## THREE NAMED NEW OFFICERS GRAY COUNTY

Gray County commissioners named three new county officers at a meeting in Pampa Monday. Appointed as county medical officer was Dr. Joe Gates; as county juvenile officer, H. A. Doggett; and as county welfare officer, Mrs. Nina Spoonmore. The appointments were to become effective Tuesday.

Mrs. Spoonmore will be in McLean every other Wednesday afternoon at 1 o'clock at the City Hall, County Judge Bruce L. Parker has announced. She will be in Lefors and Alameda in the mornings of the same days. The welfare office is in the courthouse, and emergency cases in McLean may apply to J. W. Meacham, home service officer of the American Red Cross.

Dr. Gates will be at the Highland General Hospital in Pampa every week day except Wednesday from 9 to 10 o'clock in the morning to handle county patients, it was explained.

Dr. Gates, a physician with the Medical and Surgical Clinic in Pampa, is a graduate of Southwestern Medical School in Dallas. He will receive a salary of \$3,600.

Doggett, who has been serving as constable of Precinct 2, resigned from that office Monday morning. He will be employed jointly by the city of Pampa and Gray County as juvenile officer at a salary of \$3,000.

Mrs. Spoonmore, the new welfare officer, was reportedly to receive a salary of \$3,000 per year. The county has not had a welfare officer for the past two years.

## TWO MEN OPEN AUTO REPAIR SHOP IN CITY

A new auto repair shop was opened for business this week by the owners, Amos Thacker and Gene Greer.

The business, to be known as the Thacker and Greer Garage, is in the new building adjacent to the Consumers Supply station on the south lane of Highway 66.

Both of the new owners are well known, having been in the auto repair work for a number of years. Greer has been operating his own shop in the rear of the G and G Automotive Supply for several months, and Thacker was formerly with the Andrews Equipment company.

The new building, constructed by Ted Glass and Arthur Dwyer, owners of the Consumers Supply station, is approximately 30 by 48 feet. It has been built to afford a maximum amount of light.

The building contains a two-post hydraulic car lift, and a chain hoist which extends most of the length of the building. Thacker and Greer have installed a Hunter-wheel balancing machine and Allen tune-up equipment, in addition to the equipment the two men already had.

The building is of block construction. The seal coating of paint has been put on, and the final coat of paint will be of a cream color to match the rest of the building which also houses the station and Edwards Grocery.

## LEGIONNAIRES HEAR TALK BY LOU ROBERTS

A disappointingly small crowd turned out Tuesday night for the birthday party held by the Floyd-Corbin-Florey Post 315, American Legion, but Lou Roberts of Amarillo, past state commander, delivered an interesting address to the slightly more than 20 attending.

Roberts opened his talk with a short history of the founding of the American Legion. He attended the caucus in Paris in 1919 when the foundation of the organization was laid. The talk concerned the work accomplished for the disabled veterans, widows, and children of World War I, and the Legion-sponsored benefits granted to veterans of World War II and the Korean War.

The past commander urged all veterans to join the Legion in the fight to maintain the present benefits and to work together to keep open the V. A. hospitals now in operation. He pointed out that even these are inadequate to meet the needs of the present disabled veterans. He also urged the younger veterans to rebuild the Legion to its position as spokesmen for the veteran population—more than one million in Texas alone.

Roberts also commended the Legion Auxiliary (wives of Legion members) for their assistance in furthering the child welfare program and the rehabilitation of the disabled. A huge birthday cake, decorated in the national colors with 36 candles on the second tier, sandwiches, soda, and coffee were served. "The Legionnaires, other veterans, and their families who were invited and did not attend, missed a rare opportunity to hear an accomplished speaker and to become better acquainted with their fellow veterans," Bill Kingston, post commander, pointed out.

### TWO MEN BUY DAY FURNITURE STORE IN CITY

**INCOME TAX FACTS No. 8**  
**New Savings for Investors, Farmers and Businessmen**

*(This is one of a series of articles on income tax changes. The articles are based on information provided by the American Institute of Accountants and the Texas Society of Certified Public Accountants.)*

Investors, businessmen, and farmers all benefit from some of the thousands of changes affecting the taxes you pay this year. These changes, for the most part, apply to the entire tax year of 1954. These articles apply to the taxpayer who reports for the calendar year and who keeps his books on a cash basis. Taxpayers who are on the accrual basis or who use a fiscal year not ending on December 31 should pay particular attention to the official instructions and get qualified assistance if needed.

**Declarations of Estimated Tax**  
 A farmer whose expected 1955 income would require him to file a declaration of estimated tax can postpone filing the declaration until January 15, 1956. If he files his final 1955 tax return by February 15, 1956, and pays his tax in full, there is no need to file the declaration at all.

**Declarations are required of fewer persons this year.** You can forget about the declaration entirely if your income is expected to be less than \$5,000 (\$10,000 in the case of a joint return or head of household) and will not include more than \$100 from sources other than wages from which tax is withheld. Otherwise you should check the official instructions to see whether you must file a declaration by April 15 along with your tax return for 1954.

**Business and Professions**  
 Businessmen have long complained that government rules did not allow them to depreciate their assets on a realistic basis, particularly in the early years of the life of a building, a machine or other asset. The new law allows as much as twice the depreciation in the first year compared with the old straight-line rates.

Here are some other important changes:  
 1. Easier deduction (instead of depreciation) of research and development costs.  
 2. Option for many partnerships and proprietorships to be taxed as if they were corporations.  
 3. Less danger that corporations will be penalized for accumulating earnings.  
 4. Revision of tax accounting rules to harmonize with generally accepted accounting principles.

**Additional Information**  
 Be sure to read the official instructions. You can also get help from the Internal Revenue Service, which urges you to consult only qualified advisers.

**Farmers Have Special Forms**  
 A special form, 1040F, must be used by all farmers reporting on a cash basis and may be used by farmers on accrual basis. Detailed instructions are given on the back of this form.

A major change this year allows a farmer to take a deduction for soil and water conservation expenses up to 25% of his gross income from farming.
