METHODIST MESSENGE

JACK RILEY, MINISTER

Aug. 5 . 1958

From the Pastor's Study:

Home never looked so good to the Rileys as it did Tuesday afternoon, July 29th, after having spent five weeks in New Mexico at National MYF Work Camp, Harwood Girls School, Albuquerque.

We had the privilege of leading 12 youths from 12 different states in a philosophy of work. These young people were leaders in the local church, District and Sub-District MYF. It was a challenge to them and to us to learn the Methodist standard of "an honest day's work for an honest day's wage." This was somewhat complicated by the fact that there was no wage. Those senior high youth actually paid to get to come and work.

We worked six hours, 51/2 days a week on projects on the campus, like: taking up and re-laying flag stone in the patio; doing cement work; trimming dead limbs out of trees; mowing the lawn; painting window sills and screens; refinishing tables and chalk trays; and putting windows. We had time in the evenings for recreation, discussions, and worship. We were able to work with 3 local MYF's and took a 4-day trip to Santa Fe. Chimo, Farmington and Gallup. We visited a Presbyterian Day School in Chimo and spent 2 days at the Navajo Indian Mission Boarding School in Farmington. This is a project of the WSCS of the Methodist Church.

Harwood Girls School is a boarding school for the 3rd to 12th grades. They average 140 girls a year. They have an accredited school. The property is valued at \$500,000.00. It is somewhat improved as a result of our work camp.

It was a grand opportunity to work with Christian youth of today. To help them discover new visions and avenues of Christian living and to discover ourselves in the midst of this experience of sharing was an opportunity which may never come our way again, but there will be evidence of this experience coming to light again in our ministry to Christ and His church.

Thank you, McLean Methodist, for encouraging us in this adventure.





Isaac, the son of Abraham, in one respect at least, emulated his father in his love of peace and the practical way in which he

Abraham had dug wells, very necessary for the maintenance of life and for their heads of cattle. Their traditional enemies, the Philistines, filled the wells up after Abraham's death. When Isaac's servants dug more wells, the berdsmen of Gerar fought with those of Isaac, saying, "The

water is ours."
Peacefully disposed Isaae dug
another well and the Philistines took that also. But when Isaac went to another place and dug still another well, they left him

Isaac prospered so greatly that his enemies evidently became alarmed and they went to him seeking a peace treaty. Isaac accepted their proposal and they

It is good today to read this story of peace and study how one man brought it about by his self-sacrificing attitude even when his enemies were trying to use

Not all instances in the Bible have turned out so well. There were times when the Israelites had to fight their enemies relentlessly, just as we today know we would be compelled to fight ruthlessly aggressors who would destroy the very foundations of our lives.

Nevertheless, it is good to remember that there have been many occasions when good has overcome evil. Although aggressors have to be stopped, this can be done ultimately only by the triumph of good over evil.

We need more than treaties. We need the character that keeps them, and that character is not found among the sort that de-stroys wells. The builders of civilization must have protection if peace and prosperity are to have their place in humanity's




