Ownership of optometry shops is limited to three offices. 2. Give the optometry board police authority control in addition

to having them serve as an examining board. 3. Prohibits an optometrist from leasing space on a percentage

If the small minority group who would monopolize and control optometry is successful, it may well be the beginning of many other infringements on ALL forms of business.

In reality this bill is so set up as to unionize optometry; it gives the State Board of Optometry power to act not only as an exam- March 7. ing board, but also as a police force; so should an optometrist advertise, and the board wish to regulate his practice, they can for the school board, you can force the optometrist, through their powers, to "get in line.". All of which means that whenever you curtail the rights of a man to practice his profession as he so desires, you limit free enterprise, remove all aggressiveness and cause advertising to be a forgotten word. And when that happens, the price of optometry work is likely to go beyond the reach of the ordinary person.

This issue is actually an even bigger one than simply deciding whether an optometrist may or may not run his business as he Now I would like to see a fence sees fit. 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
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

### **Use Medicine** Carefully, Says **State Doctor**

The careless or uninformed use of medicines cause much serious illness and even many deaths in Texas every year, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer, said in a statement urging the public to use caution in self medication.

"It is never safe to take medi-

cine in the dark," Dr. Cox warn-"Always read the label carefully to make sure the aspirin you expect to take is not a bichloride of mercury tablet or some other poison. As a matter of fact, poisons and medicines containing poisons should be kept together, well out of reach of children and marked in some distinctive manner. Another thing to remember is that medicines should always be taken exactly as directed by a doctor because many beneficial medicines can do untold harm if taken too frequently or in too large quantities. It is well to stop and think that you may be taking your own life in your hands when you take

medicine casually." The state health officer also warned of the danger in the inclination of many persons untrained to diagnose and treat their own ills. Such persons are apt to guess wrong, he asserted, and while they may not take medicine that is actually harmful. they are nevertheless postponing an accurate diagnosis
