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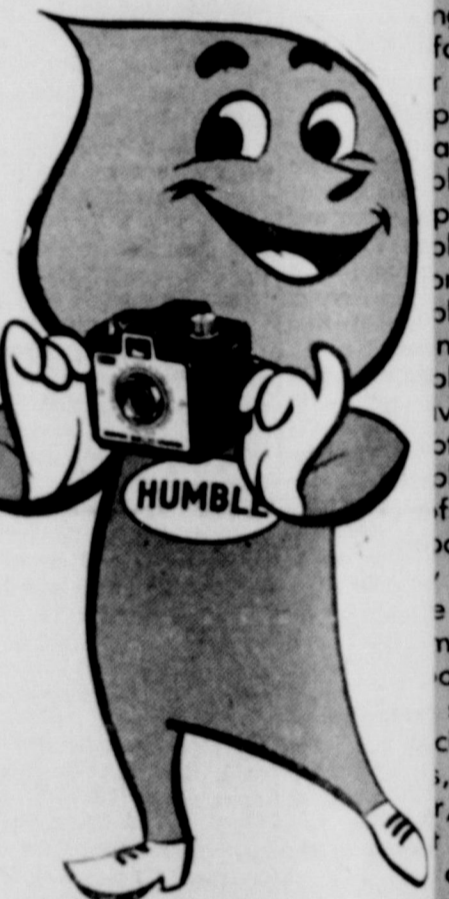

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# Editorial

### THE SENSE—AND TRACTORS

A farm equipment companies of this country put high on their list of objectives. The machines are needed to reduce hazards of operation to a minimum. In appalling number of accidents, many of a most as nature, continue to occur each year. A prime reason why this is so is simple: Individual carelessness, ignorance, and indifference. As an example, modern tractors have power take-off. The revolving shaft presents a major hazard if care, so shields are provided. But to keep the properly in place is apparently an inconvenience for the farmers. So, it has been found, the shields are often removed—and injuries and fatalities follow. A few years ago, at the Iowa State Fair, a little boy was made on the farm equipment accident. Of some 600 people who filled out cards, one thought the machines were at fault. All the blame placed on human frailty of one kind or another. They also made various suggestions like "Slow down. Don't get too tired. Be alert. Follow manufacturers' instructions. Use the shields properly. Stop machines before adjusting or servicing. Use lights and reflectors when on public roads at night. Buy good machinery and maintain it properly. Keep children away from the machines. Safety, so it couldn't be simpler—or sounder. Safety, so it is modern farm equipment is concerned, is just a matter of down to earth horse sense.

An aroma of fascination surrounds a newspaper, and many persons say they'd like to own one. It is a fascination which clings to everyone except newspaper people. They have no illusions. Now to own a newspaper, here is what you'll have to do in one day:

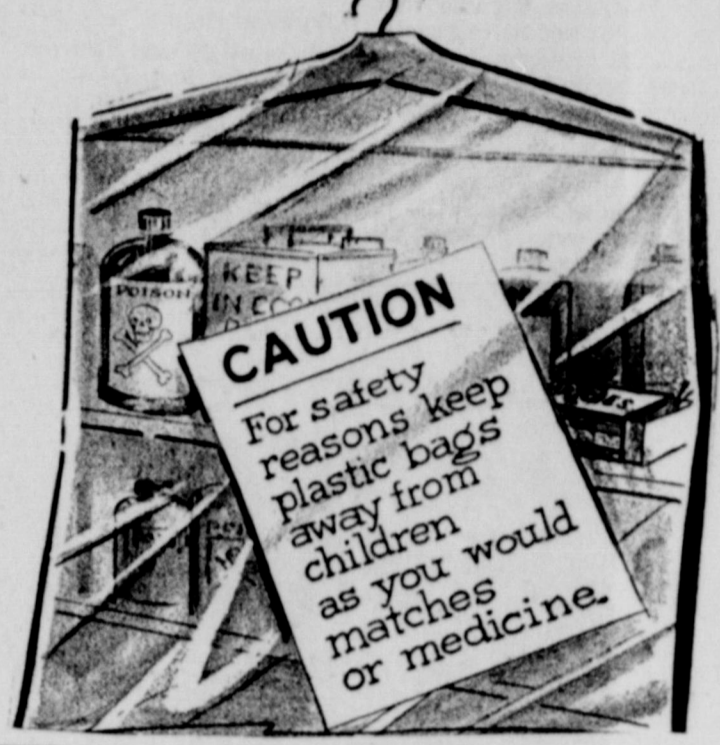

## Congressman Rogers Reports TO THE PEOPLE

### EXPEDITIOUS

Watch for the above word. It may become one of common usage, born of mistake but most expressive and, perhaps, appropriate at the point of mistake.

In 1949 the Congress passed the "Reorganization Act of 1949." It required, among other things, that reorganization plans adopted by the executive branch of the government be transmitted to the Congress. It also provided that no provision contained in such a reorganization plan should become effective unless the plan was transmitted to Congress before June 1, 1959. The bill before the House the other day had to do with changing the deadline from June 1, 1959, to June 1, 1961. A great debate arose on the House floor, not so much because of the proposed change of date, but because of the controversial nature of the original act itself. The big issue involved had to do with the provision in the bill that, if a reorganization plan was submitted to the Congress, it would take effect upon the expiration of 60 calendar days unless a resolution was adopted by one of the Houses of Congress specifically disapproving the plan. This means that the executive (President) branch of the government would write the legislation under this bill and submit it to the Congress. If the Congress, through one of its Houses, did not veto the legislation, it would become law. This procedure is in direct reverse of the procedure outlined under the Constitution. Legislation under the Constitution is to be prepared by the Congress and submitted to the President. The President has the right to veto the legislation. So, you can see that the procedure under the Reorganization Act simply reserved the operations of the government. Many members of Congress opposed this procedure, as did I. I think that history will prove that our forefathers knew a lot better how to

handle this sort of situation than those who are so anxious to pass legislation that they can't wait for the Congress to draft the bill and take affirmative action on it. One member, who was opposed to the bill in the first instance, entered into the debate on the amendment and advised the House that one of the main reasons given for wanting to grant Mr. Eisenhower the powers under the Reorganization Act was because the same powers had been held by Mr. Roosevelt and Mr. Truman. This member observed that he had understood that Mr. Roosevelt and Mr. Truman had both had the measles but no one had suggested giving them to Mr. Eisenhower.

But, to get back to the new word—the report that was filed explaining the legislation undertaken to quote the original act, which was Public Law 109 of the 81st Congress. It reads in part as follows:

Sec. 2 (a) The President shall examine and from time to time re-examine the organization of all agencies of the government and shall determine what changes therein are necessary to accomplish the following purposes:

(1) To promote the better execution of the laws, the more effective management of the executive branch of the government and of its agencies and functions, and the expeditious administration of the public business.

The word, "expeditious," impressed me when I read it because I had never heard of it before, although I did know of several places in which it would fit. In view of the great furor in recent months concerning spending, it occurred to me that there might be such a word so I hastened to the dictionary to find out. I did not find that word, but the nearest thing I could find to it was

"expeditious." This means "a laying out of money; disbursement."

There is no question but that the proponents of the Reorganization Act sold this bill of goods on the ground that it would reduce expenditures and promote economy. In view of this basis for the act, I made some comparisons on the costs of some of the departments of government. I found that the cost of one of them rose between 1951 and 1958 by more than 1 billion dollars; another by 100 million dollars; another by 300 million dollars, and numerous others by varying amounts. In this connection, I remember quite well that several years ago a question was posed to the American public which was, in effect: "Are you for or against reorganizing the Department of Agriculture and saving 80 million dollars?" This posed quite a problem, because most everybody was for saving 80 million dollars, but they had no assurance that a reorganization of the Agriculture Department would effect such a saving. I am not sure just what plan the questioner had in mind, but surely it must not have been adopted, because the cost of operation of the Department of Agriculture has increased since 1951 six times over, by more than 4 1/2 billion dollars. The cost of another department during that time has increased by well over one billion dollars.

These facts and figures created a question in my mind, so I went

back to the original Reorganization Act and found that the word used, when the act was passed, was "expeditious." But, after reviewing the matters that have occurred since 1959 and the tremendous increase in the cost of government, as well as many other things, perhaps the drafters of the 1949 act would have been more correct had they used the word, "expeditious."

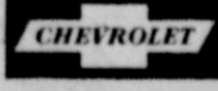
