These taxpayers represented farmers, ranchers, business men, and oil operators. I led the fight of these men to have these taxes lowered. IT WAS THRU MY EFFORTS AND THOSE OF TOM ROSE JR., along with the unanimous support of those present that the court reconsidered and placed a 10% raise across the board.

We adjourned and thought that everything was settled on an equitable basis. Late in the fail when the tax notices were sent out we found that the court had acted in bad faith and had left the increase on certain types of property. This was not equitable or honest on their part. The way to insure that such things do not happen in the future is to elect JOHN H. HARNLY County Judge along with a new set of County Commissioners that will see to it that taxes are assessed on an HONEST AND EQUITABLE BASIS.

Furthermore, the court tabled the proposed tax increase for further study, and if a majority of the present Commissioners Court along with the present judge are re-elected, you can look for higher taxes even though the county took in \$150,000.00 more in 1951 than they spent.

Remember that your county taxes have been increased 53% since the present judge took office, based on increases in valuation and increase in rate. All figures quoted are based on



Donley County SOIL NEWS

Although the weather has been hot, dry and windy for the past month, some farmers are still reporting good stands of grass being obtained. One of the most enthusiastic farmers over his stand of grass is H. L. Riley, who ives about five miles northeast Clarendon. Mr. Riley only planted about 9 acres this spring, out after obtaining such good results he wishes he had planted about 40 acres. Mr. Riley drilled his grass on April 17, 1952, with one of the district drills. A mixture of blue grama, side oats grama, buffalo, and weeping lovegrass was used, and some of each can be found, but the weeping love is the one that is making the showing. Part of the land planted was deep plowed last winter and part the winter of 1950 and farmed to cotton last year. The cotton land was chiseled in the spring before drilling, and has a better stand of grass on it than the land that was deep plowed last winter although both are good. Mr. Riley mowed the weeds and grass down to within two inches of the ground on June 16, and now the grass is green and has grown to an average one and one-half to two feet tall. Beside planting grass, Mr. Riley is trying to get alfalfa started on his place, and has a stand on one small area-if it would rain enough to allow it to establish

Another grass planting which ooks promising in spite of dry weather and a heavy infestation of Johnson grass is on S. M. Fedric's place about one mile north from Clarendon. Mr. Fedric planted a mixture of weeping lovegrass and madrid sweet clover May 1, 1952, on land he plowed 12 inches deep with his own equipment. There is an excellent tand of grass, sweet clover and lots of weeping lovegrass, which is harder to find in the Johnson grass because it is smaller. Mr. Fedric has mowed the area once and plans on starting to graze it this week-which will help control the Johnson grass. Beside weeping lovegrass and sweet clover, he has planted a few buffel grass seed by hand to see what this much publicized new grass will do in this area. He has some of it up, but so far it has not made as much growth as the Mrs. C. A. Myatt. weeping lovegrass.

Two other plantings were seen, on the J. T. Trew ranch near Colorado last week. Alanreed, and the other on the O. P. Blackwell half-section south stand of blackwell switch grass, but very little King Ranch blue Abbott. stem. Mr. Blackwell planted 76 acres of weeping lovegrass and madrid sweet clover mixture, and Indian grass mixture. He has a son. fair to good stand on all of it, but there are lots of weeds sapping the moisture, and if it remains dry part of the stand may





U. S. Needs Civil Defense

VOLUNTEERS ARE RESPONSIBLE FOR PROTECTING THE HOME FROM

By MILLARD CALDWELL

Federal Civil Defense Administrator All persons experienced in work having to do with health or medicine, others who can be trained in special weapons defense (against atomic, biological, and chemical warfare), are needed for the civil defense Health Service. Their big job will be to care for the injured, and protect the health of a city after an attack. 


