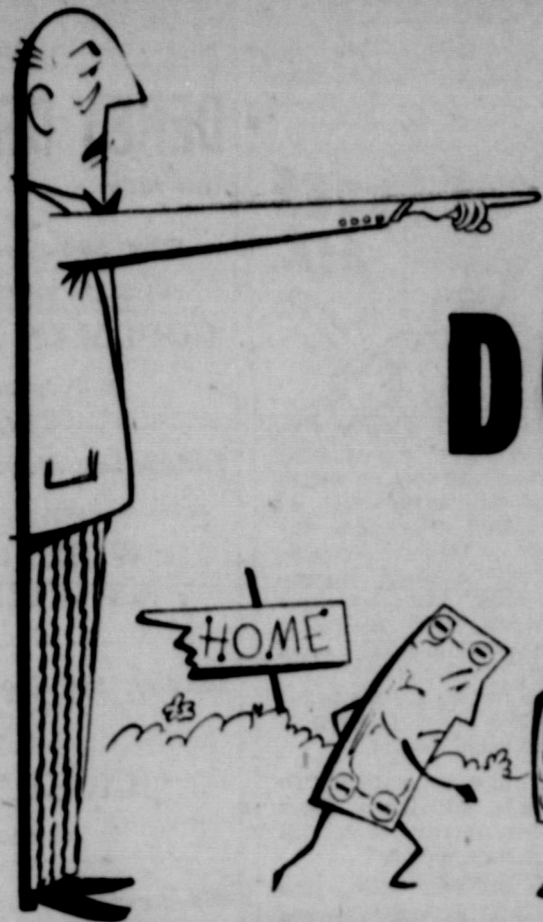

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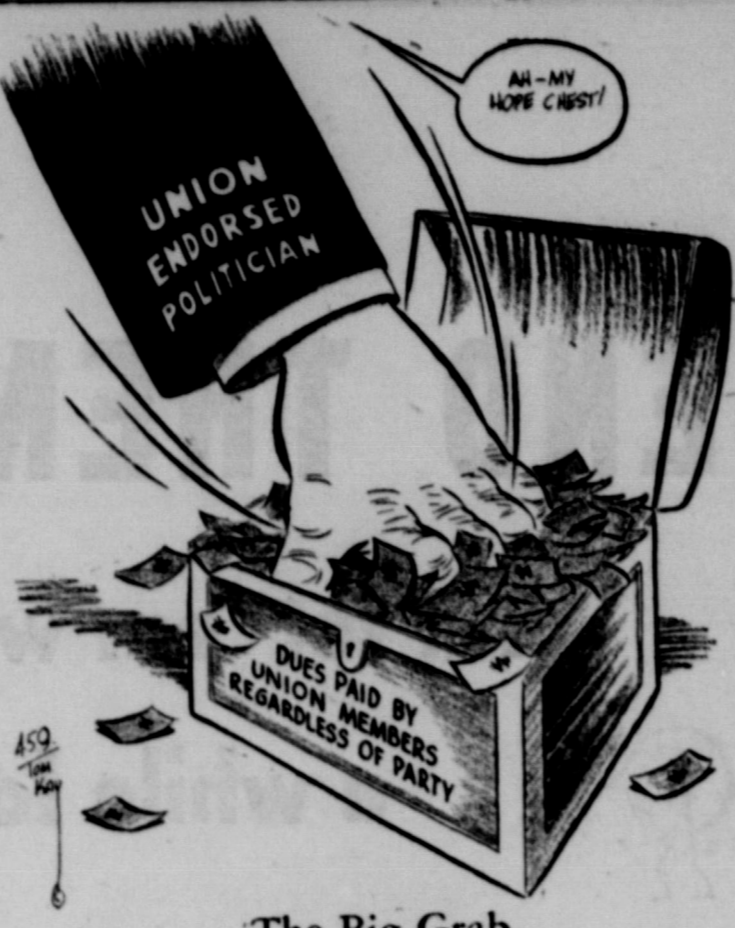

In its report on the social security amendments of 1956, the committee on finance of the U. S. Senate describes old-age and survivors insurance as a program "designed to provide partial protection against loss of earned income upon the retirement or death of the worker."

The word "partial" in this description is significant. This earnings-related social insurance program is not intended to offset in whole the loss of wages or self-employment caused by the family breadwinner's old-age or death. It does, however, provide a continuing income, and with this assurance, individuals can plan to build up additional security through private arrangements and savings. For example, a worker, knowing that the earnings credited to his social security account will entitle his dependents to a monthly income in case of his death, can better plan to supplement this with private life insurance protection for his wife and children. Also, a worker, forearmed with the knowledge that he will get regular monthly retirement payments in his old age, is in a better position to plan additional income in his later years through savings and investments during his working years.

While social security insurance payments are curtailed or withheld entirely if a beneficiary returns to or continues in employment or self-employment, payments are not affected by income derived from investments or savings or company pensions. A beneficiary, moreover, is permitted to engage in part-time work and have earnings of as much as \$1,200 in a year without giving up any of the monthly payments to which he is eligible under the old-age and survivors insurance.

Recruiting objectives for July require the shipment of 422 Air Force enlistees to Parks Air Force Base at Pleasanton, Calif. Sgt. Bill Neal, recruiter for the McLean area, said that part of this quota had been given to his station and this means that new

airmen will have a choice of training at Parks Air Force Base or at the usual training site, Lackland Air Force Base at San Antonio.

This is the first time that young men from this area have had the opportunity to join the Air Force and receive training at a West Coast base.

Sgt. Neal said that the buddy enlistment program that has been in effect at Lackland AFB for some time will also apply to enlistees going to Parks AFB. The buddy program provides that two or more buddies may enlist together and be assured of staying together through basic training. Persons interested in more information on the Air Force and
