One of the basic rights granted to mankind as far back as 1689 in England was the principal that "Every nan's home is his castle" and could not be searched vithout due process of law.

We may not think much of it now, but what of a undred years hence when petty and irresponsible pureaucrats can range through people's homes at will or real and imagined causes, or when law enforcement gencies find it simpler to enter a home on the excuse checking the plumbing rather than obtaining a

One of the basic foundations of the dictatorship is the ibility to go through the homes of frightened subjects, moring all property rights and the principal of human

The Bill of Rights was considered so important that its rovisions were made into constitutional amendments. Here is Article 4 of our Constitution—read it and see if ou can see how any group of people, judges or what lave you, could interpret it to mean a health inspector ould have access to homes without a warrant:

"The right of the people to be secure in their persons, louses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable earches and seizures shall not be violated, and no warants shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported y oath or confirmation, and particularly describing the lace to be searched and the persons or things to be

family and fried We have always held there is nothing particularly rrong with a strong central government so long as it stains the role of servant of the people. With this one interpretation the stage is set for the overnment to become the master whereby one pennynte health official could shatter the peace of mind of n entire community and where anyone can violate what re consider a basic human right on the mere pretext f a suspected health violation.

We hold that it's nobody's doggone business, from a ealth standpoint, or otherwise, what goes on in any merican's home, be it a shack, slum or mansion. And hat unless something is done about the Supreme Court, nat tribunal will lose every iota of respect and reverence emodel nat it has amassed during the past century and a half. ney also recently (in the case of Abbate and Falcone vs. e United States) scrapped Article 5 which says that a nan cannot be tried twice for the same crime. They oled that a federal court could try a man despite his rior trial in a state court for the same offense. This is ouble jeopardy and our founding fathers were careful put this safeguard against this into the Constitution. et the Supreme Court has found their way clear to twist nis basic human right out of context.

We don't know how the people could legally oppose ne judicial department of our federal government. mDallince the justices are appointed for life by the President ey can't be voted out. While beating everyone else ver the head with ministerpretations of the Constitution, hey are at the same time enjoying job security through s provisions. It may be the nation will have to vote onstitutional amendments—spelled out in three letter rords so there can be no misunderstanding—so we can mply maintain rights that so many patriots fought and ed for long ago.

We consider these two rulings—double jeopardy and ome entrance without a warrant—as a major loss of ersonal freedom and a calamity of serious proportions ot only in themselves, but as a portent of things to come nless something is done quickly.—Bascom Nelson in ne Castro County News.



This year alone, the industry will add more than 14 million kilowatts of additional capacity, and in the next decade generation is expected to more than double, reaching the almost incredible total of 1.2 trillion kilowatt hours.

An institute spokesman also said that this country is far ahead of the Soviet Union in power output, and that there is no evidence that the Russians will catch up in the foreseeable future. Even if the Russians actually fulfill their goal of an annual output of 500 to 520 billion kilowatt-hours by 1965—and many authorities doubt if they will be able to do that—we will still be 21/4 times

There is no conceivable demand for power by farmers, domestic users, industry or business that the private utilities cannot fill—and fill at rates which are regulated by public service commissions. To put it another way, these utilities' past record combined with existing projects and plans proves that socialized power is simply not needed, and is a luxury the country can ill afford. On the average, private utilities pay out 23c of each dollar of revenue in taxes. The socialized federal power systems generally pay nothing. That means the taxes of all of us are higher than need be to furnish untaxed and children are vacationing in power to privileged customers.

HOW MUCH MORE TAXES?

Just how much additional tax burden can the people! of this country stand?

This is no idle question. State and local taxes are soaring. And current proposals would swell the federal, Addierine Carol of Amarillo. bite by heavy amounts.

Take, for instance the plan to provide government medical and nursing home payments for elderly people through the Social Security system. It would be financed by raising the social security taxes on both employees and employers.

The cost of the program, according to the Health Insurance Association of America, would be \$1,883,000, 000 a year. Another estimate, from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, places the bill at more \$1 billion a year. Incidentally, this report is a factual character, and makes no recommendations. But it does include a significant statement—that "in our society the existence of a problem does not necessarily indicate that action by the federal government is desirable." The intimation is that the department is highly dubious of the virtues of the proposal.

That side, if the government is to spend a billion or two a year on medical aid for one group of people, is it reasonable to suppose it would stop there? No one with any knowledge of the history of such governmental undertakings can believe it would. The door would open wide to socialized or government-dominated medicine on a limitless scale. The tax cost would be incredible. Worse still, if the experience of England and other nations is of any value at all, we would pay an enormous price in deteriorating medical standards and inferior medical care. That always happens when the bureaucrats take over, write the rule books, and call the







Luke Gave Us Treasury of Christianity

If Saint Luke had written only the gospel that bears his name, with its account of the parables and other, vivid details of the life and ministry of Jesus, he would have left to the Christian world a glorious heritage.

But he followed his gospel with the Book of Acts, the story of Christian beginning and the spread of Christianity.

In Luke's writings, what stands out is the reality of the message of salvation through the love and grace of God.

Outstanding, of course, is the parable of the prodigal son. It is enforced by the parables of lost things; the lost sheep, and the woman's lost piece of silver. There is little, if anything, about controversial issues, which have so large a place in the

Pauline epistles. Concerning Luke, himself, we know little that is a matter of record. We know he was a physician, and a Gentile. Various New Testament references make

those facts plain. That he may have studied medicine in Tarsus, Paul's home; that he may have been a slave (at that time, physicians were often slaves in great households) -those things and many others are conjectural.

But what we do know, without doubt, is that Luke told for us in parable the simplest, most direct and concrete facts of the

THE SADDEST STATEMENT THAT CHRIST EVER MADE

By G. L. Cowart Pastor Assembly of God Church

AND YE WILL NOT COME TO ME, THAT YE MIGHT HAVE LIFE. John 5:40.

The Bible records many sad statements that Christ made during His ministry on earth. At one time He spoke the words, "The foxes have holes, and the birds of the air have nests; but the Son of Man hath not where to lay His head." Another time He prayed, "Oh my Father, if it be possible, let this cup pass from me: nevertheless not as I will, but as thou wilt." On the cross He cried, "My God, my God, why hast thou forsaken me?" Isalah, several hundred years before the birth of Christ, declared Him to be "a man of sorrows, and acquainted with grief." But the saddest, most heart rending words that He spoke were the words, "and ye will not come to me, that ye might have life."

A few years ago a beautiful young lady of London, England, was convicted of murder and sentenced to hang. Never did she appeal to the Queen for pardon but spent her last days in her cell seemingly with no desire to live. Only when her parents visited her on the eve of her execution did she show a desire to live. Then as she went to the gallows the next morning she cried, "I don't want to die, I don't want to die!"

How many have departed this life and failed to partake of the most important thing in life. How many have bought houses and lands, enjoyed prestige and position, gained silver and gold, and still have not lived. We live only when we come to the Giver of Life and let Him live in our being.

We pass across the stage of action only one time. Our span of life is so short; seventy, eighty or maybe ninety years. But in that time Christ gives us the privilege of life. When we receive Him we receive the greatest gift for time and eternity. There is nothing to stop us from having life, except ourselves. We have the privilege, let's take it.
