**Tigers to Meet Sundown Roughnecks At Canyon Friday for Regional Game**

**GRADE SCHOOL CAGE DISTRICT IS ORGANIZED**

A grade school basketball district for this area was organized at a meeting of interested coaches and administrators at Albreed Monday night of last week. Bob McCollum, Albreed school superintendent who was chosen as chairman, has announced.

Teams in the league are McLean, Shamrock, Kellerville, Albreed, Lefors, and Clarendon.

The district is being organized to promote good feeling and sportsmanship among the grade schools of this area, to improve the quality of officiating at the grade school level to give a greater incentive to each game played, and to give the member teams a definite and pre-arranged schedule to play, McCollum explained.

The league is to be known as the Eastern Panhandle Grade School League, and will consist of one boys' and one girls' team from each member school. The teams will play a double round-robin series on a home and home basis. Trophies will be awarded to the first three teams in each division. Admission to the games will be 15 cents for students and 25 cents for adults.

A tentative schedule has been worked out, with the opening round of play scheduled for next week. However, the nights for playing and the time of starting each game has not been definitely determined. In the first week's pairings, McLean plays at Kellerville, Clarendon at Shamrock, and Lefors at Albreed.

**STORES CLOSE; TICKETS GO ON SALE HERE**

The second game in the play-off series which the Tigers hope will be another step toward an eventual state championship will be played in Buffalo Stadium, Canyon, beginning at 2:30 o'clock Friday afternoon.

The game will match the Tigers, victorious over the Dimmitt Bobcats 49-13 last Thursday afternoon in the 1-A, 2-A bi-district game, with the powerful Sundown Roughnecks, champion by a 33-13 score over the high-scoring Hale Center Owls. The Roughnecks are District 4-A champs, and the Owls won District 3-A.

Practically all business establishments in McLean will close their doors at noon Friday to allow all fans an opportunity to attend the game. A petition was circulated early Monday morning, and 27 businessmen had signed it by 10 o'clock; several others who were missed in the initial rounds with the petition are expected to be willing to close also. Mayor Pro Tem Ruel Smith issued a proclamation, designating Friday as "Beat Sundown Day," and requested all business houses to close.

Five hundred reserved seat tickets were placed on sale early this week in McLean. The ducats are \$1.25 each, the same price as will be charged at the gate for general admission. Student tickets will be \$1.00.

The Tigers took over a punt on their own 16 late in the first period. Three running plays moved it to the 44. From there, Mantooh passed to Smith to the Dimmitt 40, and Smith raced untouched to pay dirt. Haslam converted, 21-0.

The Bobcats bounced right back, moving from the kick-off return on their own 37 to the McLean 12. From there, Dennis went around right end to score. Don Mobley passed to Clinton Glenn for the point, 21-7.

The third quarter went scoreless. Late in the third period, the Tigers took over on their own 30, and moved to the Dimmitt 14. On the second play in the fourth quarter, Mantooh went around right end 14 yards to score. Haslam converted, 28-7.

A few plays later, the Bobcats were forced to punt. James Smith took the punt on the Dimmitt 46, skirted to the right and raced the distance in a dazzling run to score. Haslam converted, 35-7.

Later, the Tigers recovered a Bobcat fumble on the Dimmitt 49. On the first play from scrimmage, Troy Smith passed to Farren, who made a sensational run of 35 yards to score. Haslam converted, 42-7.

Shortly after the kick-off, Mantooh recovered Bobby Brock's fumble on the Dimmitt 26. Two plays later, Troy Smith passed from the 24 over the goal to Tracy Cooper. Haslam converted, 49-7.

The Bobcats, starting from their own 37, made a sustained drive downfield. Whitworth finally went around left end from the four to score. Dennis missed the kick, 49-13. With only 33 seconds remaining to play, the Tigers had time for only two plays before the game ended.

For Ends Jimmy Farren and Rodney Gunn, it was a good field day—both made touchdowns, with Farren making a nice 35-yard run after catching his touch-down-bound pass.

Curry has had one of the machines for some time, and it has brought her much happiness. The machines are slow speed typewriters. They are the property of the federal government and are loaned by the State Commission for the Blind in Texas. They may be kept for an indefinite length of time as long as they are used by the borrower. The only charge is for the shipping costs to and from the state library in Austin. Records are available through the state library free of charge.

"I am writing you to ask you to help my unit in our operation Santa Claus for homeless war orphans. I am Corporal Billy M. West, husband of Geraldine West, Box 214, McLean. I am serving in the army in Pusan, Korea, as mess sergeant. Our unit supports an orphanage of 184 homeless war orphans

ranging from the ages of 2 to 10. We help these children in many ways, such as food, clothing, and fuel, which would not be possible without the help of the people back home.

"Our unit has built a shower house, and have now in the planning a building to be used as sleeping quarters for these children. The new building will increase the capacity of this orphanage to 300.

"I am sure that any help your paper can give this purpose will be deeply appreciated by these orphans and our unit."

Corporal West enclosed with his letter a mimeographed letter, which explains that discarded garments are needed by the little Koreans. The clothing should be wearable, and all shoes should have good soles and heels, since repairing is expensive there. However, the Koreans can re-cut the garments as necessary. Items such as candy, soap, tooth brushes, and whole pieces of clothing, are very welcome. Money can also be sent.

All parcels should be mailed to Operation Santa Claus, Hq. and Hq. Co., 503rd Engineer Group (Maint and Sup.), APO 973, San Francisco, Calif.

A number of McLean fans went to Plainview last Friday to see Sundown defeat Hale Center. I felt all along that Sundown would probably beat Hale Center, and apparently the high winds aided the Roughnecks in accomplishing the feat.

The local people who saw the game say that the Roughnecks are just as rough as their name.

They have a mighty good team. Incidentally, Sundown is undefeated so far this season, and has beaten some very good teams by very good scores.

At the McLean-Dimmitt game, a couple of coaches from Sundown were scouting McLean and Dimmitt. One of them told me that the school district there has a taxable evaluation of 33 million dollars. The school gets state aid for 24 teachers, but has 36 in the system. Each year the athletic fund gets \$4,500 expense money, and the same amount is given to the band. The school has five coaches.

So you can see that if money helps build a strong football team, Sundown should have one.

Sundown won the district last year, and also won the bi-district over Hale Center. In the regional contest, the Roughnecks edged Memphis by a few points when a last-minute touchdown was made.

I'm told the Roughnecks use the Split T formation in their offensive plays. J. W. Meacham, who went to the game at Plainview, says the Sundown quarterback is really a whiz. He is not only an excellent ball handler, but is a good, hard, and fast runner. The fullback is also an excellent runner.

The Split T formation is one which has gained popularity in many schools because of its many option plays. The only difference I can tell between the Split T and the straight T is that the two halfbacks put considerable more distance between themselves and the fullback than in the straight T. The quarterback must be a good ball handler, and he must also have the ability to change his mind quickly in the many option plays. Meacham tells me this Sundown quarterback is capable of doing what he's supposed to do—and the trouble is, it's hard to tell who has the ball.

It was the general consensus of those who saw Sundown play last week that McLean can beat them all right, but the Tigers will just have to outscore them.

Frankly, I think we'll beat them. Again this week, we just gotta win.

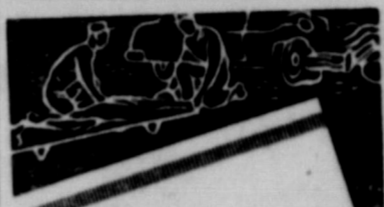

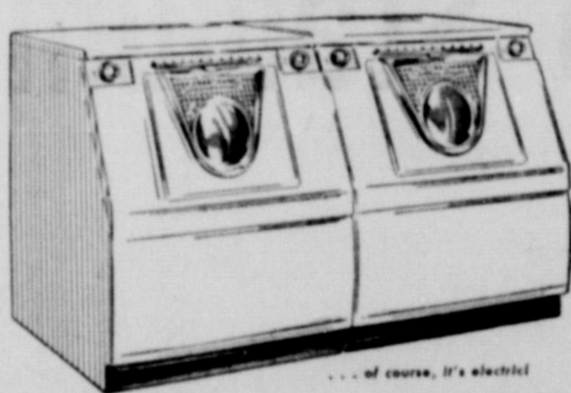

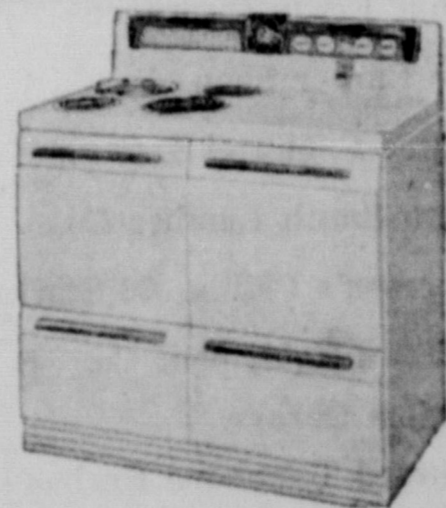
