

Underdog Tigers Set For Stinnett

Tigers Tackle Rattlers Tomorrow in Pampa

Tomorrow night in Harvester Stadium in Pampa at 8 p. m. the McLean Tigers will go after the bi-district championship against the highly touted Rattlers of Stinnett, ranked through the season as the state's No. 1 Class A squad.

Conversely, the Tigers were pre-picked for a cellar unit in 2-A, before defeating the favored White Deer Bucks for the top role in the district.

In Stinnett, the Tigers will face one of the most awesome defenses in the Class A realm. By mutual comparison, the Rattlers downed White Deer by a 20-6 margin, the Bucks gaining their lone score on a long break-away. White Deer collected only 7 first downs in the four quarters against the Rattlers.

In offensive power the Rattlers boast a power in Don Anderson and a backback in Duke McLean. Both boys have ranked as top-notch ball carriers in the area.

In the line, the Tigers will be facing a larger and more experienced crew than ever before. Average weight per man in the Stinnett forward wall is 173, compared to 164 for the Tigers.

McLean's offensive thrust will be carried by Quarterback Ken Willingham, considered one of the district's top key men. David Crockett, McLean's bid for all-state, will furnish the power, along with Hallback O. K. Lee, another boy who began the season with little experience in the backfield, has proved himself as one of the most able of ball carriers. At the other halfback slot will be Jimmy Watson.

In the line big Bob Weaver will be at center, flanked by Jerry Smith and Clyde Windom. At tackles will be Carey Don Smith and Darrel Gibson, and at ends will be Don Cash and Tommy Herron.

The Tiger line has been given an abundance of credit for the success of the surprising McLean gridders. Light and with little experience, the Tiger forward wall has functioned perfectly in going against some of the best linemen in the region.

The Tigers, with Coach Clifford Bradshaw in his first year as head mentor, have compiled a season record of 8-2. They lost to Groom, 12-0, and to Wellington, 20-0. In district they were out-feted with a 6-0 mark.

Stinnett's lone defeat came at the hands of Spearman last week, 14-6. Stinnett, Spearman and Gruver finished in a three-way tie for the 1-A banner.

The Rattlers are coached by Don Light.

The more "freedom from" economic insecurity the less "freedom to" indulge in free enterprise, etc.

When Patrick Henry said "Give me liberty or give me death," I doubt that he had in mind the guaranteed annual wage.

Colonists made their break for the "freedom to." On the other hand Communism's main selling point is a "freedom from." I think it's about time we decided which way we want to go. If we want the total "freedom from" route, then there's no use trying to cut-missile Russia—we might as well join 'em and forget about the space race, etc. In fact, Karl Marx predicted our "freedom from" advocates would deliver us "to Commie hands without a shot being fired.

Now I am aware, as my liberal friends would hasten to point out, that times have changed since George Washington did away with the cherry tree, and there is a need for more government activity and regulation than in those days. I am also aware that high-sounding ideals such as "freedom" are not very impressive to a man with an empty belly.

But on the other hand what good is a satisfied stomach if you don't have freedom. The inmates at Huntsville are well-fed.
