

"ARBITRARY, DISCRIMINATORY, UNREASONABLE AND UNFAIR"

Some time ago the Internal Revenue Service ruled that the cost of institutional advertising placed by utility companies in opposition to socialization of this industry was not deductible in computing federal income taxes. It thus ruled, in effect, that the advertising was not a legitimate business expense.

This attitude, it is important to note, did not meet with the favor of the National Association of Railroads and Utilities Commissioners—the organization which represents the state regulatory bodies. In a formal resolution, it denounced the ruling as "arbitrary, discriminatory unreasonable and uniair," adding that it represents a serious disservice to the state and federal agencies engaged in regulating the charges of such companies. . . . It then resolved that the ruling should immediately be rescindoed and annulled.

Various individual state commissions have also protested. For instance, the Delaware commission in a letter to the Federal Power Commission, defended, among other things, the right of utilities to use advertising "to ment. No one should buy stocks until he has adequate seek support for the preservaton and maintenance of thei private enterprise system. . .

Internal Revenue seeks censorship of opinion on pain of heavy tax penalties. It is heartening that defenders of the right to speak one's mind are rallying to the

The winners deserve the acclaim they have been given. Basically, the reason for the Exchange's issuance of this booklet is to try to persuade investors, large and small, to get the facts before they commit their money. The worst possible way to invest is on the strength of tips and rumors—or, most fatal of all, in answer to the blandishments of boiler shop operators who use high-powered phone and wire solicitations to dupe the unwary. There's no such thing as a sure-fire profit in






