Preston Smith plans to veto the state's big money bill Friday, June 20. He is expected to announce on statewide television hookup that he will veto the Legislature's one-year budget bill and when the special session to finish the unfinished business will be scheduled.

Gov. Smith told a state beautification conference in Austin that the state spends \$2 million a year in picking up trash on highways.

First Texas project under a new cooperative plan to increase capacity and safety of streets and highways in urban areas (installation of ramp metering equipment for a freeway control system on 10.2 miles of US 75 in Dallas) will be let to contract this month by the Texas Highway Dept.

Users of water from public streams must record their claims with the Water Rights Commission by Sept. 1 (Domestic and livestock users are exempt).

County Records 18 Highway Accidents

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 18 accidents on rural highways in Gray County during the month of May, according to Sergeant J. L. Dalrymple, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in two persons killed, 12 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$22,245.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first five months of 1969 shows a total of 68 accidents resulting in six persons killed, 55 persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$62,557.00.

Press Thanked By TSA Officers

Texas newspapers were lauded by an official of the Texas Safety Association for their support of the recently passed "breath test" legislation designed to help remove drunk drivers from the streets and highways of Texas.

The newspapers of Texas are to be commended for their all-out efforts to awaken the public to the drunk driver problem in our state," Robert F. Miller, Dallas, vice president of traffic safety. Texas safety association, said and added: "Without the public support by the news media passage of this greatly-needed legislation would have been extremely difficult, if not impossible."

He pointed out that drunk driver legislation had a history of being an unpopular issue in the state and that several previous attempts to enact similar remedial legislation had failed.

Texas' new "breath test" legislation was a part of Governor Smith's official program and provides for testing of traffic violators who are suspected of driving while intoxicated on the state's streets and highways.

Permit Required For Stream Use

The Texas Water Rights Commission announced that final notice of the recording deadline under the Water Rights Adjudication Act of 1967 has been given. Everyone who is using water from a public stream who does not claim under the State must record his claim by Sept. 1, 1969. Users of water for domestic and livestock watering purposes are exempt from this requirement.

Failure to timely record the claim will "extinguish and bar" the claim of water right according to Section 4 of the Adjudication Act. All affected water users who have not already filed their claim are urged by the commission to do so as soon as possible.

Valued claims will be recognized to the extent of maximum use of water without waste during any year between 1963 and 1967. Where the user was in the process of constructing a system or had facilities to use a larger amount of water on the effective date of the Act than he had actually used, use from 1968 to 1970 may be recognized.

Further information and forms for recording claims under the Water Rights Adjudication Act may be obtained from the Texas Water Rights Commission, Box 12396, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas 78711.

Mrs. Johnston Host Swap-a-Hobbi Club

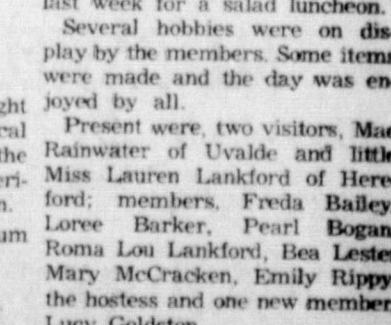
The Swap-a-Hobbi Club met with Maggie Johnston Tuesday of last week for a salad luncheon.

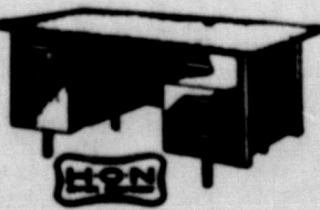

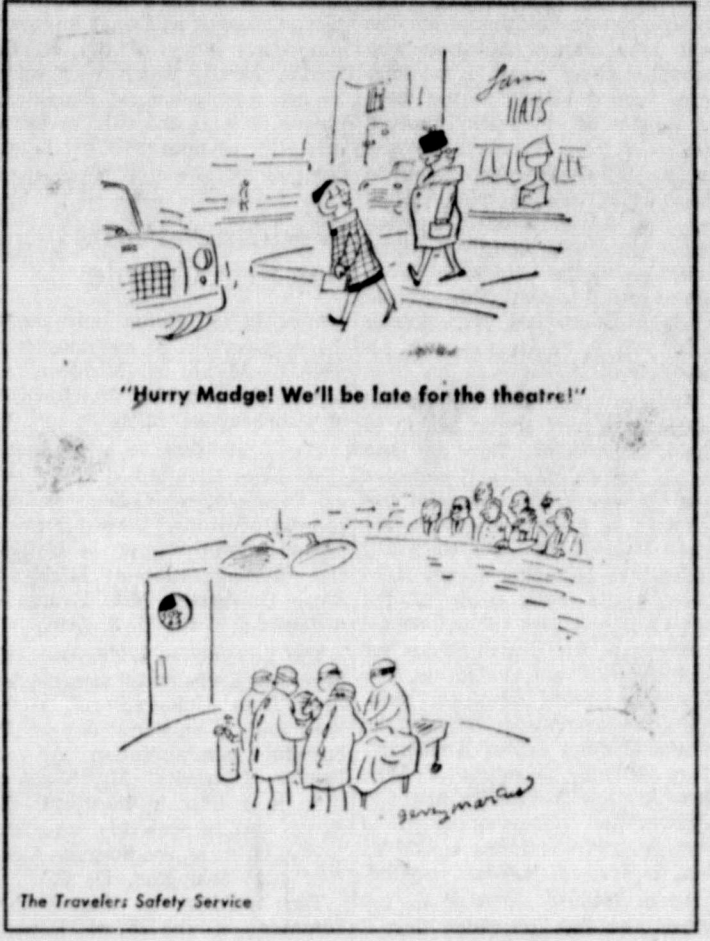

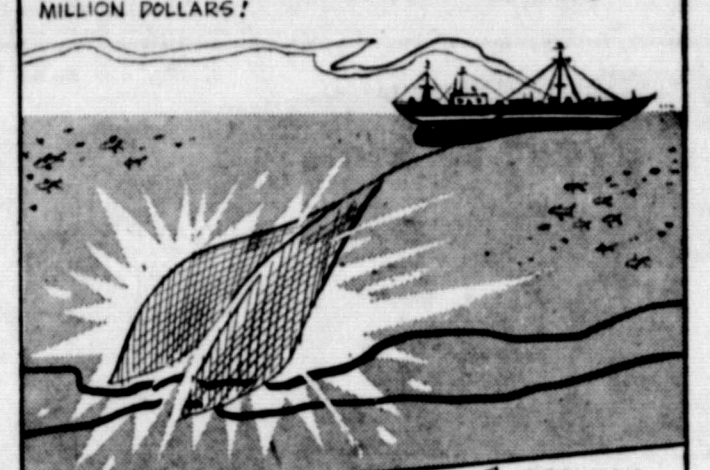

MORE ON THE WATER SOLUBLE VITAMINS

Today is the fourth of our series of columns on the fat-soluble and water-soluble vitamins. Of the latter, last week we covered the essential B-vitamins, thiamin and riboflavin. Today we'll talk about niacin, pyridoxine, pantothenic acid, folic acid, vitamin B12 and vitamin C.

Niacin is the vitamin that prevents pellagra, a dread disease that plagued the world until nutrition investigators, beginning in 1914 began to crack the mystery of its causes. Niacin helps keep the nervous system healthy, it helps the cells use other nutrients, and it helps keep your skin, your mouth and tongue, and your appetite and digestive tract in good condition.

Food Sources

Important food sources are peanut butter, meat, fish, poultry, enriched or whole grain breads and cereals, and milk (which is high in an amino acid, tryptophan, which the body converts to niacin and is thus classed as a niacin equivalent).

Pyridoxine and pantothenic acid complete the five B vitamins (the others are thiamin, riboflavin and niacin) that serve as catalysts that have important and often related functions of helping us build up and maintain our body cells and tissues. Our best food sources of pyridoxine are muscle meats, liver, vegetables and whole grain cereals. Few foods are poor sources of this vitamin. Milk suffices to supply infants with adequate amounts. Pantothenic acid is available through a wide choice of foods. Liver and eggs are especially good sources. Broccoli, white and sweet potatoes, tomatoes, molasses are quite high in this vitamin.

Folic acid and vitamin B12 work together to combat anemia. Folic acid is necessary if your bone marrow is to do its job of manufacturing blood cells. Vitamin B12 is essential for animal growth. We are not sure, but it may have a growth promoting effect in man. Pernicious anemia is the serious disease due to too little vitamin B12. This is due not to too little vitamin B12 in the diet but, rather, to a failure of the intestinal tract to absorb this vitamin. A great deal more needs to be known to determine the full role of vitamin B12 in body processes and its absorption by the body from food. Meantime, its importance in preventing pernicious anemia suffices to class it essential in your diet.

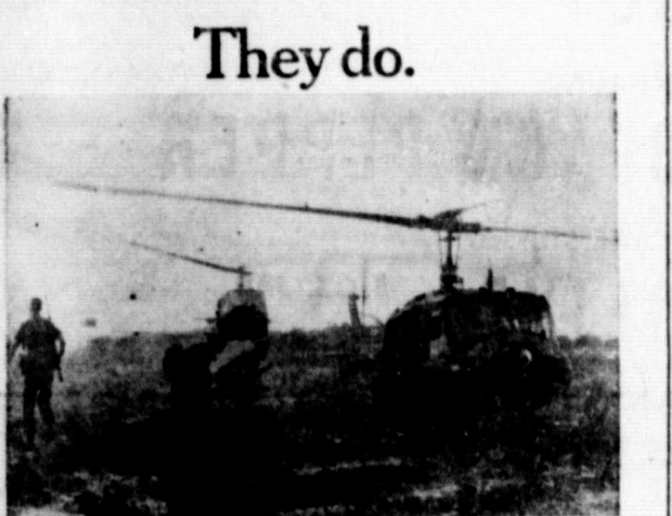
How to Obtain
 Good foods for obtaining folic acid include liver, dry beans, lentils, asparagus, broccoli and spinach. Others include lima beans, cabbage, sweet corn, turnip greens, lettuce, beet greens, and whole wheat products. Vitamin B12 is found in animal protein foods such as liver, kidney, muscle meats, milk, cheese, fish and eggs.

The variety of foods involved in giving you enough of these vitamins is an excellent demonstration of why nutritionists promote the four food groups for daily meal planning. All of us simply cannot be dietitians. So we need a more general approach to feeding our families adequately, including getting enough of every essential vitamin.

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LOOKIN' BACK

Remember Kenneth Bee (Petie) Everett and his wife Frankie (Tucker)? Petie, youngest son of Peb and Vergie Everett—long time resident of McLean—right now should be proud he chose Frankie from among his many dates on and off the campus of good old Tiger-land. Frankie is the daughter of Mrs. Lucille Gaines and the granddaughter of Mrs. W. E. Kennedy, both early settlers of Alaneed.

It seems, according to the daily newspaper published in Jackson, Tennessee, that Frankie's artistic mind coupled with her imagination has brought the Everetts a fortune, as well as share in the finding of a group of original Audubon paintings. The Everetts now live at 54 Elmwood, Jackson, Tenn.

It all started back in the 1820's when the "Wabash House" was built on a street by the same name in Evansville, Indiana, and slate panels were placed attractively around the huge fireplace. On these panels were oil paintings. Then when the house was remodeled in the 1880's the paintings were covered over with brown paint, the decorator never realizing that they were of significant value, that one day the artist whose intricate and delicate strokes brought birds and animals to life on canvas (or slate) would be recognized as one of America's greatest naturalists and painters.

But back to Frankie and Petie: A few years ago the Wabash House was demolished and the old man hauling away the rubbish gave a neighbor woman those six slate panels. The neighbor had no use for them, so she stored the panels in her basement where overflowing waters from the Ohio River flooded them every time the river crested its banks.

Last year this woman sold her home and moved to Memphis, Tenn. On a return trip to Evansville to pick up the last of her belongings she asked Frankie, her friend while the two families lived in Evansville, to accompany her. While in the basement, Frankie spied the panels and asked what was to become of

them. The friend didn't want them, so Frankie loaded them in her station wagon and took them back to Jackson with her. She threw them on the dog house where they weathered the snows and sleets of the winter months.

With spring, came house cleaning and at this time it was decided to cut the panels in smaller pieces and place them in cement around the Everett's fireplace. One side was smooth but covered in brown paint. The Everetts applied automobile paint remover and left it to do its work.

Ten minutes later Frankie screamed for Petie and the two

worked like mad to remove the paint from what showed to be oil paintings. It appears now that these are the originals by the real John James Audubon who actually lived near Evansville from around 1910-19 in the town of Henderson, Kentucky, across the river from Evansville. While cruising down the Ohio River in the early 1820's (a trip verified by my encyclopedia) Audubon must have sold or given these paintings to the boulder of Wabash House. Evidently his artistic work was covered with brown paint when the house was remodeled in 1880's.

Anyway, those slate panels will never be a part of the hearth of the Everett home. They are destined for walls of art galleries and perhaps in the homes of collectors. At present they are exhibited in the Brook's Memorial Gallery in Memphis, Tenn. Here photographs were made of the paintings and sent to various art galleries in the United States for identification and evaluation. The Louisiana State Museum said, "The photographs do suggest the works of John James Audubon." The Kennedy Museum of Fine Arts in New York City has forwarded the photographs on to their expert on Audubon, and at last report, he had not replied.

Meanwhile the Everetts are excited over the knowledge that if these are really authentic Audubons, one is worth \$60,000! Can you multiply? Six times \$60,000! That might call for application of the new math!

Congratulations, Frankie and Petie! I am glad that I can say, "I knew them WHEN!"
