The first McLean Art Show attracted such widespread interest and participation last weekend that the Lions Club is planning to make it an annual event.

Seventy-six entries were on display at Lovett Memorial Library Saturday and Sunday, and more than 300 persons were on hand to view the paintings.

The trophy for the outstanding original oil landscape went to Dr. H. F. Fabian, McLean physician, whose work drew much praise from the judges and viewers.

KENNEDYS ARE COMING BACK

School Board Hires Former Residents

Mr. and Mrs. Paul Kennedy, former members of the McLean school faculty, will return here next fall as teachers.

The board of education approved the hiring of Mr. and Mrs. Kennedy last week, on the recommendation of Supt. Jack Riley.

Kennedy, former superintendent of schools in McLean, currently holds the same position in the Hart Public Schools. His wife also has taught in the local school system.

Riley said that even though all local teachers have accepted the renewal of their contracts for the 1965-66 term, he feels the McLean Independent School District should not miss this opportunity to employ two outstanding teachers like the Kennedys.

The McLean schools are being operated with one less teacher than had been authorized by the board of education for this term, Riley said.

He added that most of the teachers in high school are being required to teach more classes each day than they should.

The addition of the Kennedys will reduce the workload of the other teachers he explained.

Funeral Services Held This Afternoon For James O. Clark

James O. Clark, a resident of this area for more than 55 years, died at 7:45 pm. Tuesday in Shamrock General Hospital. He was 90 years of age.

Funeral services were held at 3 p.m. today in the McLean Church of Christ, with Richard Williams, Plainview minister, officiating, assisted by Lee Mays of McLean.

Interment was in Hillcrest Cemetery under the direction of Lamb Funeral Home.

A retired farmer, Mr. Clark was a member of the Church of Christ. He was born on June 9, 1874, in Barron County, Ky., and moved to Bonham from Kentucky in 1882.

He was married to Tina Goin in Bonham on April 18, 1905, and they moved to Wheeler County in December, 1909. He resided 10 miles east of McLean.

The couple celebrated their 60th wedding anniversary last Sunday. Surviving, in addition to his wife, are two daughters, Mrs. Ruth Ware, Miami, and Mrs. Jimmie Shankle, Drummond, Okla.; one son, Tom G. of Amarillo; eight grandchildren and 11 great grandchildren.

RABIES SHOTS DUE FRIDAY

Friday will be rabies inoculation day for dogs and other pets in McLean and this area.

Dr. Charles Deyle, Clarendon veterinarian, is due to be at the McLean fire station from 3 p.m. until 7 p.m. to give rabies shots to all pets brought to the station.

Rabies shots will cost \$1.50 for each animal.

Dr. Deyle, whose visit here is being sponsored by the Junior Chamber of Commerce, also will have vaccine available to inoculate the animals against other diseases.

Jerry Gilbert, Jaycee president, urged all residents to have their pets inoculated at this time, since the rabies danger season is at hand.

The program has received the support of the McLean city commission.

Pure-Bred Cattle Breeders Honored

Pure-bred cattle breeders were praised Tuesday for their contribution to the economy of the McLean area.

The occasion was an "Appreciation Day" luncheon for the breeders sponsored by the McLean Lions Club in the Methodist Church basement.

Cotton John Smith, agriculture director for KGNC radio and television in Amarillo, recorded the program on tape for presentation on his radio program.

Smith, well known throughout the Panhandle, said that quality cattle and the standard of living go hand in hand in any nation.

"If the quality of cattle is good, the standard of living is high, he explained.

Publicize Area

Outstanding cattlemen such as those who reside in McLean and this trade territory also help to publicize the area all over the world, Smith added.

Other speakers on the program were Flip Breedlove, vice president of the Farmers State Bank of Clarendon and former Donley County agent, and Foster Whaley, Gray County agent.

Breedlove said that such cattle breeders as Faris Hess and George Saunders have helped to spread the name of McLean all over the world.

Their cattle have won numerous championships in the biggest livestock shows of the United States.

This brings breeders from all over America "here to buy your calves," Breedlove continued.

'Key Man'

The pure-bred breeder, Breedlove added, is the "key man who furnishes cattle for the commercial breeder."

"Let's keep striving to improve our cattle," he concluded.

VANDALS AT WORK IN PARK

Mayor Warns Acts Won't Be Tolerated

Mayor Boyd Meador said Wednesday that vandals have caused considerable damage to facilities in the City Park, and such acts of destruction will not be tolerated.

One fireplace was completely destroyed this week on the north side of the park and other fireplaces and city-owned picnic facilities were badly damaged.

Persons responsible for this and any future vandalism against city-owned property will be "prosecuted to the fullest extent of the law," Meador said.

"This destruction was not caused by any small children," the mayor said, "but by persons old enough to know right from wrong—and who definitely knew what they were doing."

He said no small child could have torn the fireplace down.

Close Watch Asked

"I know the other members of the city commission agree that we cannot permit such destruction to go unpunished," Mayor Meador continued.

Meador is instructing local law officers to keep a close watch on the park, as well as other property. Anyone caught damaging any of the property will be taken into custody and taken to court.

McLean Constable J. D. Fish said this morning that much vandalism was reported over the city during the weekend, with several houses entered.

The increase in the number of houses being burglarized is alarming, Fish said. Some of the residences have been broken into, while others were left unlocked.

Fish cautioned residents to lock their homes when they are away.

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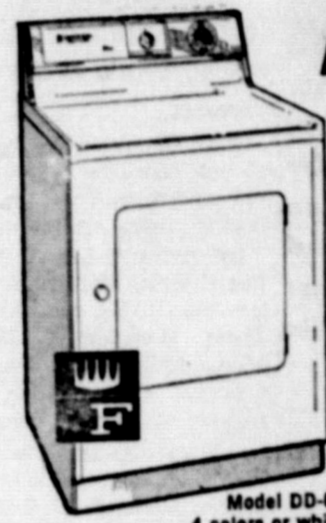
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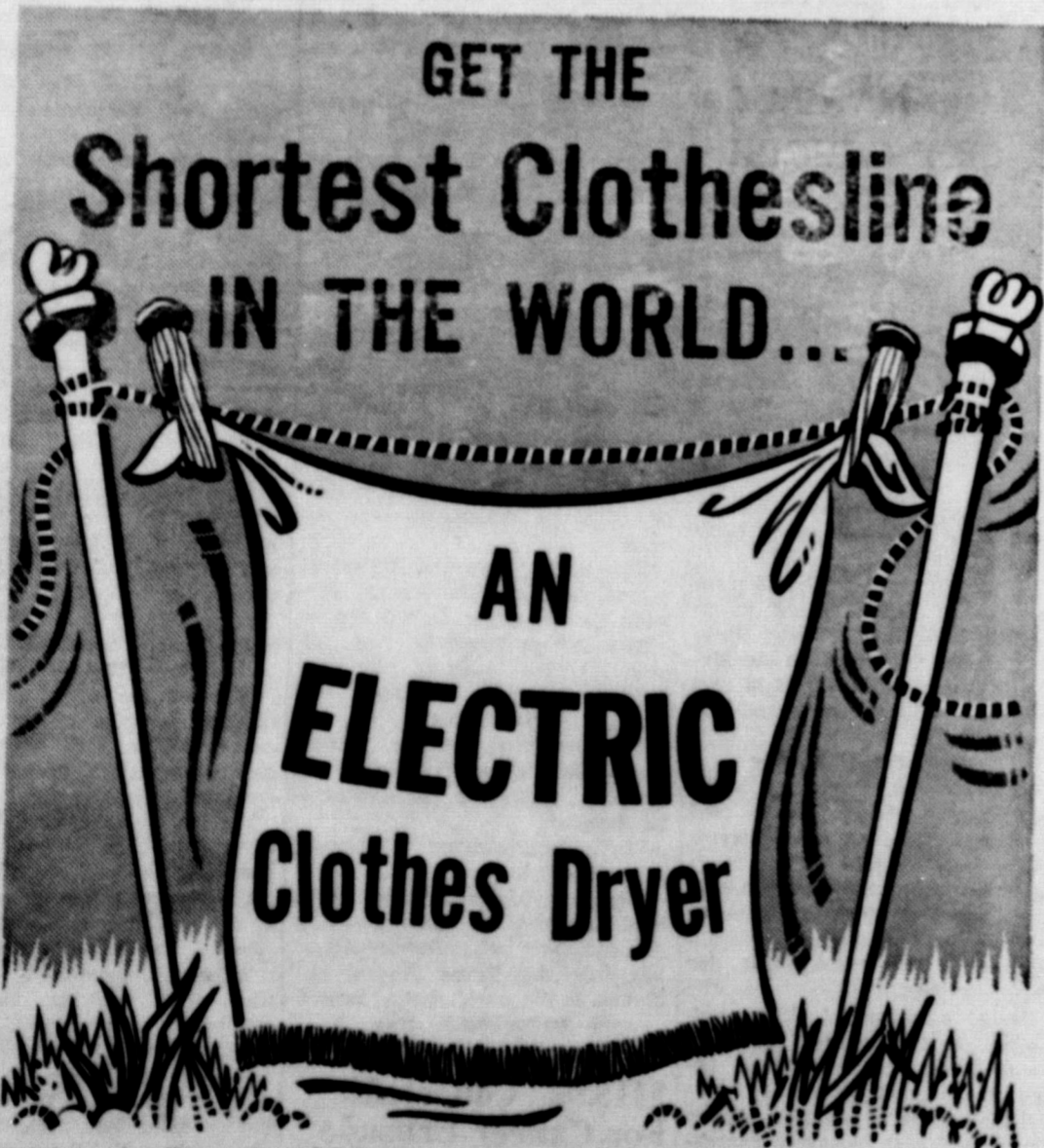

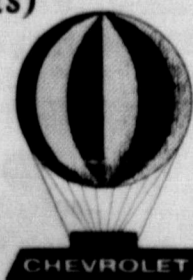

However, we have helped make it available through Joe Taylor's Barber Shop. See Joe if you need some. This should not be used in town for obvious reasons.

Joe has the anti-coagulant type rat-mouse bait that works much better and is completely safe for use in town.

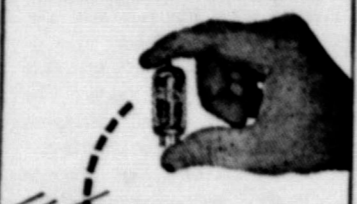

WHY CALL ME LORD, LORD
 Luke 6:46

Last week, we studied some about the Lord's Supper, and we found that on the Lord's table was the "Fruit of the Vine" and the "Unleavened Bread." He who presumes to add instrumental music to the music the Lord commanded must think the Lord did not know what would please Him. My friend, you will please the Lord by doing just what He commanded.
