Private Eye Salutes-

Did you ever wonder about just how your public money is being spent and just how it is accounted for? Did you know that a state law requires that an audit be made and statements be published? Have you ever complained that your taxes were too high, or that your water bill was too much, or your gas bill more than you thought that it should be?

Well, the man who collects these items is only an employee and does not set the rates nor read the meters. The council sets the rates in accordance with the legal requirements on taxes and an equalization board hears any complaints on your assessments. The amounts as set by these two groups are the basis of the tax rolls, the equalization board setting the amount and the council setting the rate. So, likewise the water and gas rates. The books of the city are permanent and PUBLIC records. You can see them at any time that you so desire. They are so set up that every penny is accounted for by departments. That is, revenues are allocated to bond retirement and interest, water revenue is credited against water department costs, and so on. Suppose that you wanted to know just where your tax money goes. Well, just go to the city tax office and you will find that each dollar is accredited to certain required accounts and just how it is paid out. There is nothing anyone can do about the ultimate destination of your tax dollar and it is recorded so that anyone can see just what has become of it.

There is a very good system of bookkeeping in your city affairs and D. A. Davis is due a lot of credit for its present condition. He has been complimented by the independent auditors each time the city books. Looks like Mr. Davis is doing and has done an excellent job of accounting in his capacity as collector of your money. It would please him and each member of the council if you would just ask a few friendly questions. He will show you the answers.

SOIL CONSERVATION profitable to farm. For a number DISTRICT NEWS

By Jack G. Douglas Work Unit Conservationist

By now most farmers have heard and read about the conservation reserve part of the soil bank being extended to April 15. 1957. This part of the soil bank has a two-fold purpose. First, to reduce production of crops in surplus for a period of from five to ten years; and second, to enable farmers to return land which should not have been broken out to pasture. Some of this land may still be showing a profit, while other has already reached the point where it is no longer

of years the ACP has offered to share the cost of seeding this kind of land to grass. Several Walter Brennan and Ruth Hussey. hundred acres in the district have been returned to pasture with financial assistance from the ACF and technical assistance from soil conservation technicians through the soil conservation district. However, many farmers have felt that they could not not afford to lose what little income this kind of land was bringing in, during the period a grass cover was being established. The conservation reserve is designed to meet this need by paying an annual rental for the land for the period it is signed up foreither a five year or a ten year period. In the Gray County soil conservation district, this annual rental is \$9.00 per acre. This is in addition to sharing 80% of the average cost of establishing grass on the land. By doing their own work and using their own equipment, most farmers will be able to establish grass on their land with very little cash.

Gray County soil conservation district has need for such a program as the conservation reserve to help it accomplish its conservation objective of "the use of each acre of land within its capabilities and treatment according to its needs." It is hoped that each farmer will carefully consider the needs of his land, seek whatever advice he might need in how it should be treated thru his conservation district, and then find out how the conservation reserve and other progarms can assist him in not only becoming a conservation farmer, but mak ing more profift from his farm.


