest Airlines celebrates its first anniversary of service to Lubbock May 20, it will be with the title "No. 1" in monthly passengers boarded. Southwest captured this title in October, 1977 and has continued to board record loads.

Southwest's four outbound flights soared from 9722 passengers during June, 1977, the first full month of operations, to 146,999 passengers for the first eleven months of service.

Southwest rang up its single largest month in March, 1978 carrying 18,354 passengers and its largest single day March 17, 1978 with 1,130 passengers boarded on twelve outbound flights.

Service has increased with the increase in passengers. From an initial schedule of eight arrivals and/or departures daily, Southwest's service has tripled to 24 arrivals and/or departures daily including two non-stop

flights to Houston and increased Pleasure Class flights (available from 7 p.m. each weekday evening and all weekend flights). A Student Youth fare is available on all Executive Class flights (between 6:29 a.m. and 6:59 p.m.) for passengers 21 years of age and under. The one-way Lubbock-Dallas fare is \$17, Lubbock-Houston fare is \$27 and Lubbock-Austin is also \$27.

The Dallas-based airline isn't the only one benefiting from the growth of passenger traffic in Lubbock. SWA's first act was to station 19 people in Lubbock, with the local economy trapping the rewards. An additional nine employees have been added to the original 19 members of the love team during SWA's first year of service.

Homeowners Telling Smith: 'Tax Too High'

Former Gov. Preston Smith, who has been out on a hand-shaking tour, says he has learned one thing for certain: People think their taxes are too high.

"Tax reform is one of the major issues with Texas voters. These citizens are the homeowners who are carrying more than their share of the state's tax burden.

"We have to come up with some way to insure that all Texans pay a fair share. Tax reform will become even more important in the years to come when we can no longer depend on oil and gas revenue.

"We must begin to plan for it now while we still have time."

Smith says Texans also are unhappy with the high cost of energy. In some cases the homeowners' utility bills are higher than their mortgage payments.

"Many Texans make their living producing as well as using energy. Two out of seven non-farm jobs in this state are directly related to petroleum resources.

"Within a decade Texas could shift from being the country's leading exporter of energy to being an importer of energy.

"That's why it's so important that we make our plans now."

Smith suggests launching a concentrated research and development program "through

leadership in the governor's office.

"We need a program to encourage energy conservation, to improve energy efficiency, and to utilize alternate sources.

"But our current governor is content to let the situation stand—at least until his term is finished."

Bentsen Asks Action On Bill

Senator Lloyd Bentsen on Monday sought quick approval for his counter-cyclical beef import bill by the House of Representatives.

The Bentsen bill was approved by the Senate late Friday.

"I urge you to expedite House approval of this anti-inflation bill which would benefit both consumers and ranchers across the nation," the Senator said in letters to Chairman Al Ullman (D-Ore.) of the House Ways and Means Committee and Rep. Barber Conable (R-N.Y.), ranking minority member of the committee.

"The American housewife has been faced with sharp cyclical swings in beef prices over recent years, particularly for hamburger meat. Our bill will help moderate this 'roller coaster' effect and in the future would help ease the sharp upswings in beef prices that we are now experiencing."

"This is of particular importance to lower and middle income families," Bentsen said. The counter-cyclical approach in the Bentsen bill would allow more beef imports into this country when domestic supplies dwindle and fewer imports when domestic supplies are abundant. The present law, the 1964 Meat Import Act, is cyclical. Its formula allows more imports as domestic supplies increase.

The bill had been approved by the Senate Finance Committee, 13-1, on April 19. It has 28 cosponsors in the Senate.

"The fact that a substantial number of Senators of both parties, representing a full spectrum of philosophical approaches to international trade and consumer issues, supports the bill clearly demonstrates that the Senate's counter-cyclical beef import formula is a balanced proposal that

will protect the interests of consumers, importers and cattlemen," Bentsen said.

"The counter-cyclical control of imports will add stability to the domestic beef market. Greater stability in the beef

market will result in lower prices to consumers over the long run, a sure reasonable market for imports and a fair rate of return to ranchers," Senator Bentsen said.

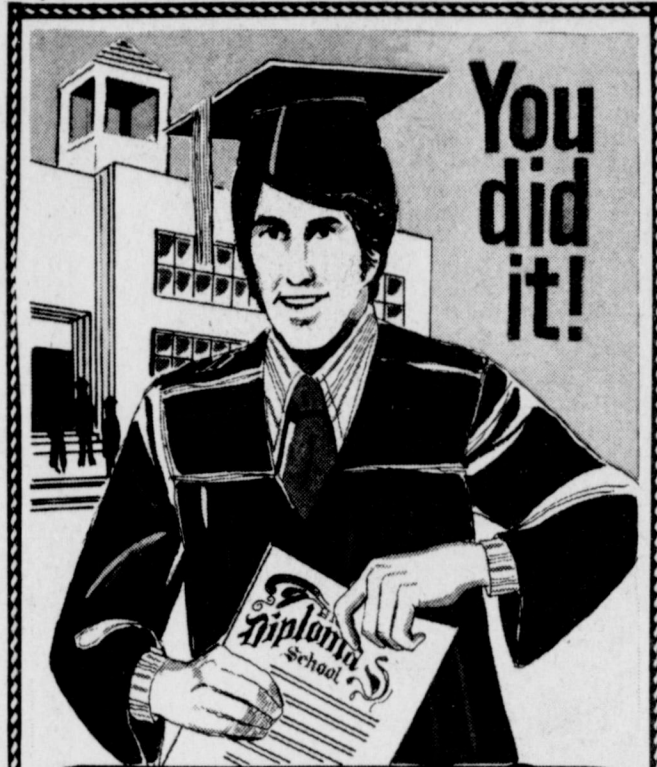

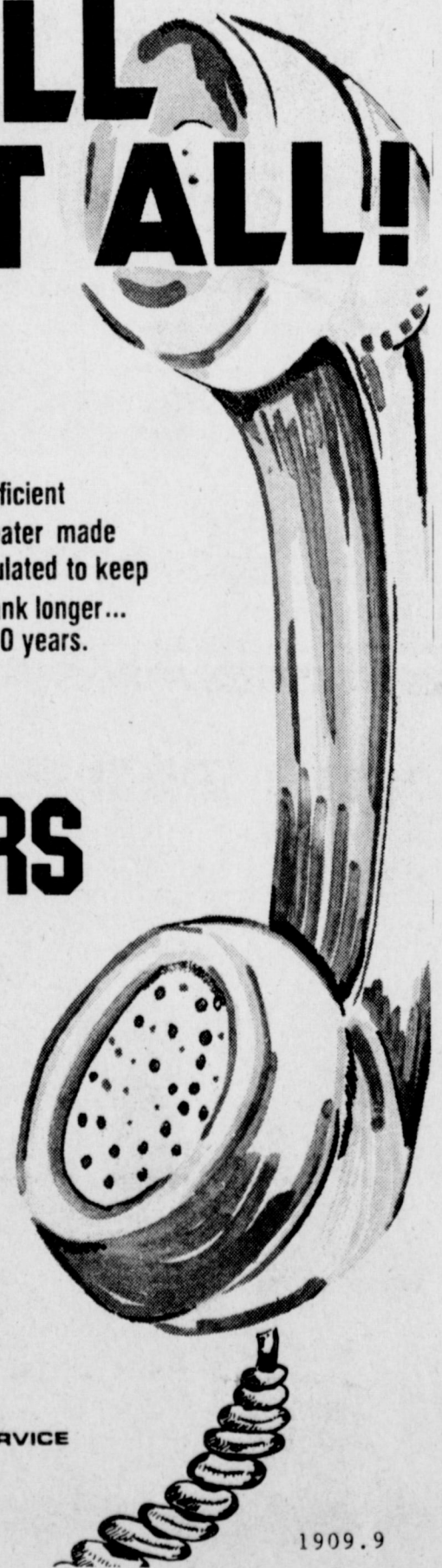

Home Health Agency Offers New Service

Vernice Garth, LVN, has announced a new service for clients using home health care services. She said, "Clients using home health care services often need skilled nursing service by an LVN or RN, but they are ineligible for home health visits because their skilled nursing needs do not meet the Medicare guidelines for 'skilled care.'"

She continued, "Seeing this special need, the MBFA Foundation, which has delivered home health care in Texas since 1969, now announces a new service to these special clients."

"Now those persons who re-

quire less than skilled care under the Medicare guidelines, or those who require the skills of a licensed professional (vocational) or registered nurse, but cannot afford to pay the regular charges and have no insurance covering these services, are eligible through the Texas Homemaker Service, a division of MBFA Foundation."

According to the local LVN, an example of this type of service would be the client who needs a B-12 or other type of vitamin injection, as has been ordered by an attending physician and has no Medicare, Medicaid, Veterans or Private insurance of any kind and cannot afford to pay the normal charge. Now this patient can have the visit of an LVN or RN in the home at a beneficial rate based on one's individual financial status.

This service will also benefit the patient who has been on the

home health service under Medicare, or some other type of insurance coverage, and has depleted this coverage, but is still in need of skilled nursing service. Now the client can pay a beneficial rate and remain on the service under this new system through MBFA's Texas Homemaker Service (West Texas Home Health).

Mrs. Garth said the service should not be confused with regular homemaker service. "This is skilled nursing care given by an LVN or RN, but just does not meet the Medicare guidelines," she said. "The client must be under the care of a physician who will order this service for the patient."

You may discuss the new service with your physician or call the Texas Homemakers for more information. The phone number to call is 747-2814 in Lubbock or in the Muleshoe

area, Vernice Garth at 272-4692 (evenings). She will be able to answer any questions you or your physician may have concerning this new service.

West Texas Home Health Agency indicates that this new service will provide another alternative to their clients toward better and more complete medical care available in the client's home. She adds, "MBFA Foundation motto is a 'Vision With A Task,' and this task is continually being accomplished and the vision is becoming a reality to those the Foundation serves."

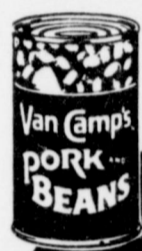

South Plains Schedules Class

The tremendous demand for radiographers on the South Plains has upped the class load to 30 this fall for the South Plains College radiologic technology program.

To meet that goal of 30 new students, the SPC radiologic technology program will conduct an aptitude examination on June 2 and July 7, announced Doyle Davis, program director.

The examination is among several requirements for entrance into the two-year program, he said.

The exam will be given at 8:30 a.m. both days in the SPC guidance and counseling office, located in the Administration Building. A fee of \$1 per person will be charged.

Davis said that the exam will continue throughout the morning and a couple of hours in the afternoon following a lunch

break. "No appointment is necessary and there's nothing to study for," he said.

Davis estimated that from four to 12 jobs are available each day in Lubbock alone for radiographers, a new term now being used for radiologic technologists. He said that beginning radiographers can earn an average of \$825 a month.

Other entrance requirements for the program include provision of high school and/or college transcripts, SAT or ACT scores, a spine X-Ray and interview with program personnel. Davis said that spine X-Rays may be obtained at cost from Plains Radiology Associates of Lubbock.

"Students should make an afternoon appointment for an X-Ray," he said. The firm may be contacted at 3825 22nd Place or 792-5511 in Lubbock.

Beginning this fall, the radiologic technology program will

be housed in SPC's new facilities in Lubbock, formerly the old West Texas Hospital. The hospital is being completely renovated to contain a variety of programs.

Students completing the two-year program will be awarded an associate in applied science degree and will be eligible to take the American Registry of Radiographers examination for certification. If they pass the exam, they will become a registered technologist, radiography (RTR).
