Rodeo, Celebration Starts Today

Horse Show, Race, Reunion Scheduled

Rodeo officials are looking at the sky and holding their breath.

The weather seems to be the only thing that can keep McLean's big 66 Round-up and 50-year anniversary from being a big success.

The grounds are ready. A number of contestants have entered the \$1,800 prize show. It looks like the best Quarter Horse show ever . . . and everybody's ready to pull on boots and go to the rodeo, says Association President Harvey Taylor.

One of the biggest attractions of the Thursday, Friday and Saturday show here is expected to be the 20-mile pony race from Shamrock to McLean. That is slated for Friday morning at 10:30.

The approved Quarter Horse show has drawn many outstanding entries, and Sammy Haynes says it looks like the best horse show ever here. It is scheduled to get festivities underway at 1 p. m. Thursday.

And of course the three-day, two go-round rodeo will draw cowboys from miles around.

Shows will be at 8 p. m. all three nights and at 2 p. m. on Saturday. The \$1,800 in prize money is to be split up into \$300 purses for each of the six events.

Events include saddle bronc riding, bareback bronc riding, bull riding, calf roping, double mugging, and bulldogging.

At 5 p. m. Friday the old fiddlers will cut down on some western must music and the old settlers reunion and registration will be held Saturday at 9 a. m. Incidentally oldtimers who have been in Gray County for more than 50 years will be given a free pass to the rodeo.

C. S. Rice, McLean's first mayor, will be honored by the association.

At 11 a. m. Saturday, the rodeo parade will come through town. On all three rodeo nights Cleve Hancock and his Top o'

Texas Playboys will come in there with that western music for the rodeo dances.

Pinky Williams will be the rodeo clown, and Tom Harlan of Kellerville is the stock contractor.

H. B. Taylor Jr., of Pampa will be the announcer.

Besides the purse money, trophy buckles will go to the event winners and a trophy saddle will be presented to the all-around cowboy. The man with the best roping average also wins a saddle.

Rodeo admission is \$1.25 for adults and 50 cents for children.

Bob Sherrod is rodeo chairman.

In the Little League, Sammy Haynes is coaching the Braves, Harvey Taylor has the Cubs, and Johnny Haynes will coach the Cardinals. They will play each other and the three Lefors teams.

About 90 Little Leaguers have signed here.

Sonny Back has the Pony League team and they will play once a week with the Lefors Pony League bunch.

There will be two girls' teams. Mrs. Laverne Saunders will coach one and another woman is needed to coach the other.

The McLean Lions Club is helping sponsor the project. However, money for some caps and T-shirts is still needed.

The Lions Club will run a concession stand.

Coach Christian said he needs men to volunteer to help the boys by umpiring some games.

The league got a boost recently when material was donated by a Shamrock contractor for a concession stand and equipment house.

Employees of El Paso Natural Gas plant volunteered their labor to build the house, and J. B. Roach said it should be completed within a week.

Later this summer there will be an all-star game between the McLean Little Leaguers and the Lefors Little Leaguers.

Christians said any boy who wants to play can still sign up for the program.

Gas Well Fire Erupts

McLean firemen whipped an oil rig fire just in time to keep a nearby gas tank from exploding here last Monday night.

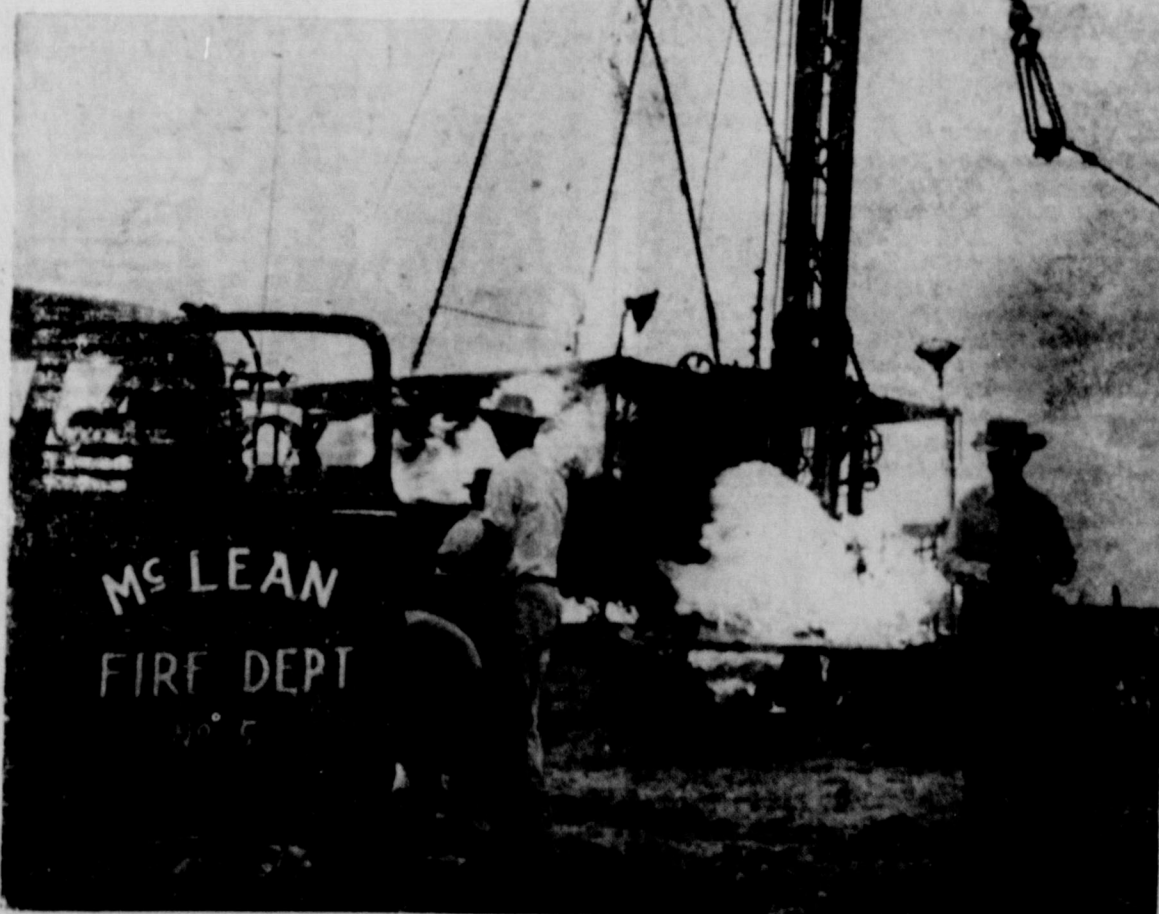
However, the fire destroyed a drilling rig and owner H. O. Reck of Borger estimated the damage at \$15,000.

The fire broke out about 7:30 p. m. Monday night on an El Paso Natural Gas lease one mile southwest of town when a sandline became twisted and set off a spark inside the well. The burning gas came up and the wind was blowing just right to catch the rig on fire.

When the firemen arrived flames were licking at a gas tank, but by quick work it was quenched before an explosion was touched off.

There were no injuries. The crew was drilling at about 2,400 feet at the time of the accident.

One of the workmen who was reading a popular men's magazine at the time of the fire, claimed it was a fleshy picture of Bridgett Bardot that set the whole thing off in the first place.

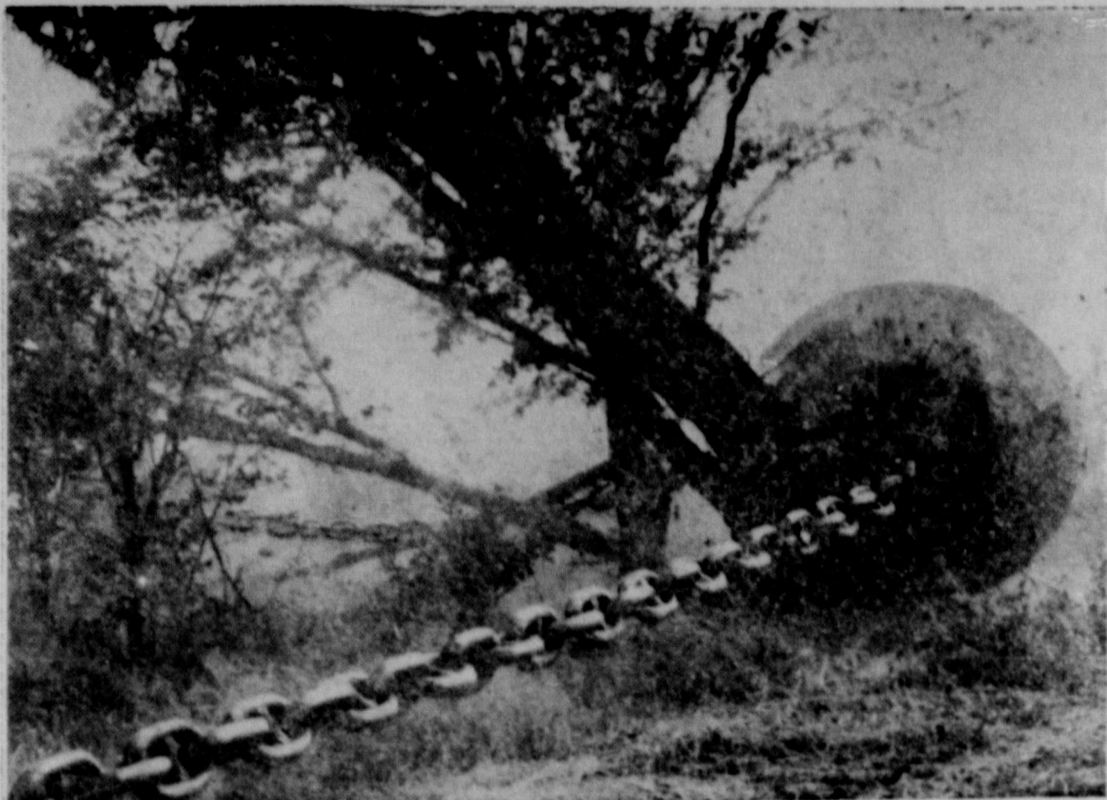

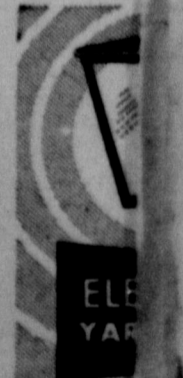

At 1:01 A.M., Sunday, June 21

All McLean telephone numbers will change at 1:01 a.m. Sunday, June 21, when the city's dial system goes in service.

From that moment, all the numbers in your old telephone directory—numbers you have been calling from memory, numbers you have jotted down somewhere—will be **WRONG** numbers.

McLean's new DIAL telephone numbers will be listed in the new DIAL directory, which will be delivered to you before the new system goes in service.

Until the change is made at 1:01 a.m., June 21, please continue to use your present directory. After the new dial system goes into operation at 1:01 a.m., be sure to look up the right number in the new DIAL directory before you call.

HOW TO USE THE NEW SYSTEM

Suppose you want to call **GR** ante 9-2291.

Place the receiver to your ear, and listen for a steady hum—the dial tone. Place your finger in the dial opening over the letter "G." Pull the dial around until your finger strikes the finger stop. Remove your finger and let the dial spin back freely. In the same way, dial the letter "R" and the numerals 9-2-2-9-1 in order. Don't confuse the letter "I" and the numeral "1" or the letter "O" and the numeral "0".

When you have finished dialing, you will hear a "burring" sound if the call is in progress. If the line is busy, you will hear a fast buzz-buzz; hang up, and try again later.

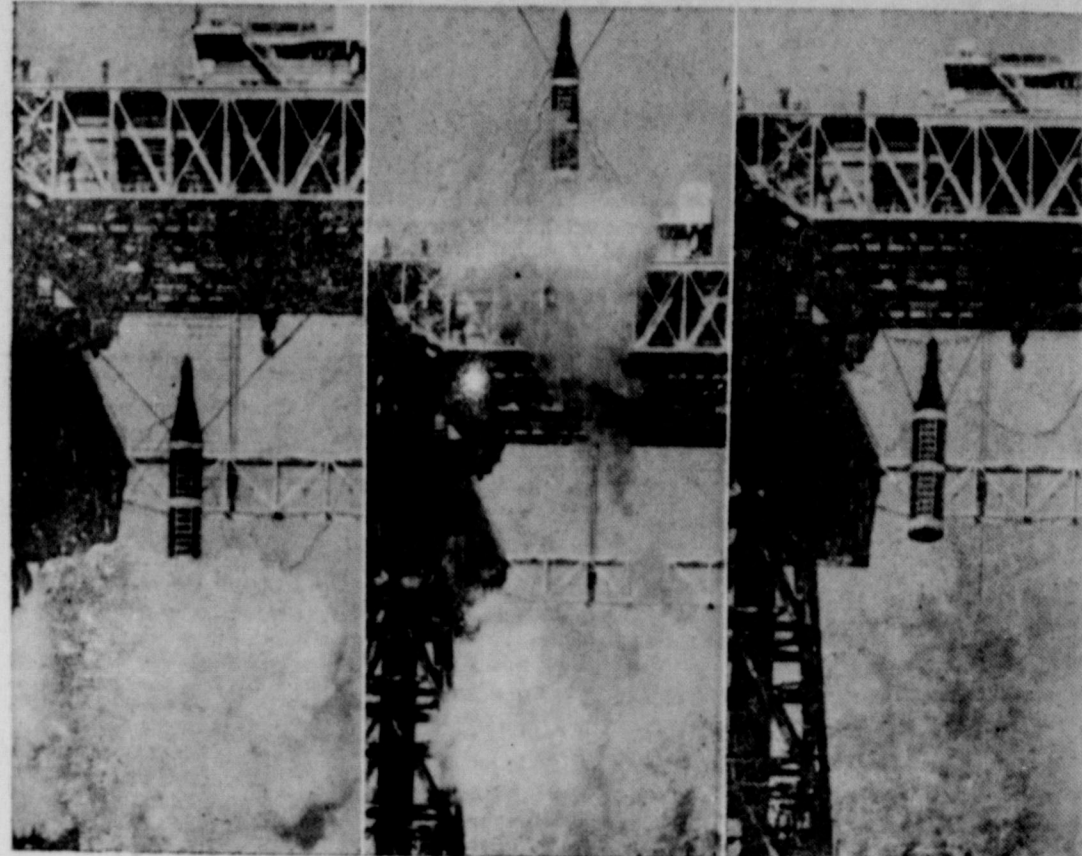

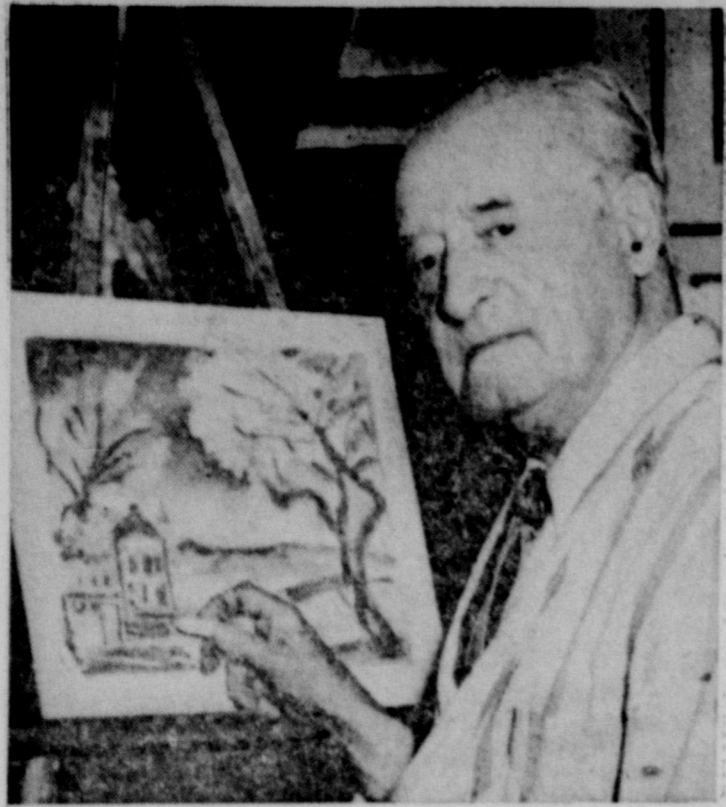
