ART SHOW IS EXPECTED TO ATTRACT MANY

Paintings to Be On Display Here Saturday, Sunday

Scores of paintings are expected to be on display Saturday and Sunday at the first McLean Art Show in Lovett Memorial Library. Sponsored by the McLean Lions Club, the show is scheduled to start Saturday morning, with all paintings due to be in place by 10 o'clock.

Artists from McLean, Shamrock, Clarendon, LeFlore, Groom and throughout this area have been invited to enter their work in the competition.

The library will remain open until 7 p.m. Friday for persons who want to bring their paintings on Friday.

Judging will begin at 10 a.m. Saturday, after which the paintings will be on display through Sunday. There will be no charge for admission.

Dr. H. F. Fabian is chairman of the Lions Club committee in charge of the show.

Two Divisions
Two divisions are planned—landscape and still-life—and trophies will be awarded to first, second, third and fourth-place winners in each. A special trophy also will go to the artist with the best original work in the show.

Portraits and abstracts may be entered for exhibit only, with no awards offered.
Each artist may enter as many as two paintings in each division. All are asked to bring an easel or some means of displaying their work. The artists are responsible for setting their paintings up for display, Dr. Fabian said.

At 4 p.m. Saturday, a western painting by Mrs. Alma Turman, well known McLean artist, is to be presented to some lucky person. Tickets on the painting are \$1 each and may be purchased from any Lions Club member or at the American National Bank, where the painting is on exhibit.
The display board for the art is being furnished by Hambright Cabinet Shop.

.86 Inch of Moisture Is Added Past Week; Temperatures Mild

Rains during the past week have added .86 inch of valuable moisture and prospects appear good for more showers in the next few days.

A brief but hard rain moved across the city in a thunderstorm early Wednesday afternoon, depositing .31 inch while much of the eastern Panhandle was under a severe weather alert.

A soaking shower Tuesday night and in the early morning hours Wednesday had brought .4 inch more.

This brings to 2.52 the amount of moisture received in McLean for the year, compared to 3.64 by the same date in 1964.

Temperatures were on the mild side during the week, reaching a high of 89 degrees on Saturday and dropping to a low of 40 on Monday.

A grinding car-truck crash at the west edge of the city last Thursday afternoon brought instant death to a 20-year-old McLean youth.

Robert Lewis McDonald died when his 1965 Tempest slammed into the side of a truck driven by Joseph Eldridge Caskey Jr. of Borger at the intersection of Highway 66 and SH 273.

Canadian failed to register a single first-place but still managed enough points to take the championship in the District 2-A Track Meet staged here Tuesday.

A passenger in McDonald's car, John Switzer, received serious injuries in the mishap. Switzer, son of Mr. and Mrs. Forrest Switzer, of McLean, underwent surgery for a fractured jaw at Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo early Thursday night after receiving emergency treatment at McLean Hospital.

Further surgery was scheduled this week for Switzer, who was reported Wednesday to be showing improvement.

Survives One Mishap

McDonald, son of Mrs. Louise McDonald, had miraculously survived an accident in February, 1963, when his car was struck by a Rock Island train in downtown McLean.

He was still under the care of a physician for injuries suffered in that mishap.

Ironically, at the time of last Thursday's collision, McDonald had a photograph of the 1963 accident in the front seat of his car.

Highway Patrolman R. C. Parker, who investigated Thursday's fatal accident, said McDonald apparently never saw the truck until just before he crashed into it. He may have been blinded by the sun.

The youths were driving west on Highway 66 at what an eye-witness to the accident said was a high rate of speed. The truck was crossing the intersection from the north.

Caskey, who was not seriously hurt, said he didn't see the car (See WRECK, Page 2)

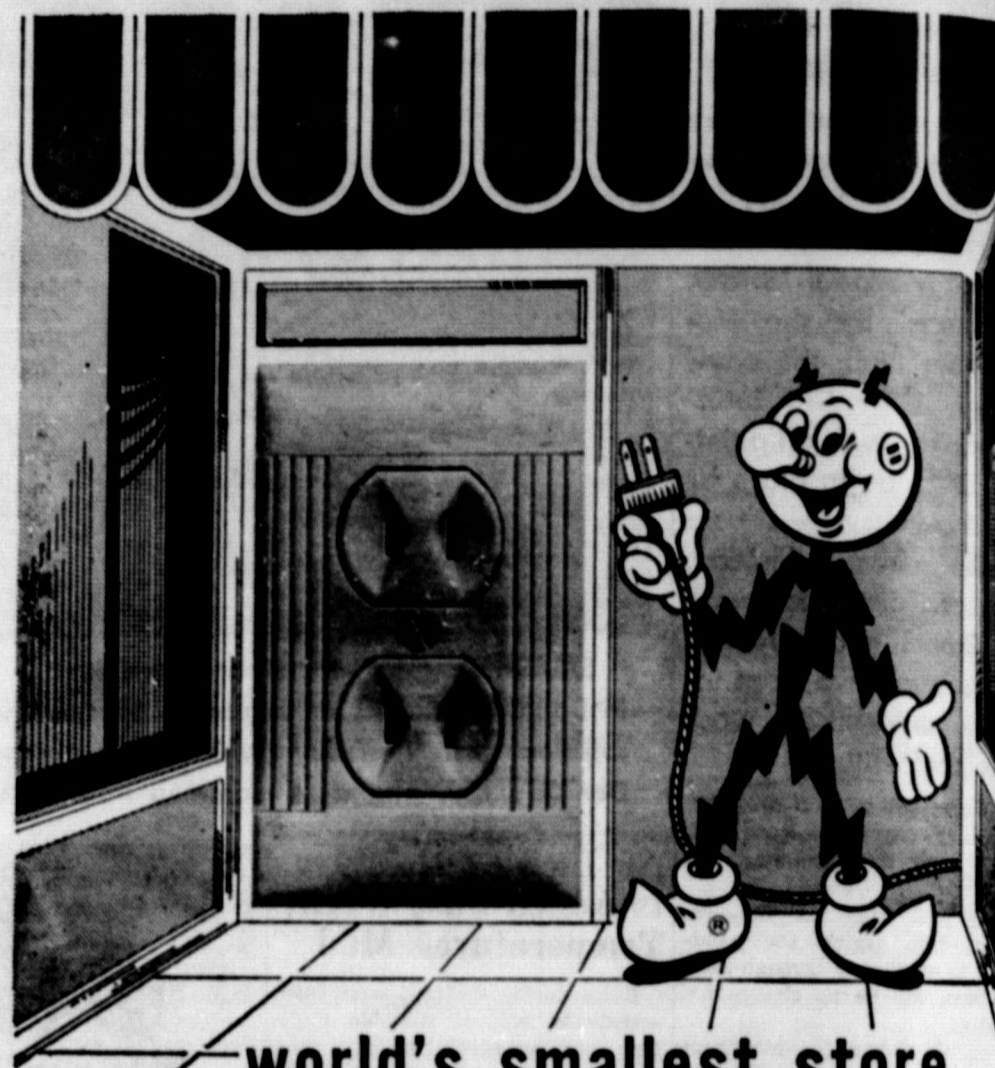

We have always found Tom, who resides in McLean, most responsive. He does an excellent job for the entire county.

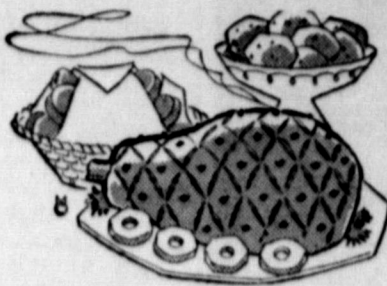

WHY CALL ME LORD, LORD

Luke 6:46

The Lord's supper was instituted by Christ, for we read in Matt. 26:26-28, "And as they were eating, Jesus took bread, and blessed it, and brake it, and gave it to the disciples, and said, Take, eat; this is my body. And he took the cup, and gave thanks, and gave it to them, saying, Drink ye all of it; for this is my blood of the New Testament, which is shed for many for the remission of sins." We have seen that we are to break bread upon the first day of the week. The "first day of the week" came each week. This tells us how often we should come together. We notice in I Cor. 16:1-2 that we are to give upon "the first day of the week" as we have been prospered, and in Heb. 10:25 we learn that we are not to forsake the assembling our ourselves together. 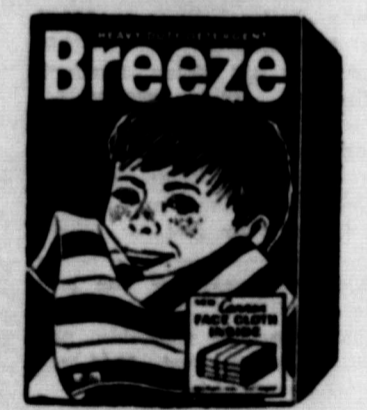
