

Tomorrow night the McLean Tigers roll into their first conference encounter of the 1958 season as they clash with the highly-touted Canadian Wildcats in a game there set for 7:30 p. m.

With three victories under their belt in non-district warmers, the Tigers will be facing one of the teams prepolled to control the 2-A loop.

Under Coach Grady Burnett, the Wildcats will field B. F. Holland, gin manager, men and Bob Dowell of Amarillo, the heaviest and most experienced team that McLean has faced this year.

The forward wall of the Wildcats will average 184 pounds per proximately 32% of the normal brought by Rev. Thurman Up- man, compared to the much lighter line of McLean at a 155

> pound-per-man average. In the backfield the Canadian team averages 177 pounds per man, compared to 150 pound average for Tiger backs.

> Posing one of the biggest threats to the Tiger defense will be Canadian's flashy quarterback, Ken Abraham, who is now earning his fourth letter with the Wildcat squad. At 170 pounds. Abraham is one of the fastest men in the region, in addition to his highly praised ability in engineering and deception at the key position.





The remainder would be so severely injured that they could survive only if ' hospitalized 'immediately, a doubtful contingency when we consider the disruption and devastation surely to result from the blast.

Furthermore, within an additional seven-mile radius of the explosion all buildings would oe heavily damaged, and the most onservative estimates indicate a mortality rate of 30%, with at least 40% of the remainder inured to varying degrees of severity. In New York City-to use this example again—there would be 900,000 additional dead and at least 600,000 injured.

A successful attack on the 50 most important urban centers in this country containing 50% of the population of the United States, would cause 15 or 20 million dead and 20 to 25 million injured. Such a casualty would produce eunseprable medical problems. Under normal conditions a hospital requires five persons to care for one patient. But most hospitals and most doctors will be within the target

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

quences. God called Jonah to go to Ninevah and cry against the wickedness of the people. Jonah didn't want the job of speaking to those non-Jews. He was a Jew among Jews. To escape this task Jonah was AWOL. He hopped a boat for Tarshish, a Jewish mining colony in southwest Spain. All was well-except for a storm at sea. In fear, the sailors all prayed to their gods for protection. The AWOL character was asleep below deck. The captain suspected something. Everyone cast lots to determine the guilty one who had caused the storm. Jonah is accused. He felt the same way as the sailors. The solution was to put him overboard. Here a fish enters the story of AWOL Jonah. (It is best I leave this portion of the story for fishermen to interpret.)

Jonah spoke to the people of Ninevah, "Yet forty days and Ninevah shall be overthrown!" Jonah 3:4. The people repented. The king

put on sackcloth and prayed to God.

This displeased Jonah . . . the AWOL is impossible. He didn't want the non-Jew to have God's mercy and forgiveness. Jonah went out of the city limits and sat down. The sun was hot . . . but a castor bean stalk grew up to shade him. He cooled off. During the night a worm attacked the plant and it died. This made Jonah mad enough to die

It bothered the sailors when they put Jonah overboard. Jonah was concerned in the tummy of the fish. We have more sensitive tummies than we do minds and hearts in "our" town. When our tummies are affected, we get concerned. Yet two-thirds of the people in the world today are hungry. Three-fourths of the people of the world live under dictators. Three-fifths of the people of the world today can neither read nor write. (And they don't have TV.) Two-thirds of the people of the world are not Christian. One-half of those have never heard the word Jesus Christ.

Are we concerned when the sinner repents? How often have, we heard these questions: "Does he mean it? How long will it last? He'll never make it. You mean we have to associate with him?" Jonah cursed the cutworm when he could have proclaimed God.

But Jonah was AWOL!




