Tigers to Play 7 Home Games On '52 Schedule

Football season may seem right now at least—to be a long way off, but it will be here before local fans realize it.

And local fans are going to get to see a lot of football here this fall, for seven of the ten games scheduled by Coach Don Leach are home games. The schedule won't be quite as tough as during the past few seasons, the coach explained, but fans can expect some very good football.

Leach was well pleased with the showing of the boys who turned out for spring grid practice. A total of 42 boys attended almost every workout, and much more competition for the various posts was prominent than in several years.

Only two regulars from last year's team were lost. They were Max Willingham, guard, and Jack Bentley, back, both of whom graduated from high school. The remainder of the regulars will be back, and the B team members of last year are showing up well. In addition, several boys have moved to McLean and will be with the team.

However, the coach is not promising an district championship team this fall. He is confident the boys will make good showings in all the games, but the lack of speed in the backfield will likely be the weakest spot.

They Tigers get off to a fairly early start when they meet the Stinnett team here September 12.

The remainder of the schedule is as follows: September 19, Pricer College here; September 26, Wheeler there; October 3, Memphrison here; October 10, open; October 17, Lefors here; October 24, Groom here; October 31, Panhandle here; November 7, White Deer here; November 14, Canadian here; November 21, Clarendon here. District games are those with Lefors, Panhandle, White Deer, Canadian, and Clarendon.

Music Normal Attendance Is Not Yet Definite

"We aren't sure yet about the attendance, but it appears that we will have a fair group at the classes of the Music Normal," Minister T. F. Shropshire of the McLean Church of Christ, said this week.

The singing school will begin June 30 and continue through July 11, and will feature three instructors. Classes will be offered in rudiments, sight singing, harmony, music appreciation, voice culture, song directing, and group singing.

The school is expected to attract students from as far north as Guymon, Okla., as far west as Texline, as far south as Quanah, and as far east as Clinton, Okla. However, it was emphasized by Guy Saunders, who has been working on publicizing the normal, the classes will be open to all local residents who care to attend, as well as to the out-of-town people.

Instructors will be Tillit S. Teddie, who will be the principal director of the school; Palmer Wheeler, who conducted a singing school here last year; and George Saunders of McLean. Teddie is a well known gospel preacher and song writer; his first songs were published as early as 1907. Wheeler, song director in the Church of Christ in Borger, has served as song director in a number of churches, and taught public school music and voice in Freed-Hardeman College for two years. Saunders is the present song director of the McLean church, and held a similar position when he made his home in Hale Center.

No charges to attend the classes will be made, it was explained. Out-of-town students will be housed in homes of local church members, and a charge of \$10 per week for room and breakfast will be made; other meals are to be eaten downtown.

Tentative schedule for classes is as follows: 9-9:30, devotional, voice culture, and instruction; 9:30-10:30, children's classes, rudiments, and beginners harmony; 10:30-11, group singing; 1-1:30, devotional, music appreciation, and instructions; 1:30-2:15, rudiments, song directing, and harmony; 2:15-3, song directing and group singing; 7:30-7:45, devotional and instructions; 7:45-8:45, rudiments, song directing, and children's classes; 8:45-9:30, song directing and group singing in auditorium (directors to be appointed).

Derbies Take First Victory From Claude

The McLean Derbies found their way into the "win" column Sunday afternoon on the local diamond, downing the Claude nine 4-6 under a hot sun.

E. M. Watson was the winning pitcher, and he racked up a total of 15 batters with strike-outs. The opposing pitchers, Clark and Maddox, were able to breeze three strikes past only nine McLean hitters.

The Claude team took an early lead, with four runs to two after the opening two frames. McLean tied it up with two runs in the fourth, and went ahead with two more in the fifth. Claude then tied the game again with two in the seventh, but the Derbies pulled out in front again in the eighth with a run by Sammy Haynes and held the lead through the next inning.

Haynes got the only homer of the day in the fourth frame. Watson led in the McLean batting average, getting two for three trips to the plate. Don Leach got three hits in five times at bat.

Prior to the Claude game, McLean had dropped four straight games, minus the services of a good pitcher in two of the four. The first game was lost by a narrow two-score margin, and the game on June 1 was lost by only one run.

Next Sunday the Derbies will play a make-up game with Washburn on the McLean diamond. The game was rained out earlier in the season. Game time is 2:30 o'clock.

Second half of the Caprock League play will begin on Sunday, June 22, when McLean travels to Groom. Other league games for June 22 are St. Francis at Panhandle; Washburn at Claude; and Hedley at Clarendon.

Wheat Harvest Opens; One Car Is Bought Here

Although wheat harvest has barely started in the McLean area, more than one car of the grain has already been bought by S. R. Jones of the McLean Gin. Jones is McLean's lone wheat buyer, and is representing the Kimbell Milling company again this year.

The first wheat coming in, however, was grown south of McLean, and the few miles difference to the south made a difference in the maturity date. Nearer McLean, harvest is expected to get going in full early next week.

First to bring in wheat was J. L. McMurtry and Son, who have completed their harvest. Jones bought from them a total of 90,925 pounds, or 1515 bushels. The grain brought \$2.05 per bushel in McLean, Jones said. The McMurtrys averaged about 26 bushels per acre on their production.

Faris Hess has already harvested considerable wheat also, and was nearly through with his cutting early this week. He had brought in four big loads by Tuesday morning.

The grain is exceptionally good so far, the local buyer said. Moisture content has been low, and the weight is better than 60 pounds. Most of the wheat in this area is expected to be of good quality this year.

'Main Street of America' Soon To Be 'Will Rogers Highway'

The 2,200-mile route of the "Main Street of America," Highway 66, is about to be given the name of one of the most distinguished Americans who ever traveled its scenic length.

Beginning Monday, June 23, at 1 o'clock, a series of ceremonies at the state borders along the eight states through which the highway passes will be held to dedicate the road as the Will Rogers Highway.

The opening ceremonies will take place at the Chain of Rocks Bridge near St. Louis, Mo. Will Rogers Jr., who portrays his famous parent in the new Warner Bros. technicolor motion picture, "The Story of Will Rogers," will be present at a number of dedication ceremonies, which will end at Santa Monica, Calif., on Tuesday, July 1.

Contractors Get Assurance of Supply of Steel

Actual work on the preparation of the roadbed for hard-surfacing the two-lane Highway 66 through McLean and on to Alameer may begin within a few days, Mayor E. J. Lander said this week.

Some of the equipment of the two construction companies awarded the contract has arrived, and more materials are expected daily, the mayor explained.

The two companies to do the work are the Austin Road company of Dallas and the Worth Construction company of Fort Worth. They were awarded the huge contract on their joint bid of \$1,560,933, after a delay of about two weeks on the part of the State Highway Department.

Grading stakes have already been put out by the engineers of the contractors. Due to erosion from both wind and rain since the roadbed work was completed months ago, some of the roadbed will have to be partially re-worked. However, G. K. Reading, resident highway engineer of Pampa, told Mayor Lander that the contractors will get the roadbed in shape for hard-surfacing quickly.

Delay on starting the work on the part of the contractors has been caused mainly by the nationwide steel strike. For a time it appeared that sufficient steel for re-inforcement purposes might not be readily available. However, the contractors now have assurances, it was reported, that the steel can be obtained.

The surface will be concrete, instead of asphalt as has been used in many new roads in this area during the past few years. It will be used on the double-lane roadbed from the Wheeler County line west to a point 1/4 of a mile west of Alameer—a total distance of 11.94 miles. Completion of the work is expected to be accomplished in 10 to 12 months.

Through McLean, the highway will be divided, with one-way traffic only on both the present highway route and what is now called Railroad Street. Curbs and gutters will be installed on both lanes. The brick paving through town will be left as it is—after it is repaired—but the present asphalt topping will be torn out.

Youth Activities Are Outlined

Sufficient money, through donations and monthly pledges, had been obtained by Rev. C. W. Parmenter, chairman of the Lions Club committee in charge, to assure proper operation of the summer youth program throughout the summer season. Rev. Parmenter solicited donations for the project Monday and Tuesday, and stated that contributions may still be made.

Coach Don Leach has been employed to work full time as the recreational director during the summer. He began his work about ten days ago and has worked out a schedule which will take care of most of the boys and girls of the area at various times during each day Monday through Friday. No supervised program for Saturday is planned.

Here's the time schedule which Leach has worked out to date: 9:30 to 11:30 a. m.—Baseball for grade school boys from 6 years of age and up at the soft-

ball field. Tuesday, 35 boys reported for the fun and sport, and Leach had two baseball games going on at one time. The attendance at this morning session has been growing each day.

2:30 o'clock p. m. until dark—Leach will be at the City Park to supervise the various activities. Specific programs for some age groups have not been worked out, but Leach stated that he will be at the park all afternoon, from 2:30 o'clock on, to supervise the use of the playground equipment, etc.

3:45 p. m.—Girls in the 5th, 6th, 7th, and 8th grades are invited to be at the park, where Leach will supervise basketball, volleyball, tennis, horseshoes, and other activities.

4 p. m. (Friday only this week, but possibly twice a week in the future)—Story-telling hour for smaller children. Leach explained that parents will have to determine whether their children

are sufficiently old to sit still long enough to hear the stories. A girl will serve as the storyteller, he said, although the girl had not been definitely selected Tuesday.

5:30 p. m.—High school boys and girls are asked to be at the park for the recreational program. The director said he hopes to organize sufficient volleyball ball teams to form a league in this age group. Also, if enough adult men indicate interest, a men's volleyball league will be formed.

The youth program will continue throughout the summer weeks, until some time in August. Leach will attend the state coaching school in August, prior to the opening of football practice, and the program will be terminated at that time.

Many of the donations made were in the form of a \$10 per month pledge for a period of three months. Smaller donations are being accepted, of course, in any amount, Rev. Parmenter said.

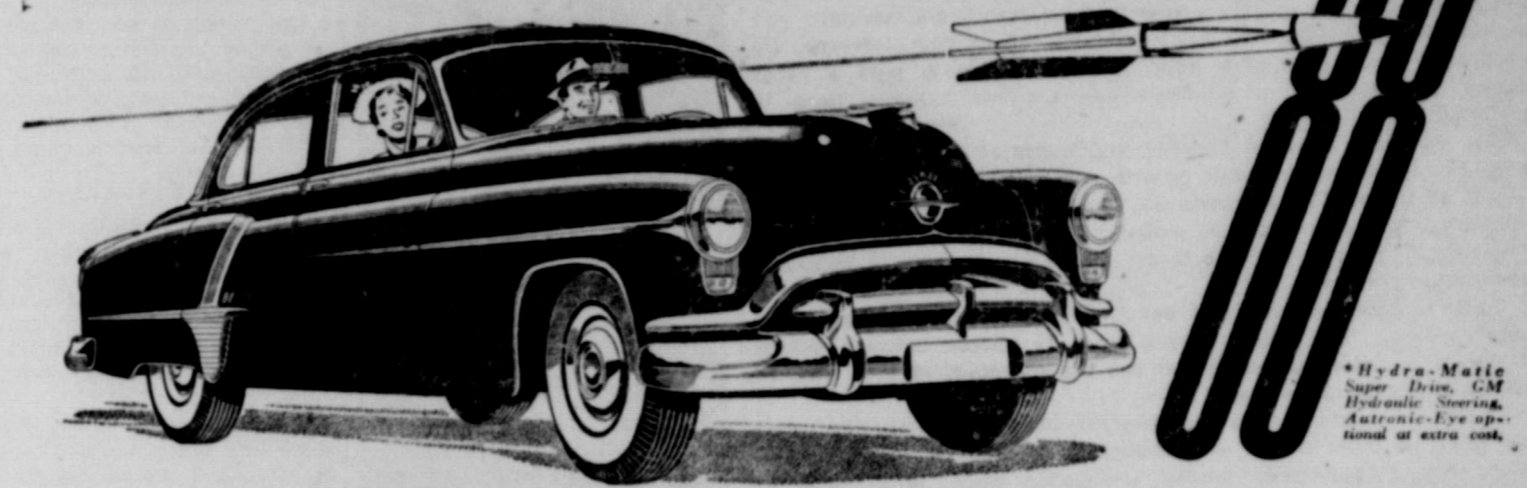

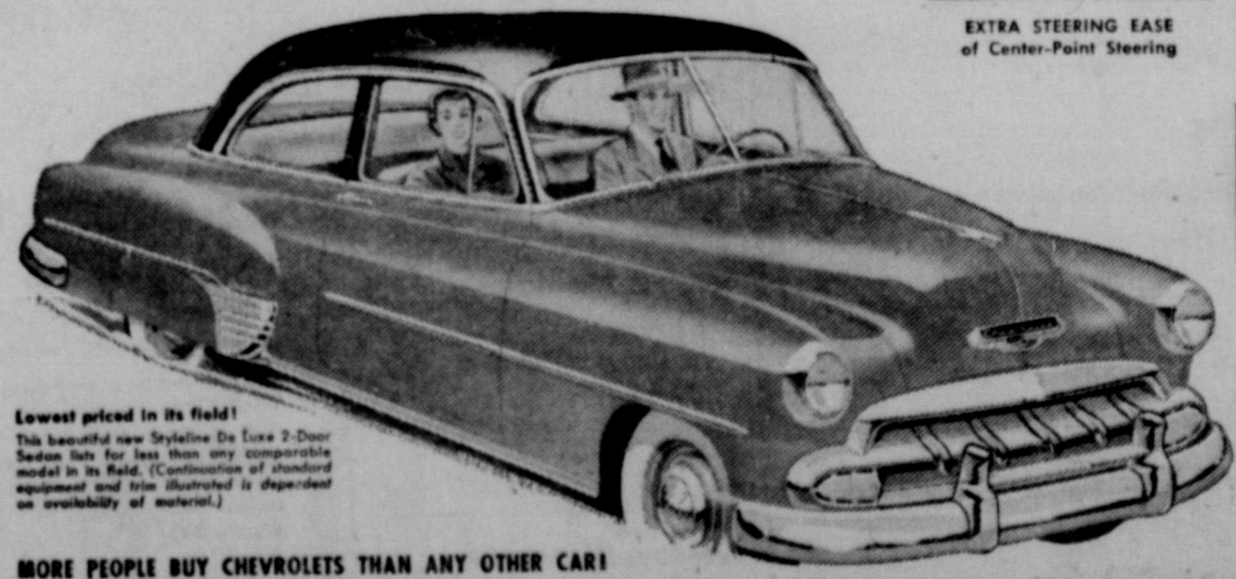

TROUBLES AHEAD

NO ONE KNOWS who the next president will be. But whatever his name and party label, he is in for a rugged time.

United States News and World Report recently dealt with what the new president will face in a brief but comprehensive feature article. As it observed, the job offers many unique assets and prerogatives. The chief executive lives in one of the most magnificent homes on earth. Legions of assistants and servants are at his beck and call. He is treated with the utmost deference by everyone. Hardly a wish goes unfulfilled. He is paid a large salary and receives a \$50,000-a-year tax-free expense fund in addition.

But all these material benefits lose much of their lustre in the light of the enormous problems with which the president must deal—and of the fateful decisions he, and he alone, must make.

The U. S. News article is called "Troubles Ahead for the Next President." Here, in capsule form, is the gist of what the magazine anticipates for him:

DEBT. Soon the national debt will touch the \$275,000,000,000 legal ceiling. The president will have to choose between asking Congress to raise that ceiling or cut the spending. Either way, he will make political enemies.

WAR. It seems certain that the Korean war will still be going on when he takes office, even though it may be relatively passive. This is a stalemate, totally unpopular war. What will he advocate to end it?

BUSINESS. Many economists think that the boom is running down. Next year, it is forecast, there will be a substantial decline in industrial expansion. There will probably be a drop in profits—and that will bring a drop in tax collections, making the budget problem still more difficult. The ranks of the unemployed will be swelled. All this may happen very soon after the next president moves into the White House.

AGRICULTURE. Some farm commodities are in a surplus state now. Other surpluses are anticipated. So, as U. S. News put it, "The next president is to be caught between the pressure of city people interested in cheaper food and a farm population insisting that government support farm prices against substantial decline."

BUREAUCRACY. The president is the titular boss of 6,200,000 people—2,500,000 civilians and 3,700,000 military. This huge payroll is one of the primary causes of our outside Federal budgets. And here again the president must make a difficult decision. In the view of U. S. News, "If he does not cut the payroll and the functions of the government bureaucracy, his financial troubles will grow. If he does cut the payroll, some people will be out of jobs, raising political fuss, and if he cuts functions, some group or region will lose a good thing and also will raise a political fuss."

These aren't all of the problems the beleaguered next president will face—not by a long shot. And great problems we can't even anticipate today may also be his. But they serve to indicate the enormous and unavoidable burdens that are part and parcel of what is accurately described as the biggest job in the world.
