McLean exhibitors in the junior livestock show were David Wilson, Burnis Stokes, Don Taylor, Gerald Tate, Orphus Tate, and Clarence Pierce. David Wilson took second place in the junior division with his Chester White hog.

The American National Bank in McLean bought Wilson's and Taylor's hogs. J. L. McMurtry of Clarendon also bought some McLean pigs. Thanks to the McLean bank and Mr. McMurtry.

There was a total of 46 pigs in the sale, which averaged \$92.45 per head, or 43.7 cents per pound. Pioneer Investment paid \$2.00 per pound for the grand champion pig and a total of \$466.00. Jay McIlvain of Pampa exhibited the grand champion. The reserve champion was exhibited by Glen Harris of Kingsmill and sold to the Panhandle Packing company at \$1.00.

Paul T. Macina Jr. of Pampa exhibited Wimpy, grand champion calf, which sold to Lynn Boyd Lumber company at \$1.30 per pound, a total of \$1,066.00. Joe Van Zant, Mobeetie, exhibited the reserve champion calf which sold to Suttle Grocery of Pampa for 85 cents per pound.

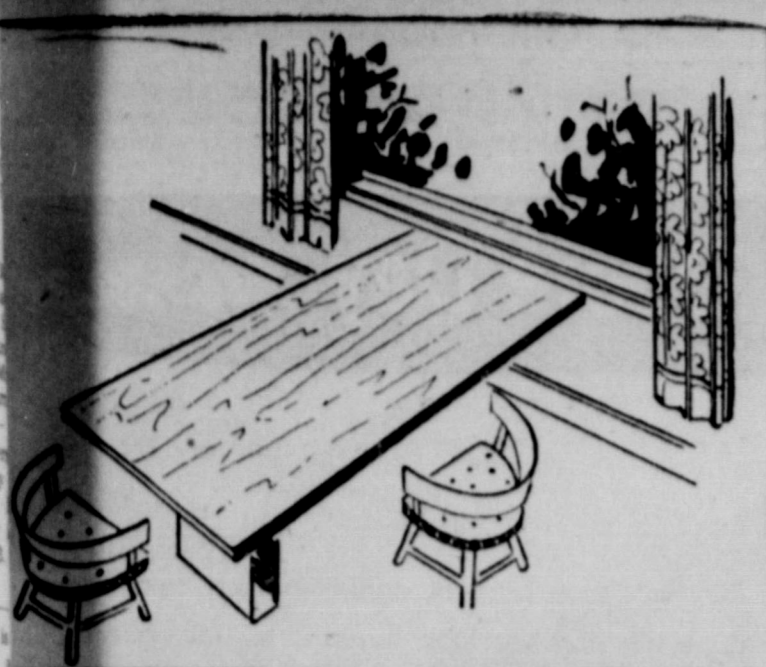

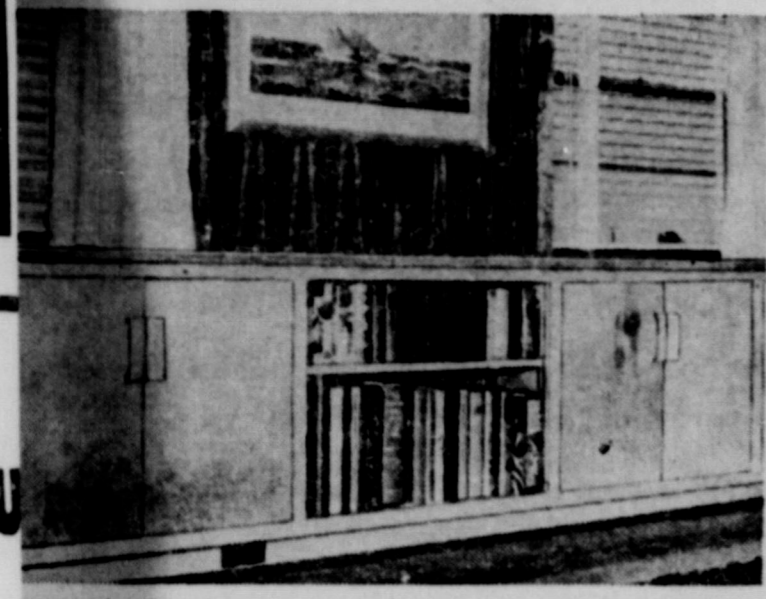

Texas Schools—FACE PROBLEMS

Texas schools are facing one of the most critical periods in their history, Charles H. Tennyson, executive secretary of the Texas Teachers Association, said in an outlined pressing needs for buildings and more teachers for the entire state.

must spend \$242,312,000 for building and facilities alone if the children are to have desirable schools. And this does not take into consideration the need for new facilities to replace undesirable buildings and to relieve already over-crowded conditions. A recent survey made by the Texas Education Agency shows that Texas needs to spend \$540,294,000 to bring school buildings, facilities, sites and buses up to ideal conditions.

After the 1956-57 school year, the elementary enrollment over the state should begin to level off, but high schools will then face the problems of increased enrollment.

Texas does not face the educational problem alone. A nose count among elementary children over the entire nation showed that grade school population rose nearly three million from 1947 to 1950. In October, 1950, the U. S. Census Bureau reported that enrollment in all schools and colleges was at an all time high of slightly over 30 million persons. This represents a fifth of the nation's total population and half of the population between 5 and 29 years of age.

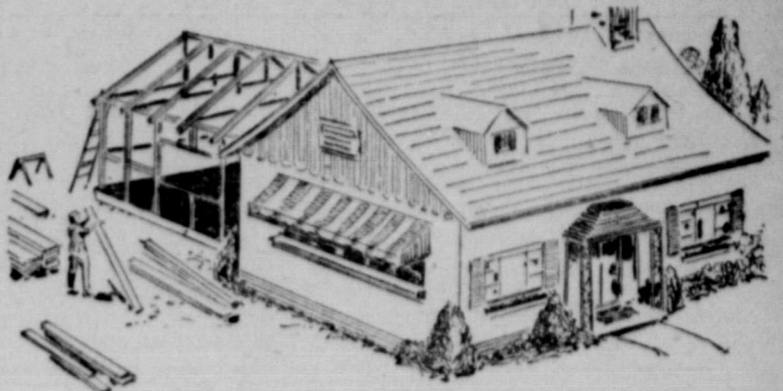

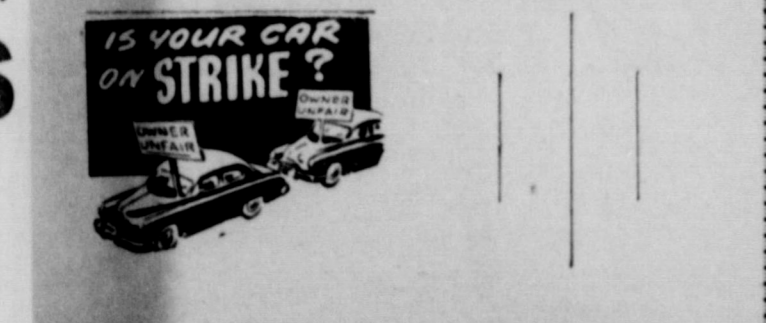

There are not many activities, other than the providing of a set-up for our country's protection and the passing of laws to safeguard us in our every day life, that we believe the government should have anything to do with. We do believe that the postal system should remain in the hands of the federal government. And we do believe that the school systems should remain in the hands of the STATE government. And please note we said the schools should be financed, controlled, and operated under STATE supervision, not by the FEDERAL government.

There are a lot of socialistic dreamers (who haven't the brains to know they are simply biting off their nose to spite their faces) who are in the high offices and who want the government, the U. S. government that is, to give federal aid to schools. In that way, those socialistic dreamers (that same group who don't know which side their bread is buttered on) think they can gain more and more power and eventually we will wind up as a totalitarian nation.

Then there are such radicals as R. C. Hoiles, who owns a lot of newspapers and some radio stations, who believes that we shouldn't even have state-supported schools. He would prefer only private schools, carrying out his theory of no government activities of any kind. The only trouble with his theory is that he has forgotten that an ignorant nation—and our nation would soon be ignorant without state-supported schools—is the easiest nation to be overcome by a power-hungry group who seek only a dictatorship with that small group in control.

In the matter of our schools, these are the two extremes—no tax-supported schools whatsoever, as advocated by Mr. Hoiles, and federally-financed and controlled schools as advocated by the power-hungry mob now holding much influence in Washington.

Recently the U. S. Supreme Court, loaded with those liberals placed there by the late Roosevelt and the man who thinks he is big enough in intelligence to succeed him, took away from Texas the tidelands along the Gulf Coast. These tidelands have been almost worthless in the past—until they turned out to be rich sources of oil. Now the Supreme Court, in a 4-3 decision, violated the treaty made when Texas joined the union, and took away those tidelands. The revenue derived from tidelands taxation has been used to aid in financing the public schools of Texas.

So your children are the ones who will be affected. It will affect your pocketbook, too, when you have to dig deeper to make up for the lack of tidelands revenue—or else the state's educational system will suffer.

Personally, we favor the system of state-supported schools the way it is set up in Texas now. Part of the financing comes from state taxes, and part from your local school taxes.

AND THE CONTROL OF THE SCHOOLS IN TEXAS REMAINS IN THE HANDS OF THE STATE, NOT THE U. S. GOVERNMENT.

Personally, we also feel that the U. S. Supreme Court—and consequently the U. S. government—has done the state of Texas a great injustice, and the children a greater injustice, by taking away the Gulf Coast tidelands.

What can you do to help get those tidelands back? You can help by sending \$1 or more to the Statewide Tidelands Committee, 308 East 11th Street, Austin, Texas. That money will be used in the fight which is now going on to get those tidelands back, that fight to get more money for your public school system.

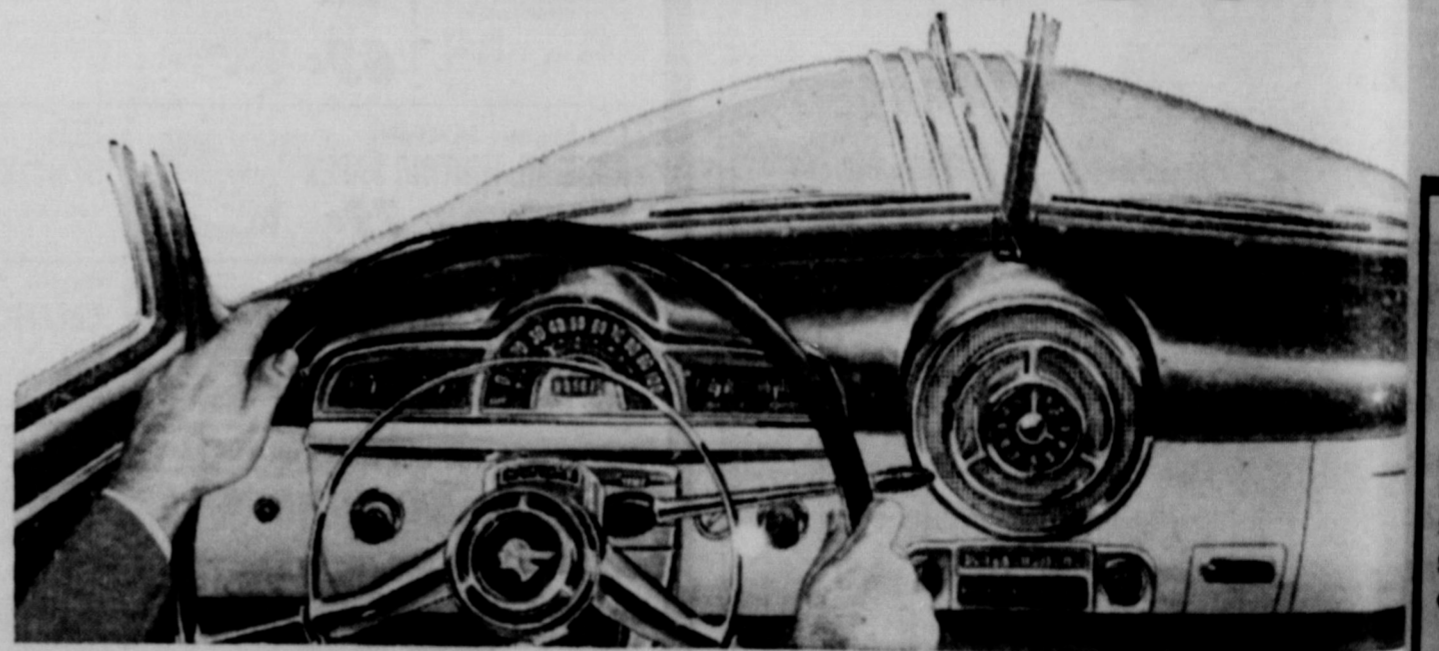

Answer to Question No. 1:
It has been found that children can lessen their tendency to tooth decay if drinking water contains one-millionth part of fluoride. Since tooth decay is the most prevalent childhood illness next to the common cold, many cities are adding fluorides to municipal water supplies when these salts are not already present. The cost is very small. Parents, however, should consult their family dentist about their children's teeth.

Answer to Question No. 2:
Hormones are substances given off by certain glands of the body. When these glands do not function properly, the human body

develops deficiencies which your doctor can treat with drugs produced from similar glands of animals. Some hormones are being produced synthetically (artificially).

Answer to Question No. 3:
Unless properly pasteurized (heated enough to kill the germs) and kept clean, milk may be a dangerous spreader of tuberculosis and brucellosis (undulant fever) and other diseases. Such diseases can be transmitted from cows to humans. It is important that citizens see to it that the milk in their communities is pasteurized.

City Builds Hitch Rack

At the regular meeting of the city council which occurred Friday of last week there was considerable business of importance transacted, including an order placed on the minutes of the council directing the street commissioner to commence at once the construction of 350 feet of hitch racks on First Street just off the main street east and west. The racks are to be made of board and posts seven feet long and set in the ground three feet, to which will be fastened trace chains.

This action was taken in view of the fact that there is now in the formation a state ordinance making it an offense to hitch to telegraph and telephone posts, and as there are no hitch racks worthy the name, the above order was deemed necessary. The sum of \$50 was set aside to defray expense of this improvement.

T. V. Salmon, Fred O'Dell, and N. T. Hoggie, comprising the Union Trade company, came before the council for the purpose of securing permission to build such building as they will need on the railroad right-of-way between Main and Rowe Streets and directly south of Cicero Smith Lumber yard. The reason for asking this permit was due to the fact that there was some complaint arising from the fact that the new building proposed would interfere with the city drainage and also that the erection of an elevator would endanger the balance of the town from fire loss. The gentlemen explained that in the construction of the building they would take every precaution to maintain a perfect drainage through their property and also that they did not intend to build an elevator or any structure that would harbor inflammable matter. With their assurance to this effect, the council passed an order

allowing them to proceed with their building.

An order was passed instructing the city secretary to draft an amendment to the hitching ordinance making it an offense to hitch any livestock to any telegraph and telephone poles. This ordinance will be passed at the next meeting of the council which occurs this afternoon.

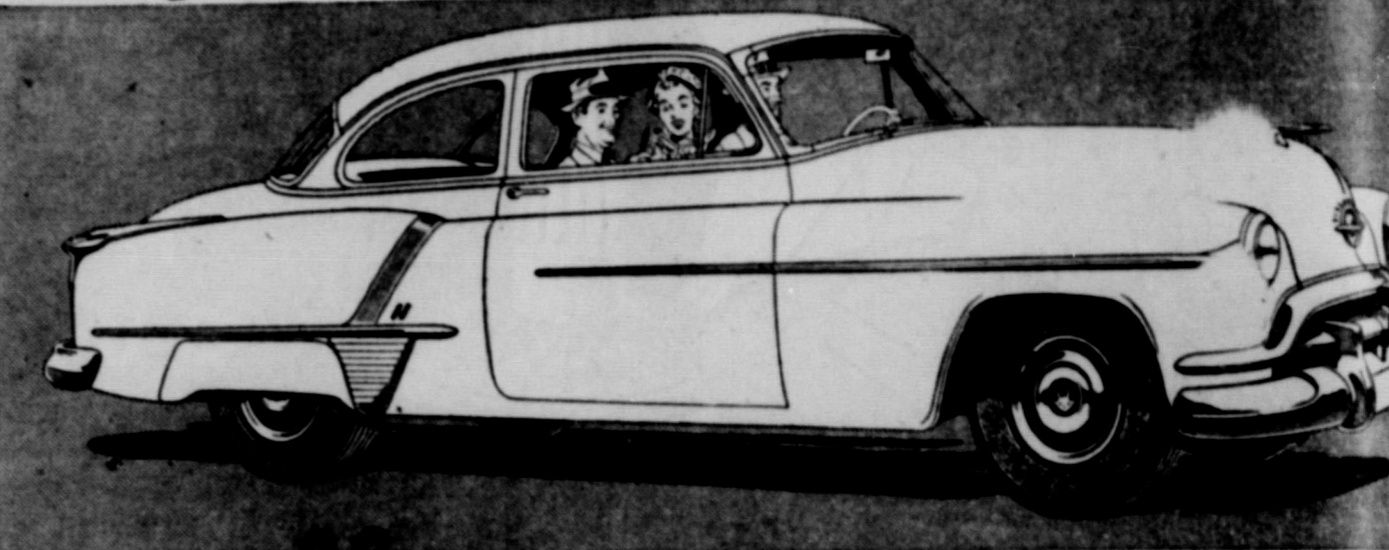

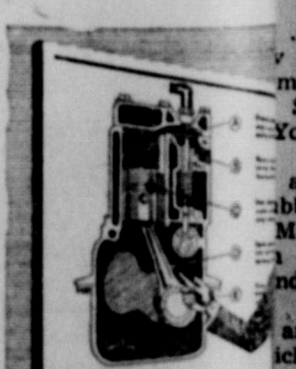
