IT'S BEEN SOME TIME now, since we have mentioned socialized medicine, principally because the new administration is opposed to socialized medicine, and Harry Truman isn't heard as often as he once was extolling its "virtues."

But something has come up which reminds us what all of you would likely be up against should this country ever adopt socialized

In the armed forces, those of you who have served know, we have a form of socialized medicine. When you go to see a doctor while in the armed forces, you, of course, are not required to pay him as you do a civilian doctor. His salary is paid by taxes.


