Contested Precinct Races Draw Greatest Interest; Polls Open at 8

It's that time of year—election time, that is. Voters who are willing to support the nominees of the Democratic primary...

Interest in this part of Gray County centered on the three precinct races—those for commissioner of Precinct 4, constable of Precinct 5, and justice of the peace of Precinct 5.

But the only contested county race, that of county judge, was attracting more and more attention. And the state races, particularly those for governor, U. S. senator, and congressman-at-large, were drawing more interest.

The Democratic national convention, however, overshadowed even the precinct politics early this week, as the coffee counters heard varied prophecies concerning whom the Democrats would name as their presidential nominee.

Star Recipes

Movie star JAMES MASON says that when it comes to food, the Turks with their centuries old culture have developed a fine palate. While on location in Turkey shooting scenes for Twentieth Century Fox's "Five Fingers", Mason discovered this exclusive recipe for Shish Kebab, a delicious dish that originated in Turkey. Translated from the Turkish it means "Skewered broiled meat". The Turks, a hearty outdoor people, usually prepare it over an open fire. Take a tip from the Turks and have Shish Kebab for your next barbecue. It's fine for indoor eating too.



SHISH KEBAB

2 lbs. leg of lamb
1 tablespoon olive oil
Juice of one lemon
Salt and pepper
1 medium onion
1 medium tomato
Bay leaves

Cut meat into one inch cubes. Mix olive oil and lemon juice and rub meat with it. Place in dish, sprinkle with salt and pepper and cover with sliced onions and tomatoes, and a few bay leaves. Let in refrigerator four or five hours. Arrange meat on spits alternately with tomatoes and onions and an occasional bay leaf. Broiling over charcoal is preferable, but it may also be done over an open wood fire or in oven broiler. Green pepper and sliced eggplant can also be inserted between meat on spits.

Public Health Is Neglecting Older People

In the past, medicine and public health have concerned themselves largely with the health and disease problems of youth and middle age, said Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer. We have neglected our aged population and have waited upon the devastations of time before extending aid to the old.

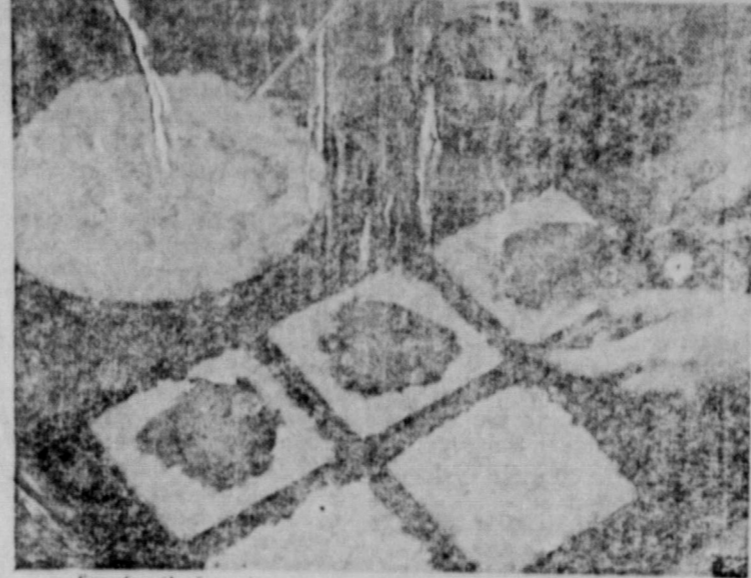
Our population each year includes an increasing number and percentage of older people. In 1950 in the United States, it is estimated that there were 11,000,000 persons over 65 years of age, as compared to 3,000,000 in 1900. In absolute numbers, aged persons among us have almost quadrupled in the last 50 years, whereas the proportion of elderly persons to the remainder of the population has merely doubled.

Dr. Cox stated that preventive medicine, private medical care, and social service have assisted in extending the life span. As encouraging as this fact may be, there is an accompanying tribulation: the aged are subject to the chronic diseases which, because of destroyed tissue structure, are especially weakened. Heart disease, cancer, diabetes, and other long-term illnesses resist the physician's most skillful attack and are notably disabling and lethal.

To insure health and peace of mind to our old people, preventive and curative medicine and social service can contribute techniques of prevention and care. These techniques should properly include the early discovery of beginning disease processes through periodic examinations that begin early in life and continue for one's remaining years. By such means many cases of chronic disease, with all their agony and sure fatality, might either be prevented or, through the substitution of different living regimes, be rendered tolerable.

Two Old Favorites Make 'New Dessert'



Two family favorites, creamy tapioca pudding and ice cream, easily add up to one of the season's most delightful desserts. Chocolate ice cream is used for the servings pictured—but other ice creams, vanilla and strawberry, for instance, are highly pleasing flavors with the creamy tapioca pudding.

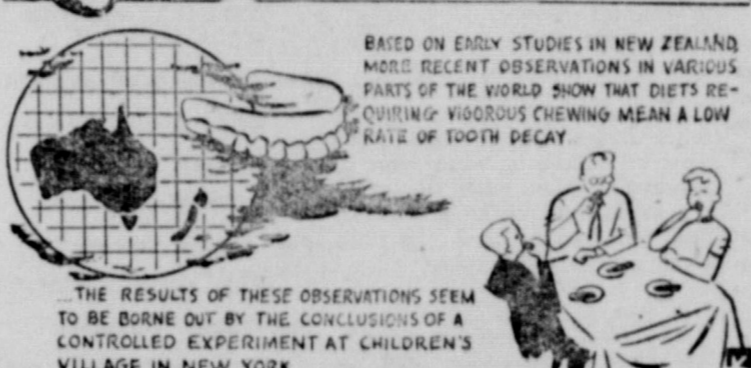
Though there's nothing new under the sun, there are seemingly endless new and delightful combinations of familiar things. This brings us to a new combination of two old-time favorites—creamy tapioca pudding and ice cream. The result is a dessert so delicious you wonder why it hadn't been thought of before. What compliments these two pay, each to the other! Any ice cream flavors may be used but vanilla, strawberry and chocolate ice cream are unusually good with the quick-cooking tapioca cream. A wise meal planner will be quick to see that this is a dessert the whole family can enjoy, and if she makes a double recipe of the pudding, she can serve Tapioca Cream at another meal with a different ice cream or perhaps a topping of fresh fruit or berries.

Tapioca à la Mode

- 1 egg white
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 1 egg yolk
- 2 cups milk
- 2 or 3 tablespoons sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 3 tablespoons quick-cooking tapioca
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
- Ice Cream

Beat egg white until foamy throughout; add 2 tablespoons sugar, 1 tablespoon at a time, and continue beating with rotary egg beater until mixture will stand in soft peaks. Set aside.
Mix egg yolk with about 1/4 cup of the milk in saucepan. Add 2 or 3 tablespoons sugar, salt, quick-cooking tapioca, and remaining milk. Place over medium heat. Cook until mixture comes to a boil, stirring constantly—this takes 5 to 8 minutes.
Pour small amount of hot mixture gradually on beaten egg white, blending well. Add remaining mixture, stirring constantly. (The hotter the tapioca and the faster it is blended in, the thicker and fluffier the pudding will be.) Add vanilla. Cool, stirring once after 15 to 20 minutes. Chill. Turn chilled pudding into serving dishes. Top each serving with a spoonful of ice cream. Makes 5 or 6 servings.

More Chewing—Less Tooth Decay

Teen-agers who give their teeth added "exercise" by chewing on hard, fibrous foods are only half as likely to develop new cavities as those eating diets in which these substances are lacking. These conclusions are drawn from an 18-month study of 266 boys at Children's Village, Dobbs Ferry, N. Y. Collaborating in the work were Dr. H. H. Neuman and Dr. N. A. DiSalvo, both of Columbia University and Dr. Wm. Lefkowitz, of the Dental Department of Montefiore Hospital, New York. The experiment was prompted by Dr. Neuman's observations in widely-separated parts of the world that diets requiring vigorous chewing are often associated with a low rate of tooth decay. In the study, 102 boys daily received 6-inch sections of sugar cane, a tough fibrous plant, which they chewed under supervision. The other 164 were divided into two control groups. One drank sugar cane juice in amounts equivalent to that contained in a section of the cane. The second got neither cane nor juice. The results showed that the first group—"the chewers"—had only half the increase in decayed, missing and filled teeth as either of the other two. As a consequence of their tests, the research directors have adopted a working theory that lack of resistance to tooth decay may be the result of structural changes in the teeth which, in turn, result from too little hard mechanical exercise.

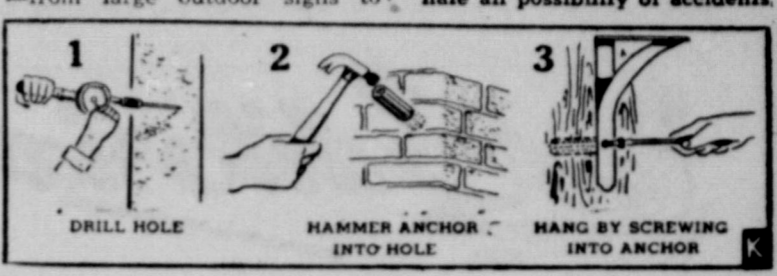

HOW TO HANG EVERYTHING

In the early days of the movies hanging a picture was a hilarious scene which usually ended with half the wall on the floor and the hero on his back. That was the time when all the homemaker had to hang were a few pictures. But today, Americans are hanging everything—bookcases, flower pots, even desks and TV sets.

Designers and decorators, conscious of the new trends, are dreaming up more and more "hanging furniture." Luckily enough for today's homemaker, developments in the technique of hanging have kept up with the new trend.

For safe hanging take a tip from factories and industrial installations which are constantly faced with the problem of hanging heavy equipment. They have found the secret of secure hanging lies in a mighty plastic mid-get, the Scru-tite screw anchor. Shown below is the method of using Scru-tites which are widely used industrially for everything—from large outdoor signs to heavy machinery, and which can be safely used in the home for everything from simple pictures to hanging bureaus.



- RULES FOR HANGING**
1. Pick your location carefully.
 2. Hang at the proper level for the particular job. Pictures at eye level, desks to suit your own needs, flower pot holders to allow for plant growth as well as room beauty, etc.
 3. Hang flat against the wall. This eliminates dust-collection.
 4. Hang safely. Normal vibrations or an accidental push can unhook a suspended piece or cause plaster to crumble. A sureproof method is to bolt directly to the wall with Scru-tite screw anchors and eliminate all possibility of accidents.

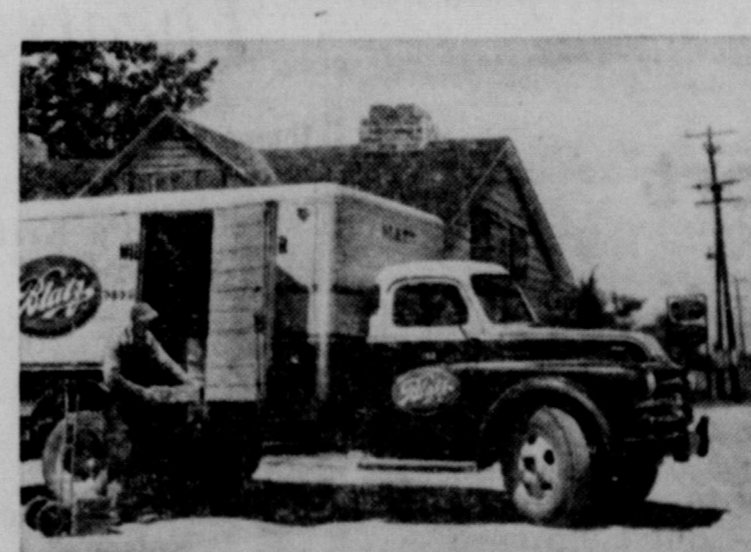

YOUR CHANCE

LAST MAY, for the first time in many years, precinct conventions of the two major political parties enjoyed a nice attendance throughout the state of Texas. The two voting precincts in McLean were no exception, with both the Democrats and Republicans holding conventions and attracting many more people than ordinarily attend such meetings.

The interest in precinct conventions, and on down through the state conventions, was brought about by desires of people all over Texas. These desires varied; some people were seeking a change in our administration; others liked things the way they are.

But whatever the desires, the voice of the people was heard by professional politicians, a voice which hadn't been loud enough to be heard in many years.

Each election year, two of these precinct conventions are held—the one in May which has already come and gone, and the next one next Saturday, July 26. Both the Democrats and the Republicans will hold such conventions in Texas on Saturday.

But, since the Republicans hold no primary election, these candidates must be nominated at the state conventions if they are to appear on the ballot.

Remember the date of the precinct conventions, this Saturday, July 26. It's the convention at which any person, so long as he belongs to the party holding the convention, may attend and have his say so. These precinct conventions should attract, once more, a large number in every precinct in the state. Will you be one of those who attend?

Donley County—SOIL NEWS

The board of supervisors of the Donley County Soil Conservation District held its monthly meeting Thursday, July 10, in the conference room of the county agent's office.

Supervisors present were J. R. Porter, C. E. Bairfield, W. P. Doherty, and Joe Tollett. T. C. D'Spain, the other member, was unable to attend.

Agency representatives present were "Flip" Breedlove, county agent, Elvy Sargent and Carman Rhodes, Soil Conservation Service employees.

Action taken by the board of supervisors at this meeting will be of interest to many cotton farmers in the district. The board voted to have the two row crop seeders (the machines the district purchased last summer to be rented out to farmers to plant winter cover crops in cotton middles) rebuilt to plant four rows in each middle instead of two rows.

This action came as a result of the expression of most every farmer using the drills last fall that two rows in each middle are not enough. Plans are under way to have these machines ready for use by the middle of August.

There was considerable discussion at the meeting regarding an offer by the Fort Worth Press to hold the Region 1 banquet in Clarendon next spring. The supervisors agreed that this would give the Donley district a lot of publicity. Final decision was not made at this meeting, however.

Elvy Sargent, district conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service at Pampa, described a change in the organization of the SCS. The office of district conservationist will be abolished and an office of area conservationist created. As a result of this change, Sargent will be transferred to Iowa Park as work unit conservationist, and the Clarendon work unit will be placed under the Amarillo area with George Taylor, now district conservationist at Childress, the new area conservationist.

Donley Farmers May Use Burs

County Agent H. M. Breedlove of Donley County has been advised by the state commissioner of agriculture that Donley County has now been released from the pink boll worm law and that cotton burs can be hauled to the farm from the gin this fall if they are immediately distributed over the land.

Farmers in Donley County will welcome this change, as it has been a good practice for years to distribute cotton burs on the land. The county agent says that this change in the law is effective as of July 6, 1952, and farmers can make plans now if they wish to carry burs home from the gin. If any changes are made at a later date, the county agent will notify farmers, it was explained.

Crop conditions and ranges in Donley County are needing rain, Breedlove said. Recent showers are spotted over the county and with a good general rain over the county, crop conditions would be boosted a great deal. Young cotton planted after the hail in parts of the county is looking good, but a good rain at this time would be a big help, he stated.

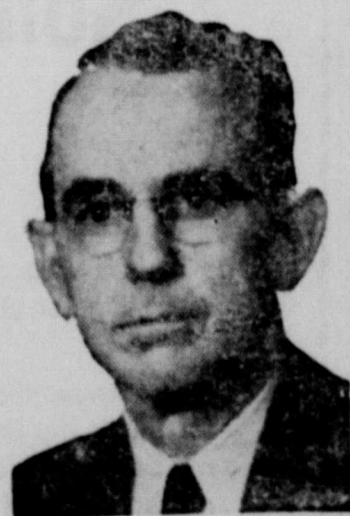

SHIVERS AGIN AUTO INSPECTION LAW;

"SHALL CHANGE IT OR REPEAL IT," He Says

Governor Allan Shivers today said that the new auto inspection law should either be modified or repealed.

The Governor told the Press before he left Austin for Houston to make a campaign appearance that he had some ideas for changing the controversial law.

His idea is to take the red tape and confusion out of the law.

"The law was intended to bring about real safety and not inconvenience," said Governor Shivers.

"We need to stop killings on the highways. Texas has become the number one State in the United States for murder on the highways.

"The Legislature passed this inspection law by a vote of 117 to 12 in the House of Representatives, and 19 to 9 in the State Senate, with the thought that it would save more than 200 Texas lives each year. If the law fails to do this and instead causes confusion and inconvenience, it ought to be changed or repealed."

The Governor said that he would recommend to the next session of the Legislature that it re-study and examine this law in view of the experience and either modify or repeal it.

(Several months ago, when it became apparent that the new law was causing inconvenience and confusion, Governor Shivers ordered it suspended until it can be reviewed by the Legislature.)
