## McLean's One-Act Play Wins State Championship

### Members Gain Special Mention

McLean High School's one-act play cast, doing scenes from Tennessee Williams' "The Glass Menagerie," won the state championship in the Austin finals last Friday, May 8.

It was the first time in the history of the school that a dramatic group had passed district competition.

The group, doing Tennessee Williams' "Glass Menagerie," was named state champions in the finals at Austin last Friday.

Directed by Keith Wolfe, the cast has won top honors in every stage of competition since its beginning in District 2-A.

The play again led in individual honors, two of its cast winning special awards. Peggy Sharp was named the state's outstanding actress and again in regional received the top award. In each stage of competition she ranked as the most outstanding among all participants. In winning the state award she was given the Samuel French Award; the University Interscholastic League Gold Medal; a certificate of recognition of superior acting ability from the National Thespian Society; and a one-year scholarship from Dr. Loren Winship, head of the drama department of Texas University.

Goodman also received honors prior to state competition, having been placed on both district and regional all-star casts.

The third member of the state championship cast was Elizabeth Boston. She had special recognition at the state meet for superior acting in the difficult role she portrayed.

Director Wolfe was given a certificate for superior directing by the National Thespian Society.

The all-state technical assistants were Gary Back, Bill Herron, and Bill Kingston. Others on the trip were Rev. Gerald Hill, Carl Dwyer, Mrs. C. O. Goodman, Gary Gordon, Jim McDonald, and Teena McMurry.

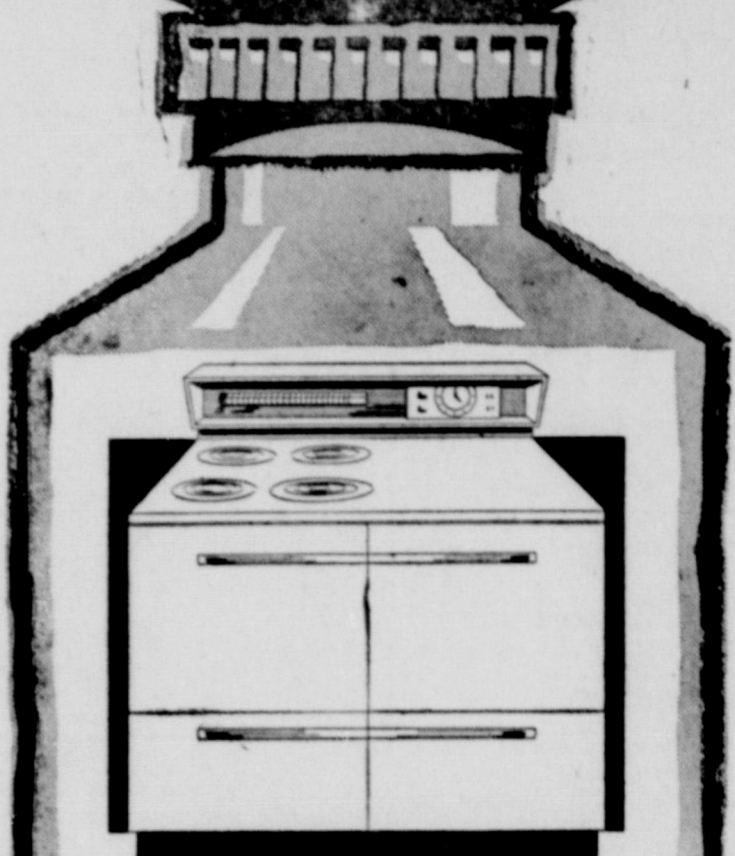

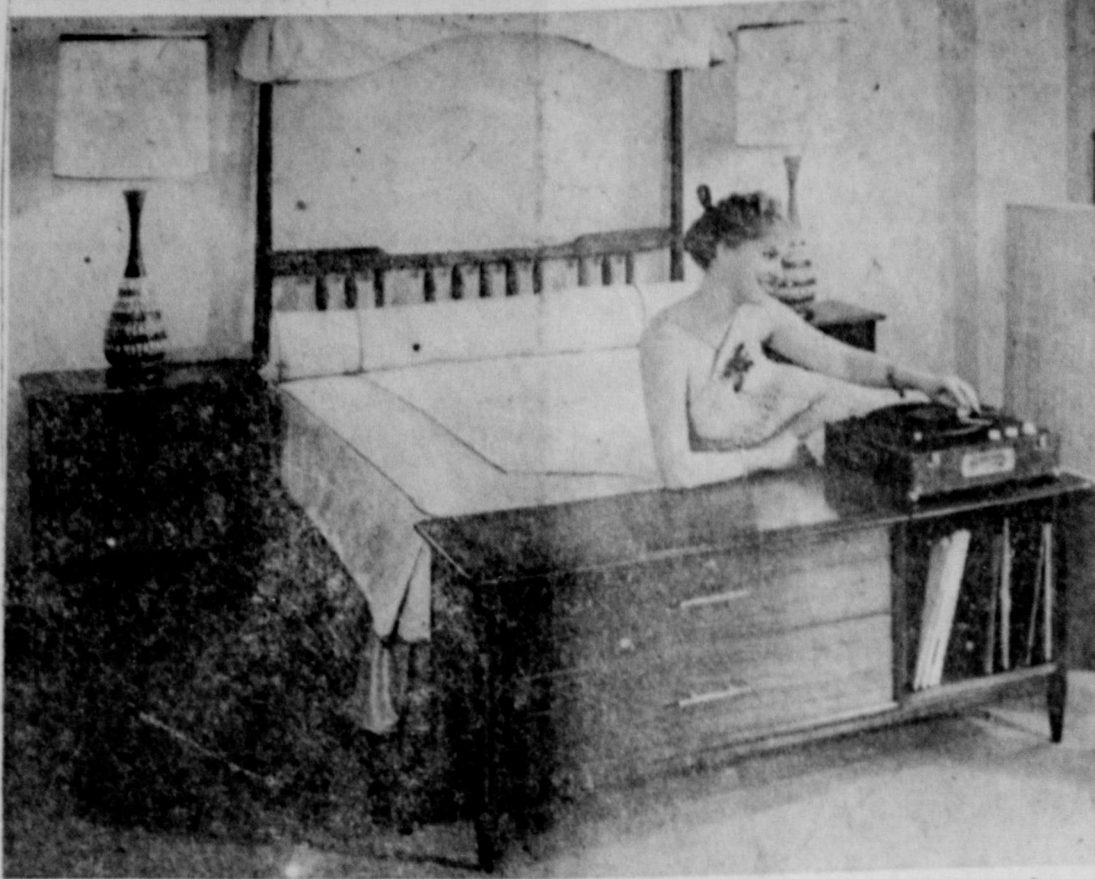

## EXPEDIENCY SCUTTLES PRIVATE ENTERPRISE

An editorial in the Portland, Ind., Graphic, tells of how principle can be sacrificed to expediency. It says: "good friend of ours . . . is continually reminding us about the dangers of government in business. 'This country is headed for disaster unless the people wake up to the fact that you cannot turn to government for solution to social and economic problems,' he asserts. And it's up to you editors to straighten them out, by logging free enterprise."

"Recently we called on him in his office. We found him in an ugly mood. Seems he had discovered the shipping department using Railway Express for shipment of merchandise."

"Those dumbheads never think about costs," he growled. "With inflation and high taxes, we've got to fit every corner we can. They know it's cheaper to ship parcel post."

"But look," we said, "don't you know why parcel post is cheaper? It is a subsidized service, operated at a loss by the Post Office Department, or so the boys in Washington tell us. Seems to me this puts you in an untenable position—patronizing a government service at the expense of a fellow free enterprise operation, the Railway Express."

asked her what it was she explained, 'A picture of tooth decay I saw on television.'

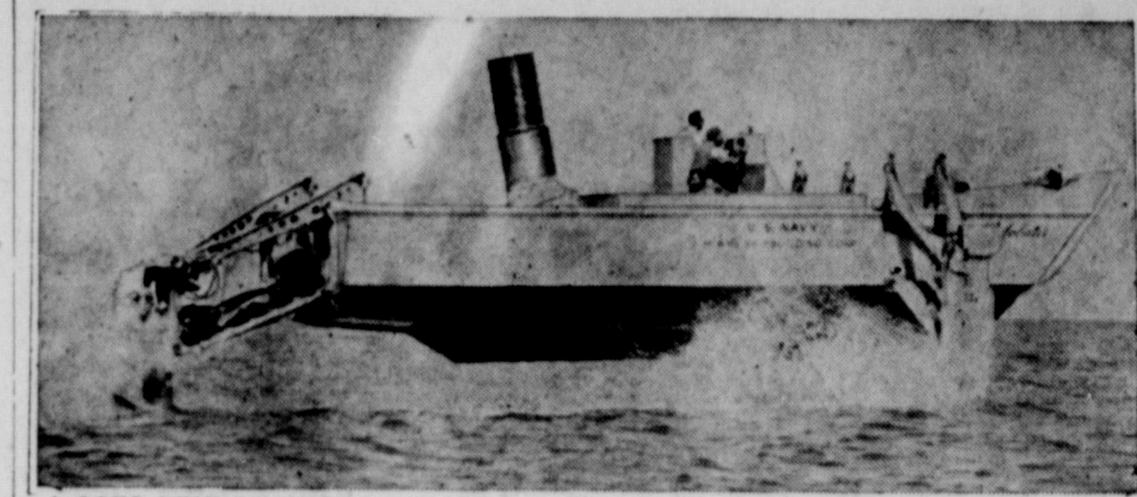

**GOES LIKE A HALOBATES**—You can't liken the strange craft, above, to anything else in the water. It's a "Halobates," a hydrofoil-equipped craft powered by a gas-turbine engine. "Smokestack" is the exhaust for the engine, more conventionally used to power certain types of aircraft. Hydrofoils are the equivalent of underwater wings. When adequate speed is reached, the boat rises above the water and zips along on the wing surfaces alone. Shown in action off Miami, Fla., the specially equipped landing craft, weighing 15 tons, has exceeded 30 knots during tests. Navy officials and a shipbuilding company are co-operating.

## MASTHEAD STOCK PRICES ADVANCE

There has been a great deal of discussion over the why and wherefores of recent stock market trends. Last year, for instance, share prices on the New York Stock Exchange, as measured by the popular averages, advanced about 34%.

Various people have various views as to why this could be so. The Exchange's president, Keith Funston, provides an informed opinion. He thinks there are three primary reasons for the advance: Confidence in future corporate earning power, fear of continued inflation, and shortage of popular stocks.

Many of us wonder why there should be such a thing as a stock shortage—and particularly of the stocks most in demand by investors. The reason is that owners of such shares are reluctant to sell because of the capital gains tax they would have to pay. On top of that, other tax considerations discourage many corporations from financing their future growth through new stock issues.

The inflation factor should surprise no one. Mr. Funston had this to say about it: "While the fear of inflation may temporarily stimulate volume and prices on the stock market, it creates imbalances which over the long run are harmful . . . Sound management of our mendacious national debt, in and of itself, dictates the necessity of anti-inflationary steps to maintain confidence in the dollar at home and abroad. The public must insist that Congress balance the federal budget. And, equally, in the private sectors of our economy, we must urge that salary and wage increases be limited to those which do not, in themselves, raise unit production costs."

To sum up, the stock market reflects the forces of inflation. It doesn't and can't generate them. A sound market and a sound economy go together.

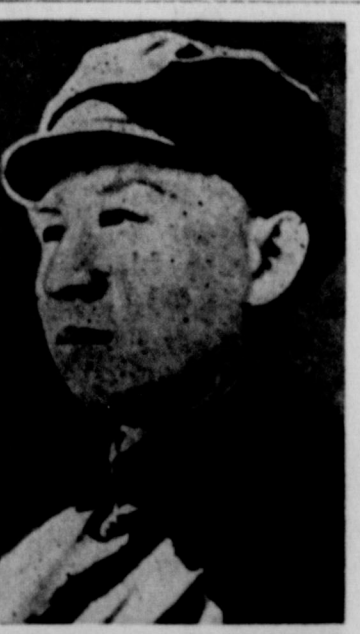
## CT AND FALLACY

Writing in a publication of the Indiana University business school, the head of one of this country's leading grain firms considers the farm situation. In the words of William Clark of the Chicago Tribune, this amounts to one of the most interesting arguments we've encountered for removal—gradual but complete—of farm price supports and subsidies.

The argument has as its basic premise that more production, not less, is needed to solve the vexing agricultural surplus problems. Increased production, its author is convinced, would lead to lower costs and enable this country to both expand its existing world markets and open up brand new ones.

Moreover, he shows the fallacy of the idea that the subsidy program helps the small or average farmer. As now, 27% of the farm population accounts for 78.7% of all farm product sales. These are what he calls "marginal farmers." And, naturally, they receive a great part of all subsidy payments and other government aids. The small and marginal farmers get the short end of the stick.

Under his proposed plan, price supports would gradually be eliminated. Marginal farmers would be helped other ways—examples being the Department of Agriculture's rural development program, and local encouragement of substandard farm properties. To quote him exactly: "The net result . . . would be that efficient producers, to keep profits high despite lower profit margins, would utilize all of their tillable land, boost their production, and lower their unit costs still further."

The use of stories to point, or illustrate, truths is about as old as man's effort for expression.

In secular as well as sacred literature, the parable is a vital part of man's means of communication with his fellow man.

So, of course, the use of the parable was not unique with Jesus.

There were many parables in the Old Testament.

The parable was a natural incident of oriental imagery.

Unique features of the parables of Jesus are the supreme qualities of the parables as stories and the supremacy of the truths and teachings that the Master uses the parables to express.

Moreover, what the parables of Jesus relate might well happen in any time or place.

They are as true to life today as they were to the life of the day when Jesus uttered them.

It is this element of timelessness that has made the parables of Jesus such living expressions of truth.

How different it would have been if Jesus had put in labored philosophical discourses the truths that He put in simple, effective stories.

**NO ROOM FOR JESUS**

One of the songs I remember hearing my mother sing as she went about her many duties on the farm, when I was a child, had the following words: "Is Christ crowded out of your busy life? No time for His service you say?" As I think of these words, remembering her faith and constant devotion to the Lord, I cannot help but wonder why many people cannot find room in their lives for Jesus.

Busy people can and do serve the Lord, in fact this is one of the commands of the Lord through the apostle Paul. "Not slothful in business; fervent in spirit; serving the Lord." (Rom. 12:11) The difference being, busy people in the church make room for Jesus and those out of the church do not. In fact everything they do is in His service, because they will not engage in anything that the Lord is not with them in doing.

Those who lie, cheat, steal or commit any other sin have no room for Jesus because they want to satisfy their own lusts and desires. They have no room to obey the commands of the Lord because they are either neglectful, or they had rather do something else than obey the Lord.

We think it bad indeed that our Lord was born in a stable and wrapped in swaddling clothes and placed in a manger because there was no room for Him in the inn. How much worse is it today when He is crowded out of our lives. This is true regardless of the lowly conditions that surrounded the place of His birth. Ignorance, through lack of study of God's word, leads people do many things that they think all right, but which Jesus is actually not with them in doing. Prejudice blinds to the reception of the truth. And love for the world causes rebellion against the commands of God. Far too often we find this true concerning those professing Christianity as well as those without. This has caused many to cry hypocrite concerning those within, but it should be remembered that no one is justified in not making room in his life for the King of Kings and Lord of Lords.

# Editorial

## A SAMPLE OF SAVING TAXES?

The Battle of the Budget being waged in Washington is not the only place the taxpayer is being left bruised, bloody and maimed. After the taxpayers' money is allocated and a temporary peace settles for another fiscal year over Capitol Hill, minor blood-letting really begins. That is when bureaucrat faces bureaucrat to protect his budget.

For instance, the Pentagon has a policy of purchasing electric power at the lowest cost to its budget. Take this example to illustrate the point: A Nike Missile base needs an electrical supply. Near the isolated site are rural farm lines of a large utility company and an REA-financed cooperative.

Seven miles away the utility company has a sub-station. It can reinforce its line and supply the base at a cost of \$15,858 a year under its filed rates. The Co-op sub-station is 32 miles away and its supply much less dependable. To protect the Pentagon's budget, the Corps of Engineers was required to obtain a bid from the Co-op.

The Co-op got the order on a bid of \$300 a year less than the published rate of the company. Thus, the defense budget was nobly defended. But, how did the taxpayer do?

The REA-Co-op line reinforcement may require as much as \$200,000 from the REA at 2% interest for 32 miles of line and sub-station capacity. It will cost the treasury at least 3% to borrow the money so the REA can make the loan to the Co-op. This means an interest loss to taxpayers of \$2,000 a year so the Defense Department, which got its money from taxpayers in the first place, can save \$300. And that's not all the salt for taxpayers' wounds. The private company would have paid nearly \$2,000 a year in income tax on revenue received from the Nike base contract. The Co-op will pay none. In addition, the utility would have paid state and local property taxes in excess of \$2,800, while under preferential treatment accorded Co-ops by most local assessors the Co-op would pay much less.

Congress needs to define specifically what "lowest cost to the government" really means in negotiating purchase contracts with fully taxed, privately-financed businesses and with subsidized, government-financed agencies.

## A LABOR SUPER-MONOPOLY

Just suppose you picked up your newspaper and read that the owners of all the bus lines, air lines, rail lines, and steamship lines were organizing so that when one made any demands on shippers or travelers, they would all stand together, and if the objective could be accomplished in no other manner, they would tie up the transportation of the nation until they got what they wanted. Not only would they tie it up, but they would seek to prevent anyone else from rendering such service. It is pretty obvious what would happen in such a case. The anti-trust laws would be invoked and the government would probably call out various branches of the military service to keep the trains, airplanes, buses and ships operating, and the principals would face fines and jail sentences.

Tying up the transportation system of the nation by its owners is beyond imagination. But what about the great unions involved in operating the trains, planes, ships and trucks? They are not subject to any of the anti-trust laws that affect the carriers so their labor bosses can work to form a super-monopoly dominating every form of commercial transportation.

We read that an unprecedented teamster-led monopoly is taking shape in the face of all the disclosures of the McClellan Committee. Reports indicate that Congress fears to pass legislation that will in any material degree bring union combines under the same laws and regulations that affect every other business and individual in the country. Development of the teamster's super-monopoly is as frightening to contemplate as is the struggle between the communistic and the free world.

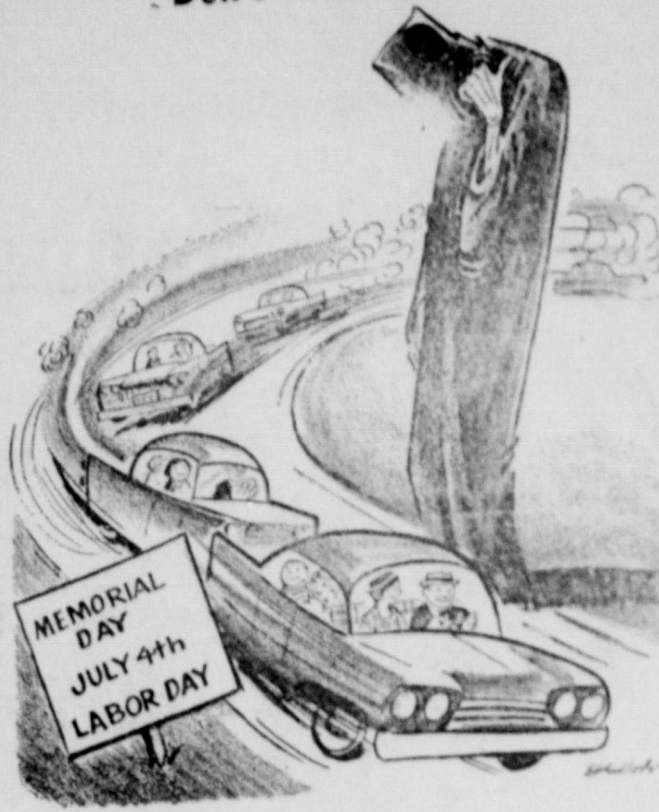

## WHEN THE OWNERS SPEAK

Each spring our American corporations hold their annual stockholders' meetings. Time was when these were sparsely attended, by a comparative handful of investors with big holdings. But that time has gone.

Sylvia Porter, the well-known financial columnist, tells the story as it is today. Stockholders come to the meetings in almost army-sized legions—one big company received notices that 25,000 planned to attend. This zooming attendance is the result of several forces. Miss Porter writes: "One, of course, is the spread in stock ownership to an unprecedented total of many millions of middle-class citizens. Another is the fact that in recent years leading stock exchanges have been promoting the idea that a stockholder is an owner of the corporation and he should take an active interest in his company's activities. A third is that corporations themselves have been going in for lavish meetings on the basis that attracting a large attendance is good public relations."

Near the end of her column she adds: "One day a year, the holder of even one share in a corporation has the right to assert himself in person as an owner. One day a year, the head of even the biggest company must respond..." And, it is safe to say, the attitude shown by the stockholders on that one day a year has a powerful bearing on executives' decisions and policies during all the rest of the days. ## THINKING OF BUILDING OR REMODELING?

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60 months to pay  
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## IT'S THE LAW IN TEXAS

**BUILDING YOUR HOME**  
When you are ready to build, you will find that the law helps in many ways to make your home enjoyable and secure.

Have you decided on the type house you want and the amount you want to spend? If so, then let's go into details!

1. **YOUR LOT.** Junior's school or your church may be nearby, but find out—

(a) Whether they are planning to run a highway through the area or nearby, or make any improvements for which you can be assessed.

(b) What "covenants" or restrictions run with the land? To protect residents, the plats or basic deeds of some neighborhoods call on you to build a certain size or type of house. Do you want to and can you afford to?

(c) Easements. Either you or your neighbors may need to run pipes, or string wires over each other's land or to share a driveway. Have the abstract checked carefully to disclose any easements.

2. **ZONING ORDINANCES.** For your protection the local government frequently zones some areas, for example, for single houses only, for multiple dwellings; for retail stores, for manufacturing, etc.

Unless the local governing body changes its zoning ordinance, no filling station, for instance, can go up next to you in a residential area. Neither could you turn your home into a store. In any case, you should find out what your neighborhood zoning rules are.

3. **BUILDING CODES.** Be certain that the plans and construction will meet the requirements of the local building code as to size, location and structure. Municipal ordinances usually impose strict standards for the building, the plumbing and the electrical wiring. In many cases only licensed building tradesmen are permitted to make the installations.

4. **FINANCING.** Financing contracts protect both you and the lender. Unless you pay cash, you will use credit to pay for your house, most likely a deed of trust or a land contract. Your installments often include principal, interest, insurance and taxes. Under a land contract the lender holds title to your house until you pay for it. If you fall behind, the holder can take the house back. With a deed of trust, the lender has a lien which he can foreclose if you default. You may get
