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Palo Duro Park— LOOKING FOR URANIUM

"Palo Duro Canyon State Park is the best spot in the Texas Panhandle to prospect for uranium, and we've made it possible for anyone to take a chance at today's biggest bonanza," Pete Cowart, park manager, says.

He refers to the newly-opened concession to rent Geiger counters. This, he thinks, gives Panhandle residents an opportunity to experiment with a Geiger counter, have fun, and maybe find uranium without having to travel great distances or invest in expensive equipment.

"Anyone who finds a deposit of ore assaying as much as 20 per cent uranium per pound is eligible for the \$10,000 reward given by the Atomic Energy Commission," Cowart says. "Amateurs have as good a chance at that bonus as experienced prospectors."

Is there uranium in Palo Duro Canyon?

"If I knew where there was a deposit of uranium in this canyon, I wouldn't be sitting here renting Geiger counters," Cowart answers. "No one knows whether there is uranium in the canyon, and the only way to find out is to test every rock exposure with a Geiger counter."

Cowart says the AEC lists three types of sedimentary rocks as most likely to contain uranium, and all three types are found in Palo Duro Canyon. The canyon has not been thoroughly prospected yet, either. Only a few visitors have taken Geiger counters into the canyon.

The Geiger counters rented at the park are the simplest, but not the least expensive, made. They record clicks in ear phones, the number of clicks increasing greatly when radioactive minerals are found. Everyone renting a counter gets a sheet of simple instructions on its operation and another page of tips on where to look. It's so easy that grade school youngsters enjoy prospecting.

The state of Texas owns minerals under the park, so if anyone finds a deposit of paying ore he will have to negotiate a lease on the area of the park involved, Cowart says.

This is the first time Geiger counters have been rented in a Texas state park, Cowart thinks.

it is the first time in the nation that the atomic-age devices have been used as a recreational attraction.

Palo Duro Canyon State Park is one of three Texas state parks which charge admission. This is because the state is still paying for land within the park. The state's share of proceeds from the Geiger counter concession will help to pay that debt.

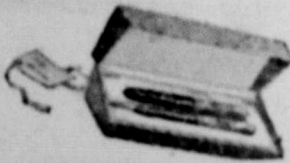

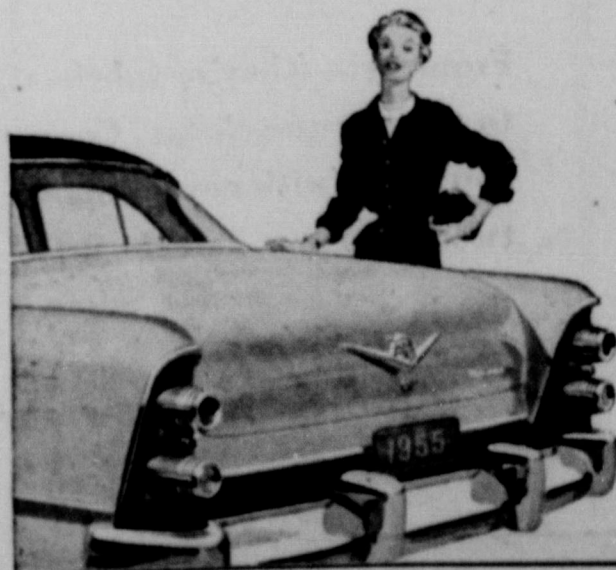

Editorial

ABOUT EMPLOYMENT

LATELY THERE has been a great deal of discussion about the employment situation, with the emphasis on unemployment. As is inevitable in such matters, much of the talk seems to have generated more heat than light, and has tended to create an erroneous or distorted view.

This is not to deny the fact that there is unemployment. Recent figures indicate 270,000 out of work in Michigan, which is one of the big surplus-labor areas in the nation. Much of this unemployment is due to seasonal shutdowns in the automotive industry. Late reports also indicate full-time unemployment in Illinois at 350,000. To take another example, sales of coal have dropped, and again the unemployed rolls show the trend. But such events are not reflections of the whole picture, and in the cases mentioned there is real hope that changes for the better are coming.

Secretary of Labor Mitchell recently wrote a review of labor's status which appeared in a number of large dailies. It contains some highly interesting facts and opinions, and it may help to correct a number of misconceptions.

Mr. Mitchell begins by stating that "the working men and women of America are doing well." For the past two years, production line workers have averaged \$70 a week. In September, the average reached \$71.85, the highest level for that month in history. Take-home pay—the amount the worker actually gets after all the payroll deductions are made—also reached a new high of \$66.78 in September.

Then the secretary observed that "this is not the full story of our progress"—obviously, if prices had continued to show substantial increases, the mere wage figures would have small meaning. But, for two years, prices have shown a remarkable degree of stability. So our "real wages"—our actual purchasing power—have risen, too.

Mr. Mitchell does not minimize unemployment—the government, he writes, is taking all possible steps to reduce it. But he points out that, while there are just over 3,000,000 unemployed, 62,000,000 people are employed. He writes, "I believe that in our national concern over the welfare of the individual worker this employment side of the picture has received too little attention."

The secretary also describes some of the activities of his department. It maintains 1,700 employment offices, and last year these helped place 16,000,000 men and women in jobs. It works with both labor and management, promoting training to fit people for higher skilled jobs. It has instigated factory safety programs which have produced striking results. It enforces the wage and hour laws. It collects and publishes all manner of facts and information about jobs. To quote him once more, "In the labor department, we take very seriously our mandate from congress to promote, develop, and foster the welfare of the wage earners of the United States. To us this means all the wage earners—organized and unorganized."

I just knew we had a three touchdown better team than the Pirates. And that we did last Friday night. That particular date was the time when it counted, too, and it was a decisive victory, and there's no doubt about it any more.

In all my days, I've never seen a citizenry in general get more "het up" about a football game than had ours during the last week. I thought Lester Dysart summed it up pretty well in the few remarks he made to the students at the pep rally last Friday afternoon. Lester said, "I've been here a long time, and this is the most important game there ever has been." To most of us, I guess it was.

McLean will play either Dimmitt, Springlake, or Amherst in the bi-district game. Probably Dimmitt. We can beat any of the three if the boys are up to par. And I know they will be. I am 38 years of age. I went to school at Wellington during all my grade and high school work. I went to three different colleges. Honestly, I am proud of our team. They are a fine bunch of boys, in addition to being a fine football team. I am proud of the coaches, Hap and Clint, too, for without their leadership and coaching ability, the team wouldn't have had the "go" and the will to win. It takes a combination of good linemen, good backfield men, good coaches, and good town spirit, to produce the kind of a team we have this year. My congratulations to all of you.

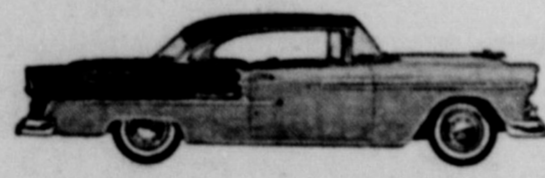

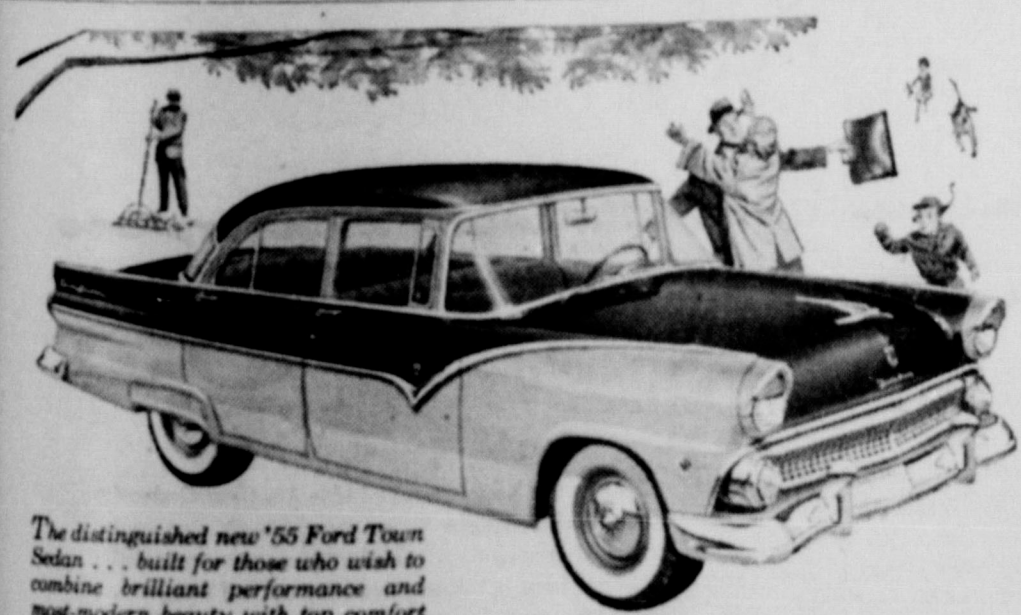

to either school, then each would name his chosen home field, and a coin would be flipped to decide the location.

The time of the game must also be decided. Right now, Thanksgiving Day (Thursday, November 25) looms as the best bet. But it could be played either of the following two days, November 26 or 27. One of these latter dates might be chosen if some other game should be played to interfere, such as Class AA play-offs, etc.

So these many details are among the things to be worked out at the meeting.

Then What?
The winner of the 1-A and 2-A game will advance into the regional play-off contest.

There are 32 Class A districts in Texas. First, bi-district games are played, with 1 and 2 meeting, 3 and 4 meeting, 5 and 3 meeting, and so on down the line. (This leaves 16 teams in the running). Then the regional games are next, and the winner will in effect be champion of four districts. (This leaves eight teams in the running). Next comes the quarter-finals, with four eventual winners. Then the semi-finals, and last, the finals. In other words, for a team to win the state championship, it must win five straight post-season games.

The dates of the various games are as follows: bi-district November 25, 26, or 27; regional, December 3 or 4; quarter-finals, December 10 or 11; semi-finals, December 17 or 18; finals, December 24 or 25.

Of the 32 districts, 22 championships are already decided, and the remaining ten will be decided this week-end. (November 20 is the last day for certifying district champs.) McLean, if it is victorious over its bi-district opponent, will meet the winner of the Hale Center (District 3) and Sundown (District 4) game. All of the above details concerning the site, time, etc., of the game will have to be worked out each week as the play-offs continue.

There will, of course, be no tie games in the play-offs. In the event the scores are tied, penetrations are the deciding factor; if penetrations are even, then first downs are the deciding factor; and if first downs are also even, then yards gained are used to determine a winner.

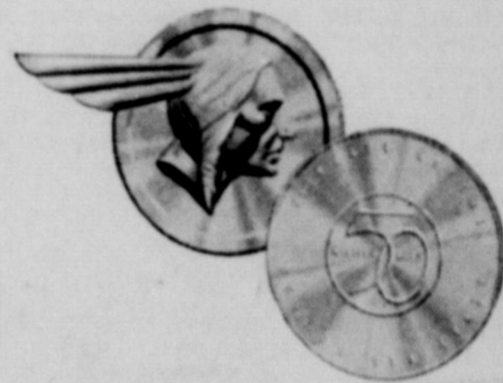

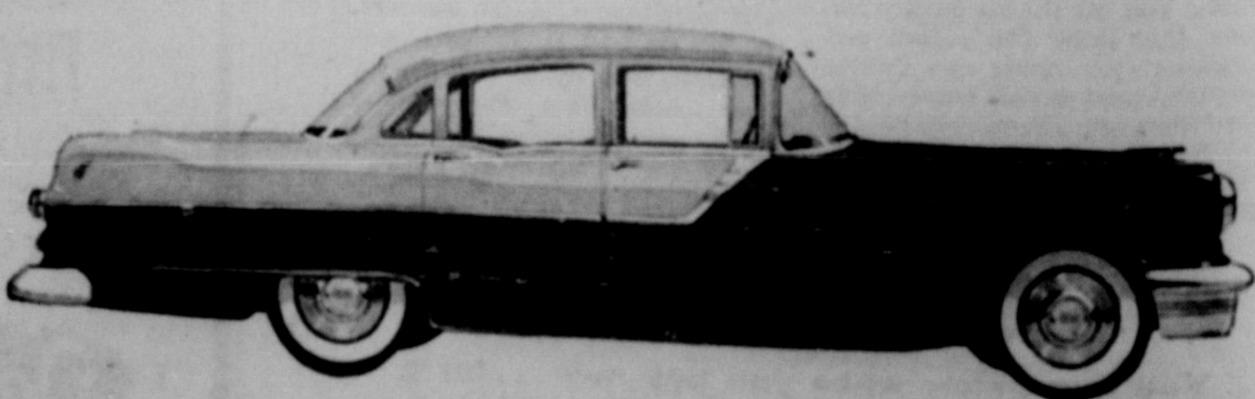
